The following is a brief status report on some of the major issues and projects currently being advanced by the Solano Transportation Authority (STA). An asterisk (\*) notes items included in this month's Board agenda.

### STA Hosts Plan Bay Area 2050 Workshop for Solano County \*

In preparation for STA's submittal of capacity projects to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) in June as part of the Plan Bay Area 2050 process, the STA is hosting on May 8<sup>th</sup>, both a workshop to receive presentations from our citizen and technical advisory committees and an opportunity for public input at the STA Board that evening. To be eligible for future state and federal transportation funds, projects must be included in this Plan and the Plan must be fiscally constrained. The deadline for STA to submit Solano County transportation projects to MTC/ABAG is by the end of June of 2019.

### STA's Draft Overall Work Program (OWP) for Fiscal Years 2019-20 and 2020-21 \*

Each year, STA staff updates and the STA Board reviews, modifies and approves the STA's two year Overall Work Plan. The year's OWP covers Fiscal Years (FYs) 2019-20 and 2020-21 and includes 47 plans, projects and programs that are either currently underway or have been recommended to be added or modified. Currently, STA has 5 plans underway or scheduled during the next two years. The largest is the Comprehensive Transportation Plan which is focused on the new Equity and Land Use chapters, and a comprehensive and integrated Active Transportation Plan (ATP). STA currently has 13 active projects in various stages of project delivery, ranging from express lanes to interchanges to transit centers. There are 29 OWP activities classified as programs that range from coordinating transit services to managing funding. Examples are Safe Routes to School, Solano Mobility, Abandoned Vehicle Abatement Program, SolanoExpress and the Regional Traffic Impact Fee. This is a two-step process with review and discussion in May and STA Board approval scheduled for June 2019.

# STA to Recognize CCJPB's David Kutrosky \*

At the Board meeting, STA is scheduled to recognize David Kutrosky, the soon to be retiring Managing Director of the Capitol Corridor Joint Powers Authority (CCJPB). Mr. Kutrosky has done an exemplary job managing this ever growing and improving intercity rail service and he played an integral role in the recent opening of the new Fairfield Vacaville Train Station (soon to be renamed the Tom Hannigan Station) and improvements to the Suisun Fairfield Train Depot.

### CASA Compact Legislation Focus of State Legislature\*

At the direction of the Board, STA staff continues to monitor state legislation pertaining to housing, in addition to transportation legislation. A detailed update of current state housing and transportation legislation is included with the Board packet.

# <u>FY 2019-20 TFCA Program Management Funds Focus on Partnerships for</u> <u>Implementation of EV Chargers\*</u>

Each year, STA programs Transportation for Clean Air funds provided by the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD). The recommended focus of this year is implementation of Electric Vehicle chargers in partnership with Travis Air Force Base and the California State University Maritime Academy, an Active Transportation project in Suisun City, and the employer and commuter programs for Solano Mobility.

### Construction Contract for Vallejo Transit Center – York Street Improvement Project \*

STA's Janet Adams and Anthony Adams have been partnering with the City of Vallejo and Solano County Transit (SolTrans) to fund and expand the Vallejo Transit Center – York Street Improvement Project. This \$2.5 million project will significantly and improve the capacity at the VTC which is south Solano County's major transit hub with connections to the Yellow Line, the new Red Line, the SF Bay Ferry, and other local and regional transit connections. The project has also been combined with an accelerated street scape project in downtown Vallejo contiguous with the transit project.

# SR 37/Fairgrounds Bus Stop Construction Underway

The SR 37/Fairgrounds Bus Stops, to be titled "Six Flags/North Vallejo," are now under construction in preparation for the new Red Line that is scheduled to begin service July 1, 2019. This has also been a partnership project with SolTrans, the City of Vallejo, Six Flags and Caltrans.

# <u>SolTrans Requests Partnership with STA to Offer Mobility Service Options for Benicia</u> <u>Service Area</u>

SolTrans recently completed a comprehensive analysis of their local transit service. In follow up, SolTrans has requested STA consider employing some its Solano Mobility First Mile Last Mile programs to service the Benicia area of SolTrans' local service area. STA and SolTrans staff will provide the STA Board with a more detailed overview of this service request at the June 2019 Board meeting.

# STA Budget Update \*

Susan Furtado has provided the third quarter budget report for FY 2018-19 in preparation for the final budget adjustment scheduled for the STA Board meeting of June 12, 2019. Also scheduled for that meeting is the updated budget for FY 2019-20 and the initial draft budget for FY 2020-21.

# STA Staff Update

Cory Pederson, Planning Assistant, will be joining his family in Austin, Texas, and his last day with STA is April 26<sup>th</sup>. STA has initiated a recruitment for his replacement.

### **Background:**

The Solano Transportation Authority (STA) has an adopted budget policy requiring a two-year annual fiscal year budget plan for its proposed expenditures and the proposed means of financing them. The budget is usually revised mid-year and finalized at the end of the fiscal year. When necessary, these budgets are revised to provide STA the basis for appropriate budgetary control of its financial operations for the fiscal year. In July 2018, the STA Board adopted the FY 2018-19 and the FY 2019-20 Budget as part of the two-year annual fiscal year budget plan. In January 2019, the STA Board approved the FY 2018-19 Mid-Year Budget Revision, and subsequently in March 2019 approved the modification to the Budget due to the addition of the Intercity Bus Replacement Plan and the new funding for the Vehicle Share/Medical Transports Program.

### **Discussion:**

The STA revenue and expenditure activity (Attachment A) for the FY 2018-19 Third Quarter reflects the overall STA program administration and operations expenditure at \$7,064,027 (26%) of the budget with total revenue received at \$10,394,756 (39%) of budget projections.

### **Revenues:**

Revenues received during the Third Quarter of the Fiscal Year primarily consist of quarterly reimbursement requests and annual advances of funds. As most STA programs are funded with grants on a reimbursement basis, the reimbursements from fund sources for the Third Quarter were billed and received after the quarter ending March 31, 2019. The revenue budget highlights are as follows:

- 1. The One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) 2 Fund in the amount of \$503,104 was received for the Program Administration and Planning.
- 2. The Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3 funds in the amount of \$45,955 for Countywide Transportation Plan update and TDA Article 4/4.5 in the amount of \$1,171,478 for the Countywide Taxi Scrip/PEX Card Program, which includes the amount of \$156,642 carryover funds from prior fiscal year.
- 3. The State Transit Assistance Fund (STAF) in the amount of \$2,876,433 for Planning and Programming and the amount of \$306,484 for the transit Capital Solano Express Bus Stops and the Phase Design Parking Structures Projects in Solano County.
- 4. The Solano Community College transportation fee allocation was received in the amount of \$87,349 and STA issued distribution disbursements to the transit operators Solano County Transit (SolTrans) \$37,123, City of Fairfield (FAST) \$37,123, and City of Vacaville (City Coach) \$13,102.

- 5. The Napa Valley Transportation Agency (NVTA) funds was received the amount of \$11,974 for the Napa Commute Challenge and Van Pool Programs, which is the final funding due to the ending of the service agreements between NVTA and STA.
- 6. The Department of Motor Vehicle (DMV) funds for the Abandoned Vehicle Abatement (AVA) Program for FY 2018-19 was received in the amount of \$203,035, which includes the amount of \$6,091 for administration cost.
- Regional Measure (RM) 2 funds was received in the amount of \$819,234, which includes the amount of \$62,027 for administration cost for the two RM 2 projects: I-80/I-680/State Route (SR) 12 Interchange Project and the I-80 Express Lanes.
- 8. Regional Transportation Impact Fee (RTIF) Program funding was received in the amount of \$686,319, which includes administration cost of \$13,720. The amount of \$252,027 was disbursed for the RTIF District allocation, such as the final payment to the Solano Land Trust.
- 9. STA has received interest revenue in the amount of \$114,979 from fund investment and bank interest as a result of the cash account and cash flow from July 2018 through March 2019 in both the City of Vacaville and the STA's Bank of the West accounts.

# **Expenditures:**

STA's projects and programs are underway and expenditures are within budget projections (75%).

- 1. STA's Management and Operations is within the Third Quarter budget projection at 69% of budget.
- 2. Programs for Mobility and Transit Services is at 30% of budget.
- 3. Project Development is at 18% of budget.
- 4. Strategic Planning is at 45% of budget.

Projects and studies such as: The Community Based Transportation Plan (CBTP), the Transit Ridership Survey, Suisun/Fairfield Amtrak Operation/Maintenance, the Vehicle Share/Medical Transport Program, and the STA's Office Building-Capital project are ongoing with expenditures and consultant billings submitted after the end of the Third Quarter which will be reflected in the next quarter. The I-80 Interchange Project, the I-80 Express Lanes Project, and the Redwood Parkway Drive/Fairgrounds Improvement Project are ongoing and expenditures will be reflected in subsequent quarter reports. Therefore, the forecasted expenditures for these projects for actual work completed are not reflective of the budget ratio for the first and second quarter.

The total revenue and expenditure for the Third Quarter is consistent with the projected FY 2018-19 budgets.

# **Fiscal Impact:**

The Third Quarter Budget for FY 2018-19 (75% completed) is within budget projections for the Revenue received of \$10,394,756 (39%) and Expenditures of \$7,064,027 (26%).

RE:	American Disability Act (ADA) Eligibility Assessment for Solano County

During the Solano County Coordinated Short Range Transit (SRTP) conducted in 2012, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) recommended that the Solano County Coordinated SRTP examine several specific areas of coordination. One of those areas was Joint Contracting/Eligibility Determination of ADA Paratransit. The implementation and assessment of the Countywide ADA In-Person Eligibility Program was included in the Solano Mobility Management Plan. STA, in collaboration with the Transit Operators and advisories committees, worked together in developing an in-person eligibility and certification process that will make more precise ADA eligibility determinations.

The program was launched by STA with a contract with C.A.R.E. Evaluators providing in person functional assessments on July 1, 2013. The primary goals of Solano Countywide In-Person ADA Eligibility and Certification process are to ensure an accurate and consistent eligibility process in completed countywide for paratransit service to those in actual need of the service and to promote alternative transportation modes for people who may be able to use fixed route and other transportation options. The lengthy paper based application process was replaced with a more personalized in-person process where a qualified professional interviews applicants and, if needed, assesses the applicant's physical and functional ability to use fixed route transit. The process become more applicant friendly by eliminating the requirement for the Medical verification from a health care professional.

Also, ADA eligibility assessment centers are conveniently located in each city throughout Solano County, and complimentary paratransit rides to and from the assessment center are provided by the transit operators for the applicant upon request. ADA eligibility certification is valid for three years.

During year one of the program, Fiscal Year (FY) 2013-14, C.A.R.E. Evaluators completed 1,172 assessments, an average of 97 per month. In FY 2014-15, year two of the program, the monthly average of assessments increased from 97 to 111 with an annual total of 1,332. In FY 2015-16, CA.R.E evaluations dropped by 11% to 1,186 completed evaluations. In FY 2016-17, C.A.R.E. completed 1,227 a 3% increase from the prior year. Based on the current monthly trend, C.A.R.E. Evaluators are estimated to complete 1,245 assessments for FY 2018-19, an estimated 1% increase over the previous year (Attachment A).

On June 8, 2016, the STA Board approved modifying the program to enable an ADA Auto Recertification which began July 1, 2017. This process allows the applicant to renew ADA paratransit services eligibility with just an informational update (mail-in Auto Renewal Application) without requiring a functional evaluation. A determination of auto-renewal is given when the following circumstances exist. Unrestricted eligibility has been determined at the previous evaluation and the applicant's functional ability is not expected to change over time, with training, new medical treatments, or a change in assistive device. The ADA Auto Renewal was implemented to create a more convenient process for the user and to save program cost. Currently, the Auto Renewal process costs \$20.80 per person versus the full completed assessment cost of \$164.38

### **Discussion:**

STA's current contract with C.A.R.E. Evaluators expires on June 30, 2019. C.A.R.E has been providing quality work over the past six (6) years. However, staff recommends to release a Request for Proposals (RFP) to procure the most competitively priced services needed to operate the Countywide In-Person ADA Eligibility Assessments.

ADA eligibility assessments are required by Federal Transit Administration to comply with the American with Disabilities Act (ADA) at 42 U.S.C. § 12143 regulations.

### Fiscal Impact:

Solano County In-Person ADA Assessments is funded with State Transit Assistance Funds for an annual estimated cost of \$200,000. This funding is included in the FY 2019-20 budget.

### **Recommendation:**

Authorize the Executive Director to:


- 1. Release a Request for Proposal for American Disability Act (ADA) Eligibility Assessments for Solano County; and





### **Background:**

Consistent with STA Board direction, staff has been proceeding with the implementation for the Vallejo Transit Center – York Street Improvements Project (Project). The STA was awarded and Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP) funds for the transit and pedestrian improvements for SolanoExpress near the existing Vallejo Transit Facility. In working with Solano County Transit (SolTrans) and the City of Vallejo, it was determined the appropriate location for these improvements was along York Street directly to the east of the existing SolTrans facility.

Additionally, the City of Vallejo has an approved Complete Streets vision for the downtown area, known as the Downtown Street Scape Project. Several phases of this vision have been completed. Within the same block as these transit improvements on York Street, is a high priority for the City for the Downtown Street Scape Project. At the February 2019 STA Board meeting, a \$1 M swap of State Transit Assistance Funds (STAF) with future One Bay Area Grant Cycle 3 funds was approved. As such, the project that is proposed for construction is the transit and pedestrian improvements for the entire one block section of York Street between Sacramento and Marin Streets.

The Project is funded with a combination of STAF and Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP) funds. These capital improvements are expected to be completed by early 2020.

### **Discussion**:

As mentioned above, the Project will be completed by early 2020. The Project plans were prepared by HQE, Inc., STA's design engineering consultant. In accordance with legal requirements, the construction of this project will be advertised in the Vallejo Times-Herald.

Bids are planned to be received and opened on June 4, 2019 at STA offices at the One Harbor Center, Suite 130, Suisun City, CA. The Engineer's Estimate for the Bus Pullouts on SR 37 Ramps at Fairgrounds Drive Project is \$2,163,000. The project budget will include a contingency of 20% of the bid amount to cover required contract change orders.

Once staff has verified that all the contract-related documents, such as bonds and insurance certificates, are in order as required by the contract, the lowest responsible bidder will be given a Notice to Proceed. At this time staff is seeking to provide awarding authority to the Executive Director up to 120% of the engineers estimate. Due to the schedule of the SolanoExpress Phase 2 service schedule, there is an urgency to award to the project as soon as possible.

# Fiscal Impact:

The costs for the construction contract and construction administration for the Project will be funded with STAF and TIRCP funds.

# **Recommendation:**

Approve the following:

- 1. The Vallejo Transit Center York Street Improvements Project Contract, Notice to Contractors and Special Provisions, including issued Addenda;
- 2. Authorize the Executive Director or his designee to sign the contract on behalf of the STA Board subject to the Executive Director or his designee having reviewed and found sufficient all required documents, including the contract signed by the contractor and the required surety bonds and certificates of insurance;

Awards the contract for furnishing labor, equipment, and materials for the Vallejo Transit Center York Street Improvements Project Contract to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder and requires the contractor to present surety bonds for payment and faithful performance equal to the bid amount.
- 4. Authorizes the Executive Director or his designee to execute the contract on behalf of the STA Board subject to:
  - a. The contract amount being within the Engineer's estimate of costs for the project plus contingencies and supplemental funds, to wit: an amount not to exceed \$2,163,000, and
  - b. The Executive Director or his designee having reviewed and found sufficient all required documents, including the contract signed by the contractor with all required surety bonds and certificates of insurance, and such other documents required under the contract.

- 5. Directs that, in accordance with the project specifications and/or upon the execution of the contract by the Executive Director or designee, any bid bonds posted by the bidders be exonerated and any checks or cash submitted for bid security be returned.
- 6. Authorizes the Executive Director or his designee to execute required contract change orders for up to 20% of the bid amount.
- 7. Authorizes the Executive Director or his designee to sign any escrow agreements prepared for this project to permit direct payment of retention into escrow or the substitution of securities for moneys withheld by the STA to ensure performance under the contract pursuant to Public Contract Code section 22300.
- 8. Delegates the STA Board's functions under Public Contract Code sections 4107 and 4110 to the Executive Director or his designee.
- 9. Pursuant to Section 6705 of the Labor Code, delegate to a registered civil or structural engineer employed by the STA and so designated by the Executive Director, the authority to accept detailed plans showing the design of shoring, bracing, sloping, or other provisions to be made for worker protection during trench excavating covered by that section.
- 10. Declare that, should the contract award be invalidated for any reason, the STA Board in any event would not have awarded the contract to the second bidder or any other bidder but instead would have exercised its discretion to reject all of the bids received. Nothing herein shall prevent the Board from awarding the contract to another bidder in cases where the successful bidder establishes a mistake, refuses to sign the contract, or fails to furnish required bonds or insurance (see Public Contract Code sections 5100 et seq.).

## **Background:**

The Bay Area Air Quality Management District's (BAAQMD) Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) is collected from a \$4 fee on all vehicle registrations within the Air District's boundaries. 60% of these funds are applied to the TFCA Regional Program, which is administered by BAAQMD. The remaining 40% is distributed to each Bay Area county Congestion Management Agency (CMA), and is called County Program Manager Funds.

BAAQMD, in coordination with the CMA's, establishes TFCA policies for both programs annually. Eligible TFCA projects are those that reduce air pollution from motor vehicles, such as clean air vehicles and infrastructure, carpools/vanpools, shuttle bus services, bicycle projects, and alternative mode promotional/educational projects. The TFCA County Program Manager Funds available for Solano County projects in FY 2019-20 is estimated to be \$345,995.

Southwestern portions of Solano County are eligible to apply for these funds. This area includes the cities of Benicia, Fairfield, Suisun City, and Vallejo, as well as the surrounding unincorporated areas. The Yolo-Solano Air Quality Management District provides similar funding (i.e. Clean Air Funds through a different process) for the remaining cities of Dixon, Rio Vista, Vacaville, and the surrounding unincorporated areas.

All eligible projects must meet cost effectiveness requirements related to the amount of emission reductions, and must submit monitoring reports twice a year. Past projects funded through the TFCA program include Class I and II bike facilities, Solano Mobility, and Safe Routes to School projects. STA staff aims to identify projects that align well with the goals of both BAAQMD and STA.

## **Discussion:**

At the January 9<sup>th</sup> Board Meeting, the STA Board approved a funding allocation of \$196,000 of FY 2019-20 TFCA funds for the Solano Mobility Program. These Rideshare and Employer Incentives programs are a cost effective and successful program in terms of air emission reduction benefits as calculated through BAAQMD's TFCA program. It also remains a priority program for the STA Board to reduce congestion and to promote the use of travel alternatives in Solano County. Benefits of the program include marketing and promotion of commute alternatives through transit brochure distribution, vanpool formations, bicycle and pedestrian education, employer programs, marketing events, and incentive campaigns. Due to a delay in implementing aspects of the rideshare program, there are still TFCA funds from prior years to be expended. STA staff recommends to reduce the Board approved amount to \$93,845 for the program in this fiscal year cycle of funding.

The STA Board, along with approving the funding for Solano Mobility, approved opening a Call for Projects for the remainder of the STA Program Manager funds. The Call for Projects was announced January 24<sup>th</sup> and closed on February 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2019. STA received a total of five applications (Attachment A). Applications were received from Cal Maritime, Travis Air Force Base (TAFB), City of Suisun City and the City of Vallejo.

STA staff met with Cal Maritime University during the Call for Projects window to discuss potential funding opportunities. Cal Maritime was recently approved for the PG&E Charge Network and requested \$31,050 of TFCA funds to use as a "match" to the costs of the PG&E work. PG&E will be installing 27 Electric Vehicle (EV) chargers on the Cal Maritime campus. Additionally, Cal Maritime requested \$38,069 in funds to purchase an EV Van and \$20,500 for an Electric Sedan. However, due to the Cost-Effectiveness threshold mandated by BAAQMD, funding vehicles is difficult – STA is able to fund a small portion for the EV Hybrid Van (\$1,600.00). The van will be used to shuttle students to and from academic and athletic events – Cal Maritime was previously renting single-use vans for this purpose. In total, Cal Maritime requested \$78,619.

The TAFB met with STA staff to discuss their goal towards installing 100 EV chargers on their base – to be phased IN over a few years. Travis AFB is currently doing research to EV usage and adoption on the base – estimating 150 active users with this number expected to grow as charging facilities are made readily available. STA staff recommends providing Travis Air Force Base with \$120,000 to be used as a match to their own contribution of \$200,000 to fund a first phase of EV chargers on base.

City of Suisun City applied for a traffic calming project near Crystal Middle School, this would include the installation of Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFB) at an existing crosswalk which fronts the Crystal Middle School's main entrance to the school grounds. The project scope will also include modifying and upgrading the curb ramps (on each side of said crosswalk) and two nearby curb ramps to American with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant curb ramps; curb bulbouts; upgrading the crosswalk to a high visibility crosswalk; and installing advance warning signs. For this project, Suisun City requested a \$99,500.

City of Vallejo applied for funds to implement a variety of bike safety improvements to improve conflict areas. These improvements include sharrows, signage, and restriping, amounting in a total request of \$130,000. STA staff recommended potential funding for the City of Vallejo, but City staff indicated a lesser amount of funding wouldn't work for the project request. STA staff will work with Vallejo staff to coordinate a follow-up funding request in a future funding cycle.

These projects and allocations have been reviewed by Solano County's BAAQMD representatives. When choosing the projects and allocations, STA staff considered the overall cost-effectiveness and potential to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. From the Call for Projects, STA staff recommends allocating \$31,050 for the Cal Maritime EV charging stations, \$1,600 for Cal Martime's EV Hybrid Van; \$120,000 for Travis Air Force Base's EV charging stations, and \$99,500 for Suisun's Crystal Middle School Traffic Calming project.

These projects and funding recommendations were approved by the STA Technical Advisory Committee at their April 25<sup>th</sup> meeting.

## **Fiscal Impact:**

The total funding amount requested for the TFCA County Program Manager funds was a total \$508,000 -- STA has \$345,995 available for the FY 2019-20. \$93,845 is recommended for the Solano Mobility Program.

# **Recommendation:**

Approve FY 2018-19 BAAQMD TFCA County Program Manager Funds as follows:

- 1. \$93,845 for the Solano Mobility Program;
- 2. \$31,050 for Cal Maritime's On-Campus Electric Chargers;
- 3. \$1,600 for Cal Martime's EV Van;
- 4. \$120,000 for Travis Air Force Base's Electric Chargers; and
- 5. \$99,500 for Suisun City's Crystal Middle School Traffic Calming Project

# **Background:**

The Solano Transportation Authority is responsible for coordinating with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and Caltrans to develop the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) for the Bay Area every four years. The RTP is a long range transportation plan that forecasts future transportation needs. As required by California Senate Bill 375, the RTP also includes a component that promotes sustainable communities and provides policies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Another important aspect of the RTP is that it is the required regional planning document for programming federal funds.

The last RTP, called the Plan Bay Area 2040, was completed in 2017. In early 2018, MTC begun to lay the ground work for the next RTP update by starting the Horizon's initiative process. This process has multiple goals, but the primary goal is to get public input early in the RTP planning process. Their approach included an extensive process with the following components:

- 1. Guiding Principles
- 2. Future Scenarios
- 3. Identification of Transformative Projects
- 4. Perspective Papers that identify specific challenges associated with that topic (e.g. jobs growth, climate adaptation, housing production, autonomous vehicles, etc.)

Over the next several months, MTC will be transitioning from their Horizon's Initiative to the RTP development called Plan Bay Area 2050. This will include forecasting transportation revenue for each county and identifying transportation projects beyond the transformative projects submitted through the Horizon's Initiative.

## **Discussion:**

Previously, Solano County was forecasted to have \$1.6 billion in State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) Funds, Surface Transportation Program (STP), Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) Improvement Program and other potential transportation revenue sources. The new estimate of \$2.4 billion in available transportation funds for Solano County was provided by MTC recently for the next RTP. The new estimate includes an additional 10 years from the previous RTP, from 2040 to 2050 and is subject to change. STA staff is recommending a public hearing on STA's draft Plan Bay Area 2050 project submittals at this time. The deadline for project submittals to MTC is June 30<sup>th</sup>.

Attachment A includes the current project list for Solano County from the 2040 RTP as a starting point for project consideration.

A separate workshop on the project submittals is scheduled just prior to the May 8<sup>th</sup> STA Board meeting at 4:30 p.m. The purpose of the workshop is to provide each STA committee (example: STA Bicycle Advisory Committee) up to five minutes to talk about their committee's priorities and what they recommend pursuant to STA's Plan Bay Area 2050 projects submittal. This gives each Advisory Committee an opportunity to discuss and recommend their priority project from their respective committee. STA staff will then report on the discussion and recommendations from the workshop at the public hearing.

The STA TAC and SolanoExpress Consortium reviewed this item and have nominated participants for the May 8<sup>th</sup> Plan Bay Area 2050 Project Submittal Workshop. The item was also presented to other Advisory Committees as well.

# Fiscal Impact:

None at this time.

# **Recommendation:**

Approve the following:

- 1. Open the public hearing and hear public comments on the new project submittals for the Plan Bay Area 2050; and
- 2. Continue the public hearing to the STA Board meeting on June 12, 2019 to approve projects to be submitted to MTC for inclusion in the Plan Bay Area 2050.

## **Background**:

Each year, the Solano Transportation Authority (STA) Board and staff identify and update the STA's priority plans, projects and programs. These tasks provide the foundation for the STA's OWP for the forthcoming two fiscal years. In July 2002, the STA Board modified the adoption of its list of priority projects to coincide with the adoption of its two-year budget. This marked the first time the STA had adopted a two-year Overall Work Plan. The most recently adopted STA OWP for Fiscal Years (FYs) 2018-19 and FY 2019-20 included a list of 45 priority projects, plans and programs. The updated OWP has 5 plans, 13 projects, and 29 programs totaling 47 OWP work tasks.

Over the past 19 years, the STA's OWP has continued to evolve based on changing Board priorities, requests from the eight member agencies that comprise the STA's Joint Powers Authority (JPA), and to address priorities, policies and requirements emanating from the federal, state, and the region. The focus of the STA during the timeframe of 2000 to 2005 was to complete the first Solano County Comprehensive Transportation Plan, initiate various corridor studies, and identify a handful of priority projects to fund and advance into construction. From 2005 to the present, the STA has taken a more proactive role in advancing projects through a variety of project development activities and has expanded its transit coordination role in partnership with Solano's five local transit operators, the Capitol Corridors and the San Francisco Bay Ferry. For the past decade (2009 to 2019), STA has initiated and is now managing several mobility programs designed to improve mobility and access for seniors, people with disabilities, low income residents traveling to work, shopping, medical appointments, and school age children and their parents traveling to and from school.

## Planning FY 2018-19

STA's planning activities during FY 2018-19 included the initiation of the final elements of the Comprehensive Transportation Plan, the Equity and Land Use Chapters and the Executive Summary. The 2019 update of the Congestion Management Program and a Countywide Active Transportation Plan were initiated. The Countywide Traffic Model was updated and is scheduled to be brought to the STA Board in May 2019. The Solano County Water Transit Plan has been initiated and is underdevelopment with a project completion date of June 2019 and the Solano Safe Routes to Transit Plan was amended to add additional projects.

## Projects FY 2018-19

In 2009, the STA's eight member agencies approved an update and modification to the STA's Joint Powers Agreement that authorized the STA to perform all aspects of project development and delivery, including right of way functions for specified priority projects. This past fiscal year, the STA's project development activities included the following: Initiating the design phase for two new bus stops at SR 37/Fairgrounds to be ready for construction in support of Phase 2 (the Red Line) of the SolanoExpress Service plan and awarding the construction contract, starting the design phase for the upgrade to the SR 37/Fairgrounds Interchange and obtained a commitment of \$15 million of Regional Measure 3 funds for the construction phase. The STA also entered into a second memorandum of understanding with three other county transportation agencies, Caltrans and MTC for the initial funding and delivery of segments of the SR 37 Corridor, including the environmental document for Segment B (Mare Island Interchange to SR37/121 and the SR 37/Fairgrounds Interchange in Segment C. The STA and Caltrans partnered to complete the design phase of Phase 2 of the I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange through a Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC) project delivery approach with STA agreeing to serve as the lead for the right of way phase for the project.

The Projects Department also obtained and began implementation of a \$10 million State Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP) grant for Solano Express Service Integration and Electrification and entered into a Master Agreement with the California State Transportation Agency (CalSTA). The department also completed the fifth annual report for the Regional Transportation Impact Fee (RTIF) program which passed the \$6 million milestone in funds generated for the program. The Abandon Vehicles Abatement (AVA) Program reimbursed for 8,022 vehicles abated during the first six months of the fiscal year.

## Programs FY 2018-19

The STA's First and Last Mile Program partnership with LYFT expanded to provide connections to the Capitol Corridors two rail stations and to connect to the new service areas for Solano Express Blue Line, Green Express and Yellow Line. Additional connections are being planned in partnership with SolTrans for the City of Benicia and Mare Island in Vallejo. The Safe Routes to School (SR2S) Program is working with 69 schools with over 15,000 participating students located in Solano County. 49 schools with 8,793 students participated in International Walk to School Day, 19 "Rock the Block" shows and 7 Bike Mobile Repair Events were held across Solano County and a fourth round of enforcement grants were provided to Benicia and Suisun City.

A series of eight Older Adults and Persons with Disabilities Mobility Summits were held, one countywide and one in each of the seven cities. Over 300 participants and another 2,200 individuals responded to surveys. The number one mobility issue identified in all seven cities was medical trips.

STA worked with SolTrans and Fairfield and Suisun Transit (FAST) to successfully implement Phase 1 of the new SolanoExpress Service implementation with the introduction of the new Blue, Green Express and Yellow Lines. This included a marketing plan and a consolidated fare structure for all SolanoExpress Routes. STA worked with Vacaville City Coach, FAST and SolTrans, and Solano Community College (SCC) to successfully implement a SCC students ride free with the SCC identification with the recent passage of the SCC student fee for transit. An update to the Ridership Survey for Solano Express was completed and the STA Board authorized staff to initiate the third Coordinated Short Range Transit Plan (SRTP) in FY 2019-20. The Intercity Paratransit Taxi Card Program transitioned from paper scrip to the taxicard and non-ambulatory service was implemented in the cities of Benicia, Dixon, Rio Vista and Vallejo. The service is scheduled to expand to the cities of Fairfield, Suisun City and Vacaville later this year.

The Solano Mobility Program included the following: The Solano Mobility Call Center assisted over 8,611 individuals, supported 107 vanpools and started 3 new vanpools. A total of 533 individuals were assessed for ADA eligibility through nine months of FY 2018-19 with 73 qualifying for the new auto renewal program, and 33 individuals participating in the STA's travel training program during the first six months of this fiscal year. 13 employers have enrolled in the STA's updated employer program with 52 employees participating in the Solano Mobility incentive programs available for the new Ride Amigos incentives program offered by STA. Participation in the Travel Training program significantly increased in FY 2018-19 with 15 travel training events and 69 participants. The Board also authorized Solano Mobility to implement a Vehicle Share Program for medical trips, in partnership with Solano County and Yoche Dehe Tribe, and STA is partnering with local hospitals to implement additional programs to assist in providing enhanced mobility to medical trips as part of the STA's efforts through the Consolidated Transportation Service Agency (CTSA).

# **Federal and State**

Four years ago, the Republicans led US Congress and President Obama authorized a five year Transportation Authorization Bill called Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act or the "FAST Act". In 2019, President Trump and the new Democratic House have begun discussions on a new transportation infrastructure bill. In 2017, the State Legislature and Governor Jerry Brown agreed on a \$5.2 billion per year transportation bill (Senate Bill 1) that has restored funding for local streets and roads, transit, the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP), maintenance of the state highway system and other transportation programs. Several new program categories were established that include grant funding for freight projects and congested corridors. The STA, working with Caltrans District 4 and with the support of Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC), was approved by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for \$53.2 million SB 1 funded freight grant for construction of Phase 2 of the I-80/I-608/SR 12 Interchange. In 2018, California and Solano County voters passed Proposition 69 to protect the revenues from SB 1 for transportation. In November of 2018, California and Solano County voters subsequently rejected Proposition 6 that would have repealed SB 1. With SB 1 transportation funds now protected by the voters, STA has supported Caltrans submittal of the Solano I-80 Express Lanes for competitive Federal INFRA grant funding and for future rounds of SB 1 competitive grant funds.

## **Bay Area Region**

In June of 2018, Bay Area voters passed Regional Measure 3 which includes a number of specific projects and regional programs to be funded by future increases to the bridge tolls on the seven state owned bridges located in the Bay Area. This specifically includes funding for I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange (\$150 million), Westbound Truck Scales (\$105 million), and SR 37 (\$100 million), plus additional operating for expanded ferry service between Vallejo and San Francisco, and Solano Express Bus Service, competitive transit capital funding potential for the Vallejo Station Phase B and other transit facilities.

# **Discussion:**

Attached for review is the STA's Draft OWP for FY's 2019-20 and 2020-21. The plans, projects and programs contained in the current OWP have been updated to reflect milestones achieved in FY 2018-19 and contain new additions approved by the STA Board during FY 2018-19.

# PROJECT DELIVERY/COMPLETE PROJECTS/NEAR TERM CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Based on the Budget for FY 2018-19 and FY 2019-20, the following four OWP projects were fully funded and are now completed, currently under construction or slated to be in construction in FY 2019-20 or FY 2020-21:

- Jepson Parkway Vacaville (Segment 1) Completed FY 2018-19
- Fairfield (Segment 2) Under construction with completion in FY 2019-20 or FY 2020-21
- I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange Phase 2A Design with construction to begin 2020
- SR 12/SR 113 Roundabout Construction to Begin by May 2019

There are several projects that are currently in the project development phase with a specific project development phase currently funded so that work can continue, but the project is not fully funded and the STA is seeking additional future funds for construction. Two projects were submitted for competitive state SB 1 funds.

- I-80 Express Lanes Conversion of HOV Lanes to Express Lanes from Red Top Road to Air Base Parkway and the New Express Lanes from Air Base Parkway to I-505 (Ready for Construction) – STA/Caltrans/MTC – INFRA Grant/SB 1/RM 3
- SR 37/Fairgrounds 360 Access Project Fairgrounds Drive (Design phase and Construction/Per MOU) – STA/County/Vallejo/Caltrans – RM 3/STIP/Local Match
- I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange Package 3 (design near completion) STA- RM 3
- I-80 Westbound Truck Scales STA (environmentally cleared)-RM 3
- SR 12/Church (Funding plan developed for design phase) STA/Rio Vista SHOPP/STIP
- SR 37 Segment B (Includes Mare Island Interchange Corridor Study Completed-PID Document Completed/Environmental Document to be initiated per MOU) – Caltrans/MTC/STA/SCTA/NVTA – RM 3
- Jepson Parkway remaining segments City of Vacaville Vacaville STIP/RTIF/TIF

Finally, there are several projects that are included in the OWP, but the initial or next phase of the project is not currently funded in the current two year budget.

- I-80 Express Lanes Project Carquinez Bridge to SR 37
- Jepson Parkway remaining segments located in City of Fairfield
- North Connector West Segment

# TRANSIT CENTERS

In recent years, STA has partnered with local transit operators and cities to improve and upgrade regional transit centers. There are several priority transit centers that the STA has successfully pursued and obtained or programmed federal, state or regional funds for. Several of these projects are fully funded and are either in construction or moving through the project development stage into construction. STA has initiated the design and issued the construction contracts for two new bus stops at the SR 37/Fairgrounds Interchange in FY 2018-19 in preparation for Phase 2 of the SolanoExpress Service Plan.

Several of these projects are initial phases of larger planned transit projects that are not fully funded. The larger, long range transit centers are as follows:

- Vallejo Station Phase B
- Fairfield/Vacaville Rail Station Phase 2 (Station Building)
- Fairfield Transit Center
- Dixon Park and Ride Lot
- Transit Center at Curtola/Lemon Street Future Phases

# **STA PLANNING ACTIVITIES**

The following planning studies are currently underway, funded in the currently proposed budget, and scheduled to be undertaken or completed in FY 2019-20:

- Coordinated Short Range Transit Plan (SRTP)
- Update of Priority Development Area Plans/Coordination with Housing Production Efforts
- Development of Priority Production Areas (Jobs)
- Completion of Solano Older Persons and People with Disabilities Mobility Plan
- Solano Pothole Report

The following plans are scheduled to be considered as part of the two year work plan.

- Update of Safe Routes to Schools Plan
- Emergency Responders and Disaster Preparedness Study
- Coordination with SMART Rail Feasibility Study
- Bus Rapid Transit Plan for I-80/I-680 Corridors

# STA PROGRAMS

Some of the major program milestones this past fiscal year included the following:

- Completed First Full Year of College Fee program for SCC students
- The Solano Mobility Management Call Center handled 1,813 calls through the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of FY 2018-19;
- Implemented new Solano Mobility Website that received 15,716 views from FY 2018-19 with an average of 1,746 views/per month.
- Completion of Fifth Year of In-Person ADA Eligibility Program with over 1,227 individuals assessed in FY 2017-18.
- Implementation of New Ride Amigos Incentive Platform
- Transportation Info Depot at Historic Suisun Amtrak Station with 4,082 customers served in FY 2017-18.
- Developed 11 Successful HSIP Safety Grants for 6 cities totaling \$8.8 million
- Completion of Fifth Annual RTIF Report, RTIF Revenues Passed \$6 million milestone
- 8th Year of STA's Local Preference Policy Implementation with \$2.2 million total local dollars invested in local businesses through June 30, 2018
- STA completed fourth year of managing Solano Intercity Taxi Program which provided 10,035 passenger trips in FY 2017-18.

There are three primary tasks for STA working with the transit operators in FY 2019-20. First will be implementing phase two of the SolanoExpress Service Plan (Red Line) and reviewing the performance measures and ridership in preparation for future service adjustments in FY 2020-21. Second will be completing the expansion of the the Intercity Taxi Scrip Program for Non-Ambulatory Riders through use of a debit card countywide. Finally, STA is preparing to work with all five transit operators to update the Coordinated Short Range Transit Plan (SRTP).

At their meeting of April 23<sup>rd</sup>, the Solano Express Consortium recommended five minor edits to the draft OWP pertaining to the new Solano Express Service, the Intercity Funding Agreement, and the Intercity Taxi Card Program. At their meeting of April 24<sup>th</sup>, the STA TAC approved a recommendation forwarding the draft OWP to the STA Board with the amendments requested by the Consortium.

The next step in the process is for the Board to authorize the draft two year OWP for STA be distributed for review and comment and then agendize the approval of the OWP by the STA Board at the meeting of June 12, 2019.

## **Recommendation:**

Authorize the Executive Director to distribute the STA's Draft Overall Work Plan for FY 2019-20 and FY 2020-21 for review and comment.

# **Background:**

As discussed at the May 2019 STA Board meeting, there are several transportation and land use activities efforts underway related to State legislation, regional and state grant funding and planning at both the region and state level.

At the regional level, the CASA Compact was signed by Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) with caveats for further community dialog on the resulting recommendations. Numerous legislative bills have been introduced this year based on the regional CASA compact and housing. MTC/ABAG also introduced a \$76 million Housing Incentive Pool (HIP) Program which was reduced by \$5 million to allow for suburban counties to develop criteria for a suburban component of this program. The STA took the initiative to develop suburban guidelines for the \$5 million and called it the SubHIP Pilot Program. In addition, MTC is completing perspective papers as part of their Horizons Initiative which includes two papers on regional growth strategies and future jobs production. Each paper has policy implications on Priority Development Areas (PDAs) and the new Priority Production Areas (PPAs), which are newly proposed designations for employment sites near quality transit.

At the state level, numerous housing legislative bills have been introduced as noted in the previous paragraph. The new legislative bills cover new laws related to local and regional land use decisions, streamlining CEQA, renter tenant protection, potential new revenue for housing, and a new housing finance authority for the Bay Area. On the funding side, the State Housing and Community Development (HCD) is releasing the first year of SB2 Building Jobs and Homes Act. Solano County's local agencies were originally estimated to receive close to \$1.4 million in planning funds; however, HCD recently announce a potential 20% increase to these SB 2 planning funds. This fund source is in addition to several other state housing funding sources.

# **Discussion:**

The STA Executive Board directed STA staff to take an active role in tracking housing and employment legislation, policies and funding opportunities at the State and regional level. This is in large part in follow up to the City County Coordinating Council's (4Cs) Housing Summit held on February 25<sup>th</sup>. STA staff has since organized a Transportation Land Use Technical Working Group of staff from the County of Solano, Solano Economic Develop Corporation, LAFCO and several cities to collectively analyze the CASA compact and its impacts to Solano County. This group was also tasked to review and provide feedback on MTC's new Regional Growth Strategies Perspective Paper as well as the upcoming Future of Jobs Perspective Paper. STA staff has also been briefing Solano County's representatives on ABAG, MTC, and a recently formed CASA Compact Subcommittee.

During the months of April and May, STA staff is setting up individual meetings with each city to further discuss:

- Transportation and housing production funding opportunities
- Updates on the CASA Compact and MTC Perspective Papers on housing and jobs production
- Work Tasks for SB 2 Planning Funds and opportunity for both Housing and Transportation Funding
- Status update on their PDA and upcoming PPA
- Update on housing legislation

# **Background:**

Each year, STA staff monitors state and federal legislation that pertains to transportation and related issues. On February 13, 2019, the STA Board approved its 2019 Legislative Platform to provide policy guidance on transportation legislation and the STA's legislative activities during 2019.

Monthly legislative updates are provided by STA's State and Federal lobbyists and are attached for your information (Attachments A, and B). An updated Legislative Bill Matrix listing state bills of interest is available at: <u>https://sta.ca.gov/operations/legislative-program/current/</u>

# **Discussion:**

Assembly Bill 1487 (AB 1487) San Francisco Bay Area Regional Housing Finance Act would establish the Housing Alliance for the Bay Area (HABA) and seeks to raise \$1.5 billion for affordable housing production. On April 19, each STA Board Member signed a letter urging the Assembly Committee on Local Governments and Chair Cecilia Aguiar-Curry to *Seek Amendments* and address the following concerns:

- Guaranteed representation for every county on the HABA Governing Board
- A higher rate of return-to-source funds
- Local determination of project eligibility and funding allocation

In addition, staff testified at the April 24 hearing to reiterate these concerns. The Committee on Local Governments passed AB 1487 and referred the bill to the Assembly Committee on Appropriations with amendments pertaining to governance. Staff will continue to monitor this bill and seek additional opportunities to work with Assembly member Chiu to seek staff recommended amendments.

Assembly Bill 1717 (AB 1717) Transit-Oriented Affordable Housing Funding Program Act would create a tax increment financing tool for multifamily housing development near transit that includes a percentage of affordable housing. Local governments could identify districts (Transit-Oriented Affordable Housing District) within either one-half mile of transit or one-quarter mile that are zoned for multifamily housing. A city could freeze the property tax rate in the district and capture growth of the city's and school district's property tax. The city could transfer this property tax to the State Controller and CalHFA could bond against the property tax. CalHFA will send the money back to the project to fund development of the multifamily housing.

Senate Bill 4 (SB 4) and Senate Bill 50 (SB 50) were combined and under the changes to the new SB 50, counties with populations larger than 600,000 would have to allow four- to five-story apartment buildings near rail lines, and smaller apartments and townhomes near job centers. However, in smaller counties with populations under 600,000, cities would be required to permit height increases near rail one story taller than existing zoning as well as fourplexes in single-family-only areas. Staff will continue to monitor SB 50 for additional amendments.

- AB 847 Transportation finance: priorities: housing Hearing canceled at the request of author
- SB 5 Affordable Housing and Community Development Investment Program Passed Senate Committee on Housing, referred to the Committee on Appropriations

# State Legislative Update (Shaw/Yoder/Antwih, Inc.):

#### RE: STATE LEGISLATIVE UPDATE – May 2019

#### Legislative Update

The Legislature returned from Spring Recess on April 22. Policy committees have until April 26 to hear bills that have a fiscal impact to the state and May 31 marks the house of origin deadline. The Governor will release his update to the proposed budget, the May Revise, around May 14. Many of the bills related to the CASA Compact will be heard and amended in policy committees before April 26 and some will likely be held in the Appropriations Committees in the coming weeks. We are tracking a number of bills for STA, some of which are identified under **Bills of Interest** below.

#### TDA Task Force Underway

Last August, the chairs of the legislative transportation committees, Senator Jim Beall (D-San Jose) and Assembly Member Jim Frazier (D-Antioch) requested the California Transit Association to spearhead a policy task force to examine the Transportation Development Act (TDA). In a letter to the Association, the transportation chairs specifically requested that the task force fully examine TDA's performance measures applicable to the state's public transportation systems, and produce a legislative recommendation for any reforms or changes to the current programs the task force chooses to recommend.

Aiming to complete its report this fall, for possible legislative consideration in 2020, the task force, of which SamTrans is a member, has met twice to date. At its February kickoff meeting, the group adopted guiding principles. Among them is the intent to use this conversation about TDA and public transit to focus not only on how to improve the current TDA performance measures – farebox recovery ratio for LTF; and operating cost per hour operator eligibility criteria for STA Program funds – but also to educate and engage state policymakers on the question of how the state, transit agencies and other stakeholders could collaborate to understand and begin to work towards breaking down the barriers to greater public transportation use in California.

At its March meeting, the task force invited a transit planning consultancy to present an overview of the various trade-offs facing transit governing boards, policymakers and communities – any one of which makes it difficult to pre-determine one performance metric that could be used to measure an agency's progress towards its community's (often disparate) goals. The March meeting also included input from a variety of state-level stakeholders – including associations representing cities, counties, rural planning agencies, and councils of governments; the California State Transportation Agency; Caltrans' Division of Mass Transportation; and, legislative transportation committee consultants staffing Chair Beall and Chair Frazier. The task force also heard presentations from agencies in two regions where local transit operators are facing particularly acute challenges complying with TDA's performance measures.

#### **Bills of Interest**

#### SB 4 (McGuire and Beall) Planning and Zoning for Housing\*

This bill would a neighborhood multifamily project or eligible TOD project to submit an application for a ministerial approval process. The bill would define a "neighborhood multifamily project" to mean a project to construct a multifamily unit of up to 2 residential dwelling units in a nonurban community, as defined, or up to 4 residential dwelling units in an urban community, as defined, that meets local height, setback, and lot coverage zoning requirements as they existed on July 1, 2019. The bill would define an "eligible TOD project" as a project located in an urban community, as defined, that meets specified height requirements, is located within 1/2 mile of an existing or planned transit station parcel or entrance, and meets other floor area ratio, density, parking, and zoning requirements. The bill also requires an eligible TOD project development proponent to develop a plan that ensures transit accessibility to the residents of the development in coordination with the applicable local transit agency. The bill would require specified TOD projects to comply with specified affordability, prevailing wage, and skilled and trained workforce requirements. The bill would also define "eligible parcel" to mean a parcel located within a city or county that has unmet regional housing needs and has produced fewer housing units than jobs over a specified period; is zoned to allow residential use and qualifies as an infill site; is not located within a historic district, coastal zone, very high fire hazard severity zone, or a flood plain; the development would not require the demolition of specified types of affordable housing; the parcel is not eligible for development under existing specified transit-oriented development authorizations; and the parcel in question has been fully reassessed on or after January 1, 2021, to reflect its full cash value.

#### SB 5 (Beall) Local-State Sustainable Investment Incentive Program\*

This bill would establish the Local-State Sustainable Investment Incentive Program, which would be administered by the Sustainable Investment Incentive Committee. The bill would authorize a city, county, city and county, joint powers agency, enhanced infrastructure financing district, affordable housing authority, community revitalization and investment authority or transit village development district to apply to the Committee to participate in the program and would authorize the Committee to approve or deny applications for projects meeting specific criteria. Upon approval of a project application, the bill would require the Committee to issue an order directing the county auditor to reduce the total amount of ad valorem property tax revenue otherwise required to be contributed to the county's ERAF from the applicant by the annual reduction amount approved. The bill would require a county auditor, if the applicant is an enhanced infrastructure financing district, affordable housing authority, transit village development district, or community revitalization investment authority, to transfer to the district or authority an amount of property tax revenue equal to the reduction amount approved by the Committee.

#### SB 50 (Wiener) Planning and Zoning: Housing Development: Equitable Communities Incentives\*

This bill would require a city, county, or city and county to grant upon request an equitable communities incentive when a development proponent seeks and agrees to construct a residential development, as defined, that satisfies specified criteria, including, among other things, that the residential development is either a job-rich housing project or a transit-rich housing project, as those terms are defined; the site does not contain, or has not contained, housing occupied by tenants or accommodations withdrawn from rent or lease in accordance with specified law within specified time periods; and the residential development complies with specified additional requirements under existing law. The bill would require that a residential development eligible for an equitable communities incentive receive waivers from maximum controls on density and automobile parking requirements greater than 0.5 parking spots per unit, up to 3 additional incentives or concessions under the Density Bonus Law, and specified additional

waivers if the residential development is located within a 1/2-mile or 1/4-mile radius of a major transit stop.

# SB 128 (Beall) Enhanced Infrastructure Financing Districts

Existing law authorizes the public financing authority to issue bonds for these purposes upon approval by 55% of the voters voting on a proposal to issue the bonds. This bill would instead authorize the public financing authority to issue bonds for these purposes without submitting a proposal to the voters. The bill would require the resolution to issue bonds to contain specified information related to the issuance of the bonds. *We recommend STA SUPPORT this measure.* 

# SB 137 (Dodd) Federal Transportation Funds: State Exchange Programs

Existing federal law apportions transportation funds to the states under various programs, including the Surface Transportation Program and the Highway Safety Improvement Program, subject to certain conditions on the use of those funds. Existing law provides for the allocation of certain of those funds to local entities. Existing law provides for the exchange of federal and state transportation funds between local entities and the state under certain circumstances. This bill would authorize the Department of Transportation to allow the above-described federal transportation funds that are allocated as local assistance to be exchanged for Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Program funds appropriated to the department. *STA SUPPORTS this bill (February 13 Meeting).* 

# SB 152 (Beall) Active Program Funding

This bill would increase the share of active transportation (ATP) funds dedicated to regional agencies to 75 percent, distributed by population. Currently, regional agencies receive 40 percent of the funding in the ATP funds for distribution. This bill would give MTC additional resources to program for ATP projects. *STA SUPPORTS this bill (April 10 Meeting).* 

# AB 11 (Chiu) Community Redevelopment Law of 2019\*

This bill, the Community Redevelopment Law of 2019, would authorize cities and counties to create agencies that would use tax increment financing to fund affordable housing and infrastructure projects. This bill takes a similar approach to the tax increment financing structure used by the former redevelopment agencies.

# AB 185 (Grayson) HCD at CTC Meetings

Existing law requires the CTC and the State Air Resources Board to hold at least two joint meetings per calendar year to coordinate their implementation of transportation policies. This bill would require the Department of Housing and Community Development to participate in those joint meetings.

# AB 252 (Daly) Caltrans NEPA Delegation

Existing law, until January 1, 2020, provides that the State of California consents to the jurisdiction of the federal courts regarding the compliance, discharge, or enforcement of the responsibilities it assumed as a participant in the program. This bill would extend the operation of these provisions indefinitely. *STA SUPPORTS this bill (March 13 Meeting).* 

# AB 1413 (Gloria) Local Sales Tax Measures

Existing law authorizes, upon approval of two-thirds of the voters, to impose a retail transaction and use tax for specified transportation purposes. This bill would authorize a local agency to impose a tax applicable to only a portion of its county if two-thirds of the voters voting on the measure within the portion of the county to which the tax would apply. *STA SUPPORTS this bill (April 10 Meeting).* 

## AB 1487 (Chiu) Regional Housing Funding\*

This bill would enact the San Francisco Bay Area Regional Housing Finance Act and establish the Housing Alliance for the Bay Area (HABA), a regional entity governed by members of MTC and ABAG. HABA would be tasked with establishing a regional funding program to address housing needs in the Bay Area. The funding source is unspecified and left to HABA to determine what's likely to meet the region's needs and garner voter-approval. A portion of the revenues would be returned to each county and a portion would be controlled by HABA. *STA is SEEKING AMENDMENTS to this bill.* 

# AB 1568 (McCarty) Loss of Transportation Funding for Failure to Meet Housing Production Targets

This bill would require HCD to review each production report submitted by a city or county in to determine if that city or county has met the applicable minimum housing production goal for the reporting period. If a local agency fails to meet their production targets, the bill would prohibit the entity from applying for certain state grants, including the Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program. *STA OPPOSES this measure (April 10 Meeting).* 

# ACA 1 (Aguiar-Curry) Local Government Financing: Affordable Housing and Public Infrastructure: Voter Approval.

This constitutional amendment would lower the necessary voter threshold from a two-thirds supermajority to 55 percent to approve local general obligation bonds and special taxes for affordable housing and public infrastructure projects. *STA SUPPORTS this measure (January 9 Meeting).* 

Bills marked with an \* are being tracked by MTC as implementing elements of the CASA Compact. These bills are not sponsored by MTC. The above list does not include all bills MTC has identified as others are included in the attached matrix.

During the month of April we monitored developments in Washington and brought them to the attention of STA staff. We also planned the STA delegation trip to Washington, D.C. scheduled for April 30 and May 1.

# **Infrastructure Outlook**

Transportation Secretary Elaine Chao testified before the Senate Appropriations Committee on March 27 on the Department of Transportation's budget request for fiscal year fiscal year 2020. Chao told the Committee that she and President Trump would support restoring earmarks if that would help Congress pass infrastructure legislation. As we previously reported, House Transportation Committee Chairman Peter DeFazio (D-OR) and Ranking Member Sam Graves (R-MO) have both voiced support for earmarks in the authorizing legislation.

Chao told the Committee that the Trump Administration will consult with Congress before proposing a new infrastructure proposal. She reiterated that the Administration would consider supporting an increase of the gas tax to fund infrastructure. She also renewed the Administration's commitment to cutting red tape for project approvals and attracting private sector funding from pension funds and endowments. Chao also recommended that Congress use the surface transportation reauthorization bill as a vehicle for a broader infrastructure package rather than try to negotiate two bills in a compressed timeframe.

On April 10, Chao testified before the House Transportation, Housing, and Urban Development Appropriations Subcommittee. Chairman David Price (D-NC) said in his opening remarks that the Trump Administration is not a "serious partner" on infrastructure and criticized proposed cuts to transit grants.

Senate Environment and Public Works Committee Chairman John Barrasso (R-WY) has announced that the Committee plans to move a transportation authorization bill before August. He said that the Senate will not begin to consider a broader infrastructure package until it passes a surface transportation bill. House Transportation Committee Chairman DeFazio criticized this approach, arguing that an accelerated timeline indicates that the legislation would be a "status quo" bill that does not provide a funding solution. Contrary to Barrasso's timeline, DeFazio said

that he believes Congress will first pass an infrastructure package that provides a funding mechanism and contains a "few minor tweaks" to the authorizations and then will consider a six-year surface transportation reauthorization bill.

As we have reported, House Democratic leadership has reserved floor time to consider infrastructure legislation this spring. Nevertheless, there will need to be bipartisan agreement regarding funding and policy and support from the White House to advance an infrastructure bill. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) and Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) said they have reached an agreement to meet with President Trump in the next few weeks to discuss infrastructure.

# **Federal Grants**

On April 1, the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) issued Notices of Funding Opportunity for two grant programs to prevent human trafficking and other crimes that occur on public transportation. The Innovations in Transit Public Safety program will provide funds to assist transit agencies with identifying and adopting measures to address public safety, including crime prevention and operator assault. This funding is available to transit operators. The Crime Prevention and Public Safety Awareness program will support public safety awareness campaigns for transit systems. However, applicants for this program are limited to non-profit organizations that have experience with crime prevention. The two programs will award \$2 million each. Applications for both grants are due May 28.

On April 16, the Department of Transportation announced the availability of \$900 million in funding for Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) grants. The maximum grant award is \$25 million and no single state can receive more than \$90 million in funds. Funds will be split evenly between urban and rural areas. Up to \$15 million can be used for planning, preparation, and design. The deadline for applications is July 15.

# Federal Transit Administration Joint Development Proposed Changes

The FTA has proposed changes to existing guidance on joint development projects using FTA funds or FTA-funded property. The agency aims to increase flexibility for project sponsors to pursue joint development projects, reduce FTA oversight of joint development agreements negotiated between project sponsors and their partners, and streamline FTA's project eligibility review process.

The FTA would no longer define a minimum revenue threshold, or set a monetary requirement from a joint development project for transit purposes. The agency said it believes that defining a

fair share of revenue minimum threshold unnecessarily limits the pool of potential projects by reducing flexibility for project sponsors and their partners to determine what amounts to a fair share of revenue. However, the project sponsor would still be required to report on the amount and source of the revenue it will receive. The FTA also would eliminate the requirement that project sponsors submit a baseline market analysis and certificate of compliance as part of their formal project proposals.

Public comments are due by June 3.

# **Surface Transportation Security**

The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) announced the creation of a new surface transportation advisory panel on April 8. The panel will consist of 35 voting members, including representatives from local transit operators and a representative from the American Public Transportation Association. The panel will also have 14 non-voting members representing the Departments of Defense, Energy, Homeland Security, and Transportation as well as the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the National Transportation Safety Board. The advisory group will be broken down into five subpanels, including one on mass transit and passenger rail.

TSA Administrator David Pekoske testified before the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Homeland Security that the Agency's surface transportation division will soon separate its policy office from its operations office. He also said the division's director will be given direct control over surface transportation inspectors. Pekoske said that TSA should increase its emphasis on surface transportation but said it is unclear what the agency's "available pool of resources" will be in the future.

# **Administration Personnel**

The Senate confirmed Nicole Nason to lead the Federal Highway Administration on March 28. She current serves as an assistant secretary at the State Department. Nason previously served as an assistant secretary at the Transportation Department, as administrator of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, and at CBP.

Dan DeBono joined the Transportation Department as chief infrastructure funding officer in early April. He will oversee the infrastructure financing and grant programs such as INFRA, BUILD, and the Build America Bureau. He previously worked for several private sector finance firms. # **Background:**

The Yolo Solano Air Quality Management District (YSAQMD) provides funding for projects that reduce motor vehicle air pollution in the Yolo Solano Air Basin through the YSAQMD Clean Air Funds program. Funding for this program is collected through a \$4 fee on all motor vehicle registrations within the Air District's boundaries, as well as a special property tax assessed on Solano County properties located in the YSAQMD. YSAQMD administers the grant program, and partners with STA to create a joint application screening committee to recommend funding for projects in Solano County.

The Solano County communities eligible to apply for YSAQMD Clean Air Funds are the Cities of Dixon, Rio Vista, and Vacaville, as well as the eastern half of unincorporated Solano County. Applications are distributed and collected by the YSAQMD for projects in both Solano and Yolo counties. STA and YSAQMD staff jointly review the applications for Solano County projects, and together, make a recommendation to a screening committee. The screening committee recommendations are forwarded to the YSAQMD Board for final action.

# **Discussion:**

For the FY 2019-20, there was \$340,000 in Clean Air Funds available through the YSAQMD.

Five applications were submitted for funding:

- 1) City of Rio Vista 1980 Case 80C Tractor Replacement
- 2) River Delta Unified School District Vehicle Replacement (Truck/Tractor)
- 3) Solano County Timms Road Bike Improvements
- 4) Rio Vista Delta Breeze Rio Vista Bus Shelter
- 5) Solano Transportation Authority Solano SR2S Mico-Grant Program

The Solano Clean Air Funds Application Review Committee met on Wednesday, April 17th to review the application requests and the staff recommendation. Committee participants included Donald Roos of Rio Vista, Dilenna Harris of Vacaville, and John Vasquez of Solano County. All five applicants took the opportunity to make presentations regarding their funding request to the Committee and answer follow-up questions.

STA and YSAQMD staff provided a joint staff recommendation to the Committee (Attachment A) which gives the Committee a starting point for discussion. The Committee came to consensus on to approve the funding as recommended. The recommendation will go on to the YSAQMD Board meeting for adoption.

# **Fiscal Impact:**

Should the committee recommendation be approved by the YSAQMD Board, STA will receive, and program through a funding agreement \$60,000 to provide funds towards the SR2S Micro-Grant Pilot Program for Eastern Solano schools.

### **Background:**

Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) is in the process of updating the region's long range plan, Plan Bay Area 2050. The Plan Bay Area 2050 will outline how the Bay Area can meet its transportation needs through 2050 while preserving the character of its diverse communities and adapting to future population growth.

Plan Bay Area 2050 is a state-mandated, integrated long-range transportation and land use plan. As required by Senate Bill 375, all metropolitan regions in California must complete a Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) as part of a Regional Transportation Plan. In the Bay Area, MTC and ABAG are jointly responsible for developing and adopting a SCS that integrates transportation, land use and housing to meet greenhouse gas reduction targets set by the California Air Resources Board. The region adopted its previous plan, Plan Bay Area 2040 in July 2017. Plan Bay Area 2040 updated the planning assumptions and incorporate key economic, demographic, and financial trends from the original Plan Bay Area (adopted in 2013).

The Plan Bay Area 2050 document will include planning for the long term transit needs for the region. MTC is asking transit operators to project service levels, operating costs and revenues for use in establishing transit operating needs for the Plan Bay Area 2050.

#### **Discussion:**

On March 28, 2019 MTC released the Plan Bay Area 2050 Transit Operating Needs Assessment workbook (Attachment A) to begin the Transit Needs Assessment process. The goal is to have the data collected from the transit operators by June 14, 2019 for analysis during the summer with the full assessment completed by September 2019.

MTC's Transit Needs Assessment process will focus on transit operating costs, revenues, and maintenance levels. MTC will estimate the funding required to operate and maintain existing transit services over the 31 year plan period based on input received from transit operators as part of the needs assessment process. On the cost side, the analysis has two components: operating and maintenance costs, and capital replacement and rehabilitation costs. The estimate of needs includes the cost to maintain transit capital assets at their current levels as well as maintain existing service levels for public transit. On the revenue side, the analysis includes revenues that are committed to transit operating or capital costs by law or MTC or transit agency policy, and discretionary funds that are allocated to transit operating or capital needs by MTC or Congestion Management Agencies (CMAs), now called County Transportation Agencies (CTA). William Bacon from MTC provided details and answered questions regarding this assessment at the April Consortium meeting.

**<u>Fiscal Impact:</u>** No immediate fiscal impact at this time; however, it may impact future funding.

### **Background:**

The Solano Transportation Authority (STA) administers the Abandoned Vehicle Abatement (AVA) Program for Solano County. These administrative duties include disbursing funds collected by the State Controller's Office from the Department of Motor Vehicle (DMV) vehicle registration fee of \$1 per registered vehicle, using the funding formula of 50% based on population and 50% on vehicles abated.

The AVA Member Agencies for Solano County are the City of Benicia, City of Dixon, City of Fairfield, City of Rio Vista, City of Suisun City, City of Vacaville, City of Vallejo, and County of Solano.

#### **Discussion:**

For the Second Quarter, STA received the allocation from the State Controller's Office in the amount of \$96,813.73 and has deducted \$2,904.41 for administrative costs. The STA disbursed cost reimbursement to member agencies for the Second Quarter in the total amount of \$84,355.70. The remaining AVA fund balance after the Second Quarter disbursement to the member agencies is \$9,553.62.

Attachment A is a matrix summarizing the AVA Program activities through the Second Quarter FY 2018-19 and is compared to the total FY 2017-18 numbers of abated vehicles and cost reimbursements submitted by the members of the Solano County's AVA Program. This matrix shows total program activities at 57% compared to the FY 2017-18.

The Cities of Benicia, Dixon and Vallejo are on course to meet or exceed FY 2017-18 total vehicles abated.

STA held the Annual AVA Program meeting on Wednesday March 20, 2019 to discuss the AVA program overview, policies and ordinance codes updates, FY 2016-17 through FY 2018-19 statistics and program process. Member Agencies (Dixon, Fairfield, Suisun City, Vacaville, Vallejo, and Solano County) were able to attend.
