3. OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC & STAFF COMMENTS

Jasper Alve highlighted the STA's efforts in developing a Countywide Local Road Safety Plan (LRSP), the foundation to the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP). He also discussed the upcoming HSIP Cycle 11 grant program, with grant program guidelines anticipated to be released in the Summer/Fall of 2022. Mr. Alve shared that Solano member agencies successfully received a total of \$1.75 million in the last cycle, HSIP Cycle 10, with a maximum of \$250,000 awarded to each jurisdiction for pedestrian crossing enhancements. Lastly, Mr. Alve pointed out for PAC members that there are maps included in the meeting packet of identified hotspots of accidents and fatalities in each city as part of the LRSP effort. These maps will be used as the basis for identifying potential HSIP projects.

Kathrina Gregana shared that STA staff is currently building a collection of hiking and biking photos throughout Solano County for marketing uses and to input into the Outerspatial app. To help with this effort, she requested PAC members to send STA staff their photos of their bike rides and hikes/walks in their neighborhoods.

Ms. Gregana added that the PAC Field Tour will be scheduled in the Fall, with the objective of touring completed and in-progress bicycle and pedestrian projects throughout the County that were funded with Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3 funds.

4. CONSENT CALENDAR

A. STA PAC MEETING MINUTES

Steve Olry requested STA staff to correct how his name was spelled in *Agenda Item 5*. *A Federal Transportation Bill Update*

On a motion with the amended correction by Joe Green-Heffern and a second by Teri Booth, the STA PAC approved Consent Calendar Items (6 Ayes)

5. PRESENTATIONS

A. Xplore Solano and OuterSpatial App Update

Kathrina Gregana started off the item by summarizing the Solano countywide effort to launch Xplore Solano through the OuterSpatial application. She shared that this work has been in partnership with various agencies and organizations in the County, including Solano Land Trust, City of Fairfield, the Greater Vallejo Recreation District (GVRD), Solano County Office of Education, Solano County Parks, and City of Vacaville.

Following, Ryan Branciforte and Zach Lock from OuterSpatial provided a live demo of the app features and navigating the application for organizations and users.

Ms. Booth suggested adding the acknowledgement of indigenous lands into the app and Dr. Dooley suggested to consider adding local cities' Active Transportation Plan routes into the application.

6. ACTION NON- FINANCIAL

None

7. INFORMATIONAL ITEMS- DISCUSSION

A. Solano Bike Month Update/Planning

Amy Antunano shared the various events and challenges that the STA will be launching as part of International Bike Month in May. She highlighted the Bike Month Challenge starting on May 1st and encouraged committee members to create an account on Commute Solano <u>www.commuterinfo.net</u> to participate for a chance to win prizes. She added that Bike Month events will also be occurring in the cities of Vallejo and Benicia and Solano Land Trust will be hosting guided bike tours every 1st Saturday of the month. She mentioned two other bike related events: the STA will be tabling energizer stations throughout the County to celebrate Bike to Work Day at the end of May and Safe Routes to School staff will be partnering with schools to promote Bike to School Day. She ended by highlighting the Bike Month table that will be placed in the lobby of the STA building to promote flyers of the events and challenges that are occurring for the month.

B. One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) Cycle 3 Update

Kathrina Gregana provided an overview of the background and framework of the One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) Program, with the OBAG Cycle 3 County Program having \$15.11 million available for the Call for Projects process. Staff is working with each jurisdiction in preparation for the call of process. PAC committee members will select a priority project or program as a committee to forward recommendation to Board. Ms. Gregana highlighted the OBAG 3 evaluation criteria attached for project submittals. Project sponsors will need to comply by December 31st, 2023, with various policy requirements related to housing, complete streets, and safety plans; Additionally, if project reach grant request greater than 250K and if the city meets local match of 11.4% of total project cost. Point allocation of criteria has yet to be determined but followed MTC's guidelines. STA will create a list of nominations to regionally compete with bay area counties and MTC will select nominated projects. Criteria and timeframe are set to go to Board for approval this month. Call for projects are due June 30th, once submit, Staff will hold a joint meeting for sponsors to present projects/programs proposals to Advisory Committees first week of July, followed by special meeting for each advisory committee, STA Board July 13th will hold a workshop for sponsors to present proposals to board members and different organizations throughout county.

C. ATP Amendment Process Update

Brent Rosenwald summarized the STA's ATP Amendment process and shared that during the Call for Projects, which was open from Fall of 2021 through February 28th, STA staff received 39 new proposed project additions from member agencies. He went on to say that the list of submittals were submitted to the PAC and BAC for their feedback, with the deadline for comments on April 20th.

In response to a question about the criteria used to add projects to the ATP, Mr. Rosenwald clarified that although there are projects that may not meet some criteria, staff thought it was important to still include all projects in the ATP amendment to reflect potential immediate projects raised by member agencies along with future transformative projects. He added that while projects will be added to the ATP plans, prioritization may shift. Mr. Heffern- Green mentioned pedestrian and bike crossing should be prioritized for larger projects involving interstate and highway crossings.

8. INFORMATIONAL ITEMS - NO DISCUSSION

A. TDA Article 3 – Future Funding Forecast

Brent Rosenwald briefly shared that STA anticipates receiving another \$2 million dollars from the TDA Article 3 program. He continued that staff will be considering these funds to craft a multi-year funding plan for their projects in parallel to the OBAG 3 funding process.

9. STANDING ITEMS

A. State Route (SR)-37 Public Access

Ms. Gregana provided an update on the efforts around the SR-37 Public Access Plan. She began by highlighting Senate Bill 1050 by Senator Dodd currently moving through the state legislative process that seeks authorization to toll SR-37 to pay for the Ultimate Project. She explained that the bill includes language stating that the generated toll revenue can be used for public access projects adjacent to SR- 37. She said that the bill passed Senate Transportation and is headed to Senate Government Organization Committee. On another front, she shared that the environmental documents for the SR-37 Interim Project are anticipated to be released in August, which will be followed by the permitting process. She continued by saying that the discussion on mitigation funds for public access projects will occur at the permitting stage and STA staff will continue to advocate for Solano County public access projects for those mitigation funds

10. COMMITTEE ROUNDTABLE

Kevin McNamara noted that on Harris Rd near an open field in the City Rio Vista, they are currently building a sidewalk that is only halfway down the street. He requested staff to help assist and encourage city to extend the sidewalk to the full length of the street.

2. PRESENTATIONS

A. Proposed Pedestrian Safety Projects

Anthony Adams provided an overview of DKS consultants findings of high priority projects in Solano County concerning Local Road and Safety Plan efforts. These projects were prioritized by frequency and severity of recent crashes in each location. Mr. Adams stated each city may receive a maximum of \$250,000 in HSIP set-sides to assist in funding pedestrians' improvements with minor cement work. STA staff is in the final stages of completing a Local Road Safety Plan (LRSP) for each member agency.

3. INFORMATIONAL ITEMS – DISCUSSION

- A. Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) Cycle 6 Pedestrian Priority Projects Anthony Adams asked PAC members for their input on potential pedestrian safety project ideas that can be considered for the HSIP applications for jurisdictions from their local knowledge of their communities. Members suggested the following improvements in each city:
 - Benicia- State Recreation connection to Military St.
 - Suisun- Restriping around schools,
 - Rio Vista- SR12 crossing, restriping around schools,


• Vallejo-Wilson Ave, anywhere on Broadway, Lemon and Magazine St., Nebraska St near schools

4. ADJOURMENT

Proposed ideas for use of Benicia HSIP set-aside funds Nancy Lund, Diane Dooley and Bob Berman Members STA PAC and BAC

1. Improved crosswalk across Military East/West at 1st Street/Solano Square with flashing light and pedestrian island.

This intersection is ranked as one of the Benicia intersections with frequent crashes involving pedestrians and/or bicyclists. Pedestrians are at risk because they are not well visualized by cars turning right onto Military and the cars turning left from Solano Square are focused on the cars coming north on 1st St. We propose exploring a right-hand turn lane for cars turning right onto Military East from 1st Street with a pedestrian island to protect pedestrians crossing Military. This would be like the right-hand turn/pedestrian island on the other side of 1st St. Another option is a modified bulb out like ones on 1st street.



 Crosswalk with flashing beacon at the end of Military West at the intersection of the 780 freeway ramps and State Recreation Area, along with pedestrian/biking pathway to West K St. Extension of bike lane along Military West with dashed lines as they turn left onto West K.

This is a dangerous area for bikers and pedestrians. Pedestrians parking on the north side of Military West have no crosswalk to cross Military. Bikers are left stranded at that intersection by a discontinued bike lane along Military West. People parking on K Street frequently jaywalk instead of going up to the crosswalks near the freeway off and on ramps. We would like to see

- a crosswalk across Military at the Family Health Center

- a path through the public property adjacent to the Family Health Center that continues on to West K St

a crosswalk across West K that connects with the crosswalk across Military West
 a continuation of the bike lane with dashed lines as riders turn from Military West to
 West K St.



3. Crosswalk and flashing light on Drolette Way between Goettel Ct. and Military West at the planned exit for school traffic leaving Mary Farmar Elementary.

This has always been a dangerous site with school children and families running across the street, avoiding cars at school start and finish times. There is poor visualization of the children and families crossing the street because of parked cars. It will be more hazardous once BUSD continues the planned school road through the campus so that cars can exit on to Drolette. It might also require a restriction that cars can only turn right from the driveway of the campus.



4. Additional crosswalks at the intersection of Rose Drive and Panorama Drive.

This intersection has a crosswalk on the East side of the intersection when crossing Rose Drive and a crosswalk across Panorama on the North side. A mailbox and a bus stop are both located on the West side of the intersection. School children would also be most likely to cross this intersection on the West side, closest to Matthew Turner Elementary. We recommend adding cross walks to the West side of this intersection, as well as across Panorama Drive to complete the intersection with four crosswalks.



5. Repair of the Bike bridge extension over the 780 Freeway at Rose Drive

This bike bridge had unequal settling of the two sides of the pathway, resulting in a significant ridge within the walk/bikeway and a serious accident due to the central ridge. Cones were placed there a few years ago, but the danger persists until the pathway can be leveled and the ridge in the middle is removed or flattened.

<u>A.</u> <u>Highway Safety Improvement Program Cycle 11 (Josh Pilachowski, DKS and Kathrina</u> <u>Gregana, STA)</u>

The HSIP Program is a competitive grant program for safety projects that is administered by Caltrans with the goal of reducing fatalities and serious injuries on all public roadways in California. HSIP Cycle 11 includes \$100 million in available funding, with up to \$250,000 in Pedestrian Set-Aside Funding that may be available to each member agency. Eligible project types include pedestrian safety improvements crossing components, such as striping, rectangular rapid-flashing beacons (RRFBs), curb bulb outs or curb ramps.

Over the last few months, STA staff and the consultant for this work, DKS Associates, have been coordinating with our member agencies on their potential HSIP projects. The goal was to submit one Benefit/Cost Ratio (B/C Ratio) application and one (1) Set-Aside application for each city (BCR refers to a calculation to quantify project costs against safety-related benefits of the proposed project). Back in June, staff also garnered feedback from the PAC to determine potential locations to consider for Pedestrian Set Aside funding. The STA submitted the Solano HSIP Cycle 11 applications on September 12th. Funding awards are anticipated to be announced in 2023.

Attachment A provides the list of applications for HSIP Cycle 11 from each incorporated jurisdiction in the County. There are 11 set-aside applications: six pedestrian, two bikes, one guardrail, and one edgeline. There are also seven B/C Ratio applications.

STA staff will provide an update on HSIP Cycle 11 and the applications that were submitted.

B. One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) Cycle 3 Funding Recommendations and Next Steps (Kathrina Gregana, STA)

The third cycle of the One Bay Area Grant, called OBAG 3, covers Fiscal Years (FYs) 2022-23 through 2025-26. There is a funding target of \$15.11 million available for eligible transportation priority programs and projects in Solano County, which establishes the maximum funding request that STA may submit to MTC in project nominations.

On September 14th, the STA Board approved the Solano OBAG 3 Project Nomination List, which includes 10 projects and programs across three program categories. The deadline to submit the project nomination list to MTC was on September 30th.

The OBAG 3 funding recommendations are included as Attachment B and the full list of STA Advisory Committee and CBO endorsements from the Board workshop process is included as Attachment C.

STA staff will provide an update on the approved funding recommendations and next steps for the OBAG 3 process. 23

C. STA Wayfinding Sign Program (Dulce Jimenez, STA)

As part of the FY 20-21 TDA Article 3 program, the PAC and BAC recommended the allocation of \$25,000 a year for three years towards developing a countywide Wayfinding Sign Program. The STA is gearing up for Cycle 2 of the Countywide Wayfinding Sign Program, with \$25,000 available in this cycle.

The Countywide Wayfinding Sign Program seeks to install wayfinding signs around Solano County so residents can better locate and access active transportation infrastructure, such as connections to transit, as well as bicycle and pedestrian projects. The application template is anticipated to be released in mid-October, with the deadline for applications on November 9th.

Below are the wayfinding projects that were selected for funding for Cycle 1:

- 1. City of Suisun City new bicycle signs for Central County Bikeway (Funding Recommendation: \$4,500)
- 2. City of Rio Vista replacement pedestrian signs for Bridge to Beach Trail (Funding Recommendation: \$4,200)
- 3. City of Vallejo new bicycle signs for the future Bay Trail-Vine Trail Project (Funding Recommendation: \$16,300)

STA staff will be discussing the proposed program design for the Wayfinding Sign Program-Year 2 and would like to seek feedback from PAC members.

Solano Countywide Active Transportation Plan – Projects List Amendment

The Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP) serves as STA's primary long range planning document that guides and prioritizes the STA's investments in transportation. An element of the CTP is the Active Transportation Element, which guides STA's investment in bike and pedestrian related projects and programs. The STA Board adopted the Solano ATP in April of 2020.

In May 2022, the STA amended the original plan to include additional new projects submitted by each individual jurisdiction. There were 39 new projects in total added to the ATP – included as Attachment A. Additionally, the amendment adds the countywide SR2S projects list to the ATP projects list, establishing consistency between both documents.
