





Local Road Safety Plan Solano Transportation Authority Crash Locations by Local Jurisdiction in Solano County


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







2. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

3. OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC & STAFF COMMENTS

Robert Guerrero thanked members for joining both in person and via zoom remotely.

4. CONSENT CALENDAR

A. STA BAC MEETING MINUTES

<u>Recommendation:</u> Approve STA BAC Meeting Minutes of March 3, 2022. On a motion by Barbara Wood, and second by Mr. Segala, the STA BAC approved Consent Calendar Items. (5 Ayes) Neil Iverson join meeting virtual

5. PRESENTATIONS

A. PDA Investment and Growth Strategy

Robert Guerrero summarized reports STA recently submitted to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) on Priority Development Area (PDA) Investments and Growth Strategy for Solano County. Working with planning directors and public works for each jurisdiction, excluding Dixon and Rio Vista which do not have PDA designations. Reports included a list of completed and future transportation projects and housing developments in each of the PDAs. Mr. Guerrero highlighted the progress each city has been making in their Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) allocations. To meet regional goals, MTC is focusing on concentrating funds to PDAs. Mr. Guerrero provided an overview of the city fact sheets. Mr. Guerrero concluded Dixon and Rio Vista have Priority Production Areas (PPA) to help with allocating infrastructure funds in future funding opportunities.

Discussion on the process of RHNA allocation being determined by state for counties to accommodate housing units. Concerns were indicated by members on housing placement and considerations.

B. Federal Transportation Bill Update

Vince Ma provided an update on state and federal legislation that pertains to transportation and related issues. He highlighted competitive programs in the bill that STA plans on applying for such as congestion and other related transit programs once the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) opens. STA is continuing to track these funding opportunities and plans on pursuing funding for active transportation projects. Local jurisdictions are also being encouraged to have shovel-ready projects for these opportunities. Mr. Ma indicated that although bill has been authorized, funds have yet to be appropriated for distribution. Mr. Ma discussed STA's draft list of priority projects for federal funding, which includes SR-37/Fairgrounds Drive, I-505/Vaca Valley and Solano Express Electrification. Additionally, STA is prioritizing the Canon Road Overcrossing Project in Fairfield and the Parkway Boulevard Overcrossing Project in Dixon for the Rail Crossing Elimination Program. Additionally, Mr. Ma highlighted the Active Transportation Infrastructure Investment Program and Safe Streets & Roads for All Program to help local governments implement vision zero policies. Mr. Guerrero concluded staff is still waiting for more details on grants and funding requirements and guidelines.

V-Chair Belef requested clarification on TRICP application regarding Capitol Corridor rail, Mr. Ma indicated staff applied for infrastructure funds to electrify local transit routes. Mr. Segala requested list of funding opportunity presented by Mr. Ma. Vice- Chair requested Acronyms to be included in Packet. The acronyms list has been provided in the packet.

C. Solano Connected Mobility

Brent Rosenwald stated STA is currently developing the Solano Mobility Implementation Plan to identify and improve multi-modes of transportation between residents, desired destinations, and overall experience. STA is currently conducting surveys online and attending pop up events across the county to develop benchmarks and metrics to evaluate STA's existing programs and services and what to improve moving forward. The incentive for public to fill survey is a ten-dollar clipper card for all bay area transit systems, excluding Amtrak Capital Corridor. Committee members suggested outreach to major employers for feedback from employees and cities with newsletters to be included in their respected cities. Mr. Rosenwald passed these comments along to Anthony Adams the project manager for the Connected Mobility Plan.

8. INFORMATIONAL ITEMS- NO DISCUSSION

A. Solano Bike Month Update/Planning

Amy Antunano announced May is regionally known as Bike Month. Staff has decided, with numbers improving from covid, this year to hold some events across county. Currently with 146 active riders, the Commute Solano Platform will be conducting a challenge to engage current riders and hopefully register more riders. The challenge will be to log 5 days of riding in May to receive a \$25-gift certificate. Ms. Antunano added community bike rides will also be had and requested suggestions from members for new event or any ideas. May 20th is official Bike to Workday, which will be celebrated by giving away bags and a raffle reward at the STA building and Suisun Train Depot Amtrak. Ms. Antunano concluded nominations are open for Bike Commuter of the Year. Barbara Wood suggested Vallejo Ferry Building Bike Energizing Station and requested STA staff to help support. Ms. Antunano mentioned that STA staff would be there to help support that effort. Mr. Belef offered to hold a community bike ride and suggested advertising on the Solano County Fairgrounds billboard.

B. OBAG 3 Update and Schedule

Kathrina Gregana provided an overview of MTC's One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) Cycle 3 Program. She outlined the criteria elements for the program, including: the 50% investment target to PDAs and rewarding cities and counties approving new housing construction and allocating funds through RHNA. MTC has emphasized extra points to direct investments to projects that advance equity and active transportation projects, which are key areas of focus in Plan Bay Area 2050. She continued to describe the timeline for the OBAG cycle 3: Call for projects in May, project submittals in June, STA board workshop in July, and projects nominations dur to MTC in September. MTC project selection will be determined in January of 2023. Ms. Gregana encouraged BAC members to review ATP chapters in respective jurisdictions for those listed projects that are eligible for OBAG. She highlighted the "5 in 5" projects list in which outreach was held to the public and interested stakeholders that identified the top five priorities for the next five years, which included map and cost of projects.

C. MTC Complete Streets Checklist

Brent Rosenwald provided overview of MTC's Complete Streets (CS) Policy, where all projects applying to receive funding from MTC are required to submit a CS Checklist that demonstrates consideration of pedestrian and bicycle access in the projects design process. He added MTC CS policy and checklist are being updated to ensure consistency with Plan Bay Area 2050 goals. MTC has solicited STAs feedback of CS Checklist proposed changes, staff is waiting on clarification on regional and local standpoints for defining consistent projects with MTC. Mr. Rosenwald outlined changes to the attached checklist, highlighting Mobility Hub Access, a priority area that utilizes and supports micro mobility. Currently the checklist is only being discussed within MTC and CTAs. **Mr. Segala asked for clarification on what would be needed to create a Mobility Hub, designated parking, or space for micro mobility devices. Vice-Chair Belef suggested changes to CS of adding URL, detours while construction, and input from review**

PBAC review. Mr. Rosenwald relayed all these comments to Kara Oberg, MTC lead for Active Transportation.

D Upcoming Funding Sources

Brent Rosenwald outlined the expected funding from the TDA Article 3 and TFCA over the next 4-year OBAG cycle. STA anticipates receiving another \$2 million dollars from the TDA Article 3 program and \$1 Million dollars from the TFCA fund program. With this amount of funds available, STA staff plans on considering these grant monies to craft a multi-year funding plan for projects in parallel to the OBAG 3 funding process. YSAQMD awarded Vacaville with 30K for EV effort project. Rio Vista was not awarded YSAQMD this round, staff plans to request STA Board support of project for next round.

E ATP Amendment Process Update

Mr. Rosenwald indicated the call for projects closed on Monday February 28th and 30 projects were submitted by the seven cities and county. He briefly went over number of projects for each city and county and their locations.

Discussion was had on proposed Class II lanes on rural county road and for the county to consider converting them to Class I. Mr. Pyle indicated that many roads are narrow, and many property owners do not want to sell their property to widen bike lanes. Mr. Iverson noted that class II bike lanes on these roads would be unsafe. Mr. Pyle indicated that he would revise the list to mention that the Class I Bike Lane configuration could be explored on these roads. This change has been incorporated by Mr. Rosenwald on the ATP Projects list going to the May Board meeting.

9. COMMITTEE ROUND TABLE DISCUSSION

Mr. Segala mentioned Amtrak added a new sign to the train depot building in Suisun and requested they put the same one on the other side facing the street to encourage with ridership. Vice-Chair Belef provided number of updates regarding city of Vallejo. Bike Vallejo giving away bikes, new bike rack at City Hall and Library, and Sacramento St. project is almost complete.

A. Xplore Solano and OuterSpatial App Update (Kathrina Gregana, STA)


In April 2021, STA staff engaged in a discussion with the PAC on potentially utilizing a mobile app medium to digitally enhance the paper-based Top 10 Hikes & Walks brochure. STA staff presented trail app options that are currently in the market that could be explored. Because of the closed-source nature of the app that provided greater quality control over the trails and parks content, PAC expressed the most interest in the Outerspatial app.

In July 2021, the STA partnered with Solano Land Trust, Solano County Office of Education, the cities of Fairfield and Vacaville, the Greater Vallejo Recreation District (GVRD), and Solano County Parks on a countywide effort to get trails, parks, recreation areas, and open spaces in Solano County on the Outerspatial mobile app. This effort and the Solano community in the Outerspatial platform was collectively named, Xplore Solano.

STA staff and representatives from Outerspatial will provide an update on the efforts around Xplore Solano and provide a live demonstration of the mobile app. STA staff would like to get feedback from BAC members on the mobile application and parks and trails identified and how the Xplore Solano could be best promoted throughout the County.

<u>A.</u> One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) Cycle 3 Update (Kathrina Gregana, STA)

In 2012, MTC consolidated federal transportation funds, which include the Surface Transportation Program (STP) and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ), with Local Streets and Roads (LS&R), bicycle, pedestrian, and Planning funds into a single program known as the One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) Program. Every four to five years, MTC develops policies about how the region will use this funding for projects and programs. The process for OBAG Cycle 3 is set to commence in the next few months and the STA is currently gearing up to engage member agencies on their potential project priorities.

MTC recently approved the OBAG 3 framework (included as Attachment A) and provided an implementation schedule for the county program. STA staff will provide an update on the framework and schedule as well as discuss the role of advisory committees in the OBAG 3 cycle and the process of nominating a committee project/program priority.

<u>B.</u> ATP Amendment Process Update (Robert Guerrero, STA)

The 2020 Solano Active Transportation Plan, an element of the County Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP) focuses on the County's bike and pedestrian network. The Plan builds upon previous active transportation planning efforts and consolidates Solano Transportation Authority's Countywide Bicycle, Pedestrian, Safe Routes to School, and Safe Routes to Transit Plans into one cohesive Plan. The Plan establishes countywide priorities and provides project lists and program guidance.

Since adoption of the 2020 Active Transportation Plan, STA staff has conducted outreach to the seven cities and county to determine each entities priority bike and pedestrian projects for TDA Article 3 funding, Transportation Funds for Clean Air (TFCA) and other forthcoming grants. The goal of this outreach was to formulate a program that would align the goals of STA and its member agencies to create a transparent funding and implementation timeline. During these discussions, member agency staff have frequently identified several local projects that they would like to advance for funding that are not included in the ATP. Due to the fact that their exclusion from the plan deems them ineligible for TDA funding and less competitive for regional grants, STA staff determined that amending the original plan to include new projects is necessary. Additionally, STA staff has noted that the ATP contains some discrepancies between the individual jurisdiction's projects lists and the countywide SR2S projects list. Since most of the projects on the SR2S list inherently enhance bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure, the amendment process will establish consistency between both documents.

The ATP amendment period closed on February 28th. STA staff received over 30 new project submissions from its member agencies (For a full list of submissions please refer to Attachment A).

In order to evaluate each submission, STA used the same criteria for scoring that was included in the 2020 ATP and approved by the STA board. These criteria are: connectivity, school access, transit access, proximity to Equity Priority Communities, secured funding, proximity to MTC Designated Geographies, and recreational trail access

STA planning staff solicited comments on the new submittals from the representatives of the Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC) and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC). Additionally, STA staff presented these projects to the TAC at their March 2022 meeting and allowing for a 3-week comment period. Now that the feedback on these comments have been received and reviewed, STA staff is bringing forward the projects for adoption at the April TAC and May STA board meeting.

C. BAC Field Trip Planning (Kathrina Gregana, STA)

As part of the BAC's overall work plan for 2022, the committee is scheduled to embark on a field tour of recently completed bicycle and pedestrian projects. STA staff recommends that the sites they visit should correspond with projects that they approved for TDA Article 3 funding. The BAC members will work to plan the dates of the tour.

The following projects are potential stops on the tour:

- City of Vallejo's ATP Cycle 2 SR2S Infrastructure Project
- City of Benicia's Panorama Drive Safety Project
- City of Suisun's Railroad Avenue Bike Lanes
- SR2S Cycle Microgrant Projects



- Compliance with current state laws governing surplus lands, density bonus, and accessory dwelling units, including the Housing Accountability Act
- Compliance with regional Complete Streets policy & checklist, and state LRSP

CMAQ Process

For all projects seeking CMAQ funding, MTC will:

- Assess emissions benefits and costeffectiveness of projects prior to project selection
- Document CMAQ programming process in OBAG 3 resolution


