RE: Executive Director's Report – May 2022

The following is a brief status report on some of the major issues and projects currently being advanced by the Solano Transportation Authority (STA). An asterisk (*) notes items included in this month's Board agenda.

Travis Air Force Base Access Presentation*

Travis Air Force Wing Commander Colonel Corey Simmons has been invited to provide the STA Board with a presentation on base access priorities for Travis AFB. STA staff is coordinating with staff from Travis AFB, the Capitol Corridors, City of Fairfield, City of Vacaville and County of Solano on projects such as completing the next and final phases of the Jepson Parkway located in Vacaville and Fairfield, access improvements at the North Gate, and safety improvements at the Vanden and Canon Roads' rail crossing.

Status of STA's Federal Priorities for 2022 *

In March, the STA Board approved a list of nine initial priorities for federal funding. STA staff has been working with our partner agencies and project sponsors on each of the nine priorities which are in various stages of project readiness for delivery of the project and for submittal for federal funding. At the meeting, staff will provide an update on the status of each priority.

One Bay Area Grant (OBAG 3) Schedule and Funding Targets *

In April, the STA Board approved the evaluation criteria and public outreach plan for STA's issuing of a Call for Projects in May 2022 for \$15.2 million in One Bay Area Grant 3 (OBAG 3) funds. Based on Board direction, staff has brought back two options for consideration by the STA Board as part of the issuing of the Call for Projects. The first option is a combination of Option 2 and 3, and the second option is focused on just Option 3. Project sponsors will have until the end of June to submit their OBAG 3 projects and a Board workshop has been scheduled for July 13th, prior to the STA Board meeting to hear from project sponsors and STA's advisory committees before the STA Board recommends projects to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) in September.

Request for Priority Conservation Area (PCA) Funding *

As part of the funding cycles for both OBAG 1 and OBAG 2, STA and the other three North Bay County Transportation Agencies received federal OBAG funds for Priority Conservation Area (PCA) for projects located in PCAs. STA has programmed these funds to the County of Solano for projects located in the Suisun Valley PCA. For OBAG 3, MTC staff has proposed to develop a regional PCA plan, delay funding for the North Bay PCA program, and has not committed to continuing to fund this successful and important program for the four North Bay Counties. STA staff with the concurrence of County of Solano staff, and unanimous support from the STA TAC is recommending the STA Board forward a letter to MTC requesting they continue to fund this program.

Proposed Four Year Funding Plan for TDA Article 3 and TFCA Funding *

Concurrent to the OBAG 3 Call for Projects, STA staff and the STA TAC are recommending the Board authorize the development of Four Year funding plans for the allocation of TDA Article 3 (Bike and Ped funding) and Bay Area Air Quality Management District TFCA funds. If approved by the STA Board, this would increase the amount of funding for project sponsors for Vision Zero/Active Transportation Projects under either OBAG 3 allocation option selected by the STA Board.

Amendments to Solano County Active Transportation Plan *

STA Planning Staff has completed an amendment to the Solano County Active Transportation Plan just in time for the OBAG 3 Call for Projects. This amendment will add over 35 eligible bike and pedestrian projects to the extensive list of ATP projects included in the Plan.

Highway Projects Update*

STA project staff will provide an update on the status of the Solano I-80 Express Project and the West Bound Truck Scales Project. A groundbreaking event for the start of construction for the I-80 Express Lanes Project has been scheduled by Caltrans for May 16, 2022. On April 26th, I joined with STA's Anthony Adams and Brandon Thomson in participating at a Rio Vista Town Hall with Caltrans District IV staff focused on forthcoming safety and complete highway improvements on SR 12. An estimated 71 Rio Vista residents participated in person and via zoom along with the Rio Vista City Council.

STA Draft Overall Work Plan*

In preparation for the forthcoming fiscal year, STA's department directors and staff have updated the STA's current 51 item Overall Work Plan, and added five new items based on previous Board actions. This item covers FY 2022-2023 and FY 2023-2024 and summarizes the STA planning, programming, project delivery, and program activity.

Solano Express Transition Plan Update

STA Transit and Projects staff continues to support the transition of the Solano Express service from two operators to one. STA's focus is on identifying a north county site for an interim bus storage facility to support the Blue Line which is scheduled to transfer from Fairfield and Suisun Transit (FAST) to Solano County Transit (SolTrans) in August of this year.

STA Staff Updates

Sean Person was hired as a part-time Customer Service representative in April of this year. He will be assisting the STA's Mobility Programs and will be supervised by Debbie McQuilkin, STA's Transit Mobility Programs Coordinator II.

Brent Rosenwald, one of STA's Assistant Planners, has accepted a position with a consultant firm and has departed the STA after a successful two and one half year tenure. STA will be starting the recruitment process for his replacement in May.

STA is currently recruiting for an Assistant Program Manager to fill the vacant full-time SR2S position in the Programs Department and for a Finance Analyst/Accountant position in the Projects Department. Final interviews for both positions are scheduled for the first week of May.

Mr. Guerrero explained that the STA TAC and STA Board provided direction at their prior meetings to develop allocation considerations focusing on a combination of Options 2 and 3, as well as a standalone Option for Option 3. He also explained that Option 1 didn't get support from the STA Board and that MTC staff highly discouraged further consideration of it. The new recommendation being presented at the TAC meeting reflected their direction.

After the STA TAC members discussed both options at length, they came to a consensus to recommend removing references to SolTrans Electrification as an eligible category for the combination of Options 2 and 3, and the standalone Option 3. In addition, the TAC recommended to include \$1.5 million for the STA Mobility Program as part of the combination option and standalone option. This was unanimously approved based on a motion by Paul Kaushal and second by Robin Borre.

The STA TAC continued to discuss which option to recommend to the STA Board and ultimately had a split vote for either the combination option or the stand-alone option as shown below:

Option 2 and 3

RE: I-80 Express Lanes Project Mitigation

Background:

Since 2010, STA staff has been working in partnership with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and Caltrans to implement the I-80 Express Lanes Project - Red Top Road to I-505 (Project). Environmental clearance for the Project was approved in December 2015. Design was completed in June 2021 and the Project is now moving in the Construction Phase after successfully receiving \$124 M in SB1 funding in 2021 to complete the funding plan of the Project.

Discussion:

As mentioned above, the Project is moving into the Construction Phase. The Project required several environmental permits from the following resource agencies: 1) US Army Corps of Engineers (404 permit); 2) California Department of Fish and Wildlife (1602 permit); and 3) State Water Resources Quality Board (401 permit). Below is a summary of the environmental impacts that need to be mitigated:

- Permanent impacts to 0.31 acre and temporary impacts to 0.04 acre of aquatic features to be mitigated with on-site new water quality features;
- Permanent impacts to 0.03 acre of waters of the U.S. to be mitigated through mitigation bank credit purchase;
- Permanent impacts to 0.09 acre and temporary impacts to 0.96 acre of California redlegged frog habitat – to be mitigated through mitigation bank credit purchase;
- Permanent impacts to 0.36 acre and temporary impacts to 0.07 acre of habitat under CDFW jurisdiction to be mitigated through mitigation bank credit purchase; and
- Permanent impacts to an estimated 20 elderberry bushes (host plant for valley elderberry longhorn beetle) to be mitigated through mitigation bank credit purchase.

Staff recommends the Board authorize the Executive Director to enter into one or more agreements with qualified mitigation banks to provide required mitigation for the Project in an amount not-to-exceed \$210,000.

Fiscal Impact:

The required environmental mitigation for the I-80 Express Lanes Project - Red Top Road to I-505 will be funded with bridge toll funds already dedicated to the Project.

Recommendation:

Authorize the Executive Director to enter into one or more agreements with qualified mitigation banks to provide required mitigation for the Project in an amount not-to-exceed \$210,000 for the I-80 Express Lanes Project - Red Top Road to I-505.

Prejudice (LONP) Bridge Toll Funds

Background:

In June 2018, the Bay Area voters approved Regional Measure 3 (RM 3). RM 3 will raise the bridge toll in three stages: \$1 on January 1, 2019 (in effect); \$1 on January 1, 2022 (in effect); and \$1 on January 1, 2025. For Solano County, RM 3 provides dedicated funding to important capital projects such as, \$150 million for the I-80/I-680/SR12 Interchange, \$105 million for the I-80 Westbound Cordelia Truck Scales, \$100 million for State Route 37 Improvements. It also includes competitive programs that in which Solano County can participate, including \$300 million for Bay Area Express Lanes.

At this time, RM 3 remains under litigation initiated in April 2019 by the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association and an individual the claiming the toll increases are a tax rather than a fee and thus require a two-thirds majority to pass. Bay Area Toll Authority (BATA's) policy is to hold all funds in escrow until such time as the litigation is resolved favor of RM 3. As a result, RM 3 funding is not currently available to fund projects.

Currently the I-80/I-680/SR12 Interchange Project - Construction Package 2A (Project) is the active Project and subject of this staff report. The scope includes:, the existing eastbound SR 12W to eastbound I-80 connector will be removed. A new two-lane highway alignment and bridge structure for the eastbound SR 12W to eastbound I-80 will be constructed that meets the design requirements for future project phases. The new bridge structure will be designed to accommodate a future connector to southbound I-680. The project will construct the off-ramp from eastbound SR 12W to Green Valley Road. A braided ramp connection for eastbound I-80 to Green Valley Road and southbound I-680 will also be constructed.

The Project relies on RM 3 funds as part of the local match requirement and an important funding element to the Project. With the RM 3 lawsuits still pending, BATA is not able to allocate these funds to projects. However, work continues, and additional funding is needed to fulfill the STA's obligations to the project.

Discussion:

The STA and Caltrans have teamed up to deliver the Project. Caltrans the lead for design, which began in July 2018, the STA is the lead for Right-of-Way (R/W) (appraisal and acquisitions), which began in June 2019 and Caltrans is the lead for construction which began in June 2020. Bridge toll funds were identified as part of the funding plan for this Project from the \$150M RM 3 funds dedicated to this Interchange Complex. These funds were to fully fund the R/W work and provide a match for construction SB 1

funds that were awarded to the project. Previously the STA has worked with BATA staff to facilitate a loan from BATA bridge toll funds for the RM 3 demands of the funding plan. The STA Board approved these loans in June 2019 and June 2020. The specific work to be completed with these funds included activities necessary for construction of the project, and right-of-way activities. Specifically in June 2019, BATA committed \$7.2 million BATA Rehabilitation funds for the Right-of-Way Phase of the Project and in June 2020 BATA committed \$7.1M in BATA Rehabilitation funds for construction. This commitment was an advance eligible for reimbursement from the \$150 million RM 3 funds dedicated to the I-80/I-680/SR12 Interchange Project. In addition, the Board approved a loan of \$375,000 from the STA Project Contingency Fund to the 80/680/SR 12 Interchange (CP2). Since RM 3 funds are legislatively committed to the Interchange Project, these funds would have covered all the costs associated with the right-of-way acquisitions. However, as these RM 3 funds are not available, STA requests a Letter of No Prejudice (LONP) for the use of other funding so that STA can be repaid this amount from RM 3. In general, the LONP permits a Project Sponsor to incur costs on a project using, in this case non-RM 3 funds with the understanding that the costs incurred after the LONP is approved will be reimbursable as eligible expenses at a later date if RM 3 survives the court challenge.

The Project did require R/W to be acquired, as mentioned above, the STA is the lead agency for this phase of the project. There are 8 private properties and 2 public properties that were required for the construction. In addition, there were four billboards existing in the new footprint of the project. These billboards have been removed and consolidated into 2 billboards. The STA did secure rights to all the properties in advance of the constitution. However, the financial compensation for all the properties was not resolved prior to construction. Currently, there are only two properties that remain in condemnation, Store Spe Ashley, CA, LLC and Scherner, Steven. Staff has reached a settlement agreement with Store Spe Ashley and in order to finalize the acquisition, additional R/W funding will be required.

As previously stated, the thought process was to use RM 3, but unfortunately, RM 3 funds are currently still not available. As such, staff is now recommending using a swap of project savings in State Transit Assistance Funds (STAF) for BATA funds to be used for a Letter of No Prejudice (LONP) so that RM 3 funds can repay the funds to the STA in the future when/if they become available. To effectuate this approach, STA will reallocate \$800,000 of STAF funds in project savings from the York Street Project in the City of Vallejo to BATA in exchange for a corresponding amount of BATA funds, which will be used for the LONP for \$800,000 in R/W funding for the Project.

Since RM 3 funds are legislatively committed to the Interchange Project, these funds would have covered the cost increase, STA requests a Letter of No Prejudice (LONP) so that STA can be repaid this amount from RM 3. To secure the future RM 3 funding at this time, STA is required to approve the attached LONP Request Resolution, along with the LONP, the Initial Project Report (IPR) and cash flow plan (attachments to resolution).

Fiscal Impact:

This action will allow STA to secure \$800,000 in BATA funds to ensure that R/W activities necessary are not delayed due to the RM3 lawsuit acquisition, with the BATA funds backed by RM 3 funds dedicated to the Project. Should the RM 3 legal challenges be successful, then the loan could not be repaid from RM3 funds.

Recommendation:

Authorize the Executive Director to enter into 1 or more agreements with BATA to implement the following;

- 1. Reallocate \$800,000 of State Transit Assistance Funds (STAF) in project savings from the York Street Project in the City of Vallejo to BATA in exchange for a corresponding amount of BATA funds; and
- 2. Approve STA Resolution No. 2022-<u>05</u> (Attachment A) and Letter of No Prejudice (LONP) for \$800,000 in RM3 funds for the I-80/I-680/SR12 Interchange Project Construction Package 2A (CP2A).

Solano Transportation Authority agrees at its own cost, expense, and risk, to defend any and all claims, actions, suits, or other legal proceedings brought or instituted against MTC, BATA, and their Commissioners, officers, agents, and employees, or any of them, arising out of such act or omission, and to pay and satisfy any resulting judgments. In addition to any other remedy authorized by law, so much of the funding due under any future allocation of RM3 funds to this scope as shall reasonably be considered necessary by MTC may be retained until disposition has been made of any claim for damages, and be it further

RESOLVED, that Solano Transportation Authority shall, if any revenues or profits from any non-governmental use of property (or project) that those revenues or profits shall be used exclusively for the public transportation services for which the project was initially approved, either for capital improvements or maintenance and operational costs, otherwise the Metropolitan Transportation Commission is entitled to a proportionate share equal to MTC's percentage participation in the projects(s); and be it further

RESOLVED, that assets purchased with RM3 funds including facilities and equipment shall be used for the public transportation uses intended, and should said facilities and equipment cease to be operated or maintained for their intended public transportation purposes for its useful life, that the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) shall be entitled to a present day value refund or credit (at MTC's option) based on MTC's share of the Fair Market Value of the said facilities and equipment at the time the public transportation uses ceased, which shall be paid back to MTC in the same proportion that Regional Measure 3 funds were originally used; and be it further

RESOLVED, that following an allocation of RM3 funds for this scope of work Solano Transportation Authority shall post on both ends of the construction site(s) at least two signs visible to the public stating that the Project is funded with Regional Measure 3 Toll Revenues; and be it further

RESOLVED, that Solano Transportation Authority authorizes its Executive Director or his/her designee to execute and submit an LONP request for the Right of Way Phase with MTC for Regional Measure 3 funds in the amount of \$800,000, for the project, purposes and amounts included in the project application attached to this resolution; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Executive Director or his/her designee is hereby delegated the authority to make non-substantive changes or minor amendments to the LONP request or IPR as he/she deems appropriate; and be it further

I. Overall Project Information

a. Project Sponsor / Co-sponsor(s) / Implementing Agency

Solano Transportation Authority (STA) is the project sponsor and implementing agency in partnership with Caltrans.



b. Project Purpose

The I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange experiences traffic congestion due to San Francisco Bay Area commuter traffic, regional traffic using the interstate system, and recreational traffic traveling between the San Francisco Bay Area and Lake Tahoe. The objectives of the proposed project are to alleviate congestion, improve safety, and provide for existing and proposed traffic demand by upgrading the capacity of the freeway and completing a local roadway system that will provide local travelers alternatives to using the freeways for local trips.

The project provides critical improvements to one of Northern California's most critical transportation corridors/freeway to freeway interchanges. The project has the following benefits:

Goods Movement: I-80 is a major transcontinental highway route, typically six to eight lanes. The route is a primary truck route connecting the Port of Oakland to the Central Valley and Northern California, as well as locations throughout the western United States. In addition to the interchange's importance as a major freight route connecting the Bay Area ports to the greater Interstate system, the convergence of I-80 and I-680 makes this particularly significant for freight.

Traffic Congestion: The tremendous growth in the region has resulted in substantial increases in regional traffic traveling through the interchange area. The corridor functions as an essential commuter route within the San Francisco Bay Area, connecting workers in Solano and Napa Counties with jobs in neighboring Contra Costa, Alameda, and San Francisco Counties, as well as through traffic from the Sacramento area to the San Francisco Bay Area. Its regional significance is demonstrated by its high percentage of inter-county and interregional travel.

Cut-Through Traffic: Due to mainline congestion, vehicles use local roadways to avoid the highway. This has resulted in impacts to local roadway operations, most notably affecting access to local businesses along Central Way, Cordelia Road, and Lopes Road in Cordelia and Fairfield.

Safety: Accident rates within the project area are higher than the statewide average for similar facilities. According to data provided by Caltrans, I-80 within the project limits experienced a total accident rate (including fatal and injury accidents) of 0.79 accidents/million vehicle-miles traveled. This exceeds the statewide average for similar facilities of 0.78 accidents/million vehicle-miles traveled.

A benefit/cost analysis was prepared for the project. The project's main benefit is travel time savings and the first phase of the project will save almost 1 million person-hours of travel time annually over the 20-year period of operation. In addition, the improved safety in the project area is expected to generate \$15.2 million in benefits during the 20-year period of analysis. The slightly higher speeds along the corridor are expected to generate vehicle operating costs and emissions cost savings totaling \$23.3 million for this phase. This project would result in a net present value of \$138.2 million and generate a benefit-cost ratio of 3.21.

c. Detailed Project Description

The I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange Project is located in Fairfield and unincorporated Solano County. The interchange is a confluence of interregional significance as it connects the San Francisco Bay Area, Napa Valley, and the Central Valley as well as providing connections to the Tahoe region and states east of California. The interchange also supports Solano County communities served by a series of local roadways that are interwoven with the interregional routes.



The I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange Project proposes improvements to address traffic operations and congestion in the existing interchange complex. Improvements include the following components: modification of existing interchanges, adding freeway lanes, constructing new interchanges, auxiliary lanes, high-occupancy vehicle (HOV) lanes and frontage roads within and adjacent to existing freeway rights of way, relocation of the existing westbound truck scales within the interchange area to improve ingress and egress of the truck traffic.

The project is a \$2 billion program to modernize and improve the interchange. A fundable \$700 million first phase (Alternative C-1) has been identified and environmentally-cleared. Alternative C-1 is comprised of the following components: improvements to the I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange, realignment of I-680; a new interchange at I-680 and Red Top Road; a new road connecting the I-80/Red Top Road Interchange to Business Center Drive (Business Center Drive Extension); a new interchange at SR 12W and the new Red Top Road alignment, a modified interchange at I-80 and Green Valley Road; new I-80 bridges over Green Valley Creek; widening of I-80, a new lane on eastbound SR 12E, and widening of the SR12E bridge over Ledgewood Creek.

Overall I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange Project: Alternative C-1 consists of seven individual construction packages. In 2017, construction was completed on the Initial Construction Package (ICP) that included a new connection from westbound I-80 to westbound SR 12W. RM3 funds will be used for the next three construction packages, which are operable, usable segments. Construction Package 2 (CP2) provides an enhanced connection from eastbound SR 12W to eastbound I-80. Construction Package 3 (CP3) provides the westbound I-80 to southbound I-680 connector and provides a new interchange at I-680 and Red Top Road. Construction Package 4 (CP4) provides the I-680 northbound to eastbound I-80 connector. Detailed descriptions of the three construction packages, includes:

Construction Package 2: With this construction package, the existing eastbound SR 12W to eastbound I-80 connector will be removed. A new two-lane highway alignment and bridge structure for the eastbound SR 12W to eastbound I-80 will be constructed that meets the design requirements for future project phases. The new bridge structure will be designed to accommodate a future connector to southbound I-680. The project will construct the off-ramp from eastbound SR 12W to Green Valley Road. A braided ramp connection for eastbound I-80 to Green Valley Road and southbound I-680 will also be constructed. Construction of this project started in the summer of 2020 and expected to be completed by the end of 2022.

Construction Package 3: This construction package will construct a regional interstate connector, realigning southbound I-680 approximately 0.5 miles to the west of the existing location, connecting back to the existing alignment near the I-680/Red Top Road interchange. The interchange at I-680 and Red Top Road will be constructed with CP3, including realigning Lopes Road and Fermi Road to accommodate the future I-680 northbound alignment. Green Valley Road will be realigned south of I-80 into the newly vacated I-680 southbound roadway.

Construction Package 4: This construction package will realign northbound I-680 to complement the improvements of CP3, construct a new I-680 northbound to I-80 eastbound direct connector and a new -680 northbound to SR 12 westbound direct connector, widen I-80 westbound with additional auxiliary lanes, remove Neitzel Road, reconstruct the eastbound ramps at I-80/Green Valley Road to their ultimate location, construct a westbound offramp at the I-80/Green Valley Road interchange, and construct a new westbound on ramp at the I-80/Suisun Road Interchange. Northbound Green Valley Road/Lopes Road



will be shifted to the old vacated I-680 northbound roadway. A local connection will be constructed to connect Central Way to the realigned portion of Lopes Road.

d. Impediments to Project Completion

The I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange has few impediments to project complete. The project has already been environmentally cleared and a permitting strategy established for each construction package. The Environmental Impact Report/Environmental Impact Statement (EIR/EIS) evaluated the environmental impacts of the project and established mitigations. Progress has been achieved on implementing two environmental mitigation sites. Right of way acquisition requirements and utility relocations have already been identified, reducing any risks.

The one major impediment to accomplish the project completion will be securing necessary funds to complete the interchange improvements. The identified project construction packages of this project are serviceable, provide independent utility and have logical termini. Some of these phases can be and are being delivered by currently identified fund sources. STA is currently delivering the I-80/I-680/SR 12 improvements with the expectation that the project will need to be constructed with multiple construction packages.


STA has developed a financing strategy for the project and is pursuing additional funding sources. The financing strategy has identified the use of RM3 as matching funds for a construction grant through the California Transportation Commission (CTC) Trade Corridor Enhancement Program. Additionally, the STA will actively seek other state and federal dollars for construction. The agency has also secured Senate Bill 1 Trade Corridor Enhancement Program (TCEP) funds for the construction of CP2. This construction package is currently in the construction phase.

e. Operability (describe entities responsible for operating and maintaining project once completed/implemented)

Caltrans will be responsible for owning and operating the mainline and interchange improvements. Caltrans has available State Highway Operation and Protection Program (SHOPP) funds for future maintenance needs.

II. Project Phase Description and Status

a. Environmental/Planning

The environmental document (EIR/EIS) for the Overall I-80/I-680/SR12 I/C Project was approved in December 2012. The document covers the entire project and as such, a Notice of Determination (NOD) has been approved for the entire project. A Record of Decision (ROD) has been issued for the fundable first phase. I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange CP2, CP3 and CP4 were covered in the ROD.

b. Design

Ongoing engineering support will be required for the Overall I-80/I-680/SR12 I/C Project for activities which include but are not limited to the following: 1) Continued coordination on the Suisun Creek Reserve Mitigation Site; 2) Continued coordination with the cities of Vallejo and Benicia on water line utility coordination; 3) Preparation of the Federal Highway Financial Plan Annual Update; 4) Right of way related activities for various property owners within the I-80/I-680/SR12 I/C Project; 5) Preparation of strategies applications for upcoming funding opportunities; 6) Evaluation of phasing modifications to compete better with upcoming funding opportunities; 7) Continued coordination with all of the partnering agencies including BATA, Caltrans, FHWA, Solano County, and the cities of Fairfield, Vallejo and Benicia.

Final Design for the first construction package (Initial Construction Package (ICP) was completed in May 2013. Final Design for CP2 was completed in June 2020. CMGC alternative delivery approach is being used for CP2. Final Design for CP3 began in 2013 and was placed on hold in May 2015 due to the lack of construction funds. Final Design for CP4 has not started.



c. Right-of-Way Activities / Acquisition

Right-of-way acquisition for ICP started in spring 2012 and was completed. Activities required to transfer the right-of-way to Caltrans are underway. Closeout of utility relocations are underway. Right-of-way requirements for all future phases have been identified. Right of way acquisition effort for CP2 is expected to be completed by June 30, 2022. Although right-of-way acquisition for CP3 and CP4 has not started, the developer of the Goldhill Village Development has dedicated easements for the relocation of the Benicia NBA water pipeline and the Fairfield-Suisun Sanitation District sewer pipeline associated with CP3.

d. Construction / Vehicle Acquisition / Operating

It is currently envisioned that the fundable phase of the I-80/I-680/SR12 Interchange will be implemented with 7 construction packages. The first construction package (ICP) started construction in spring/summer 2014 and was completed in fall 2017. It is now in the closeout phase. CP2 started construction fall 2020 and is scheduled to be completed by Decmber 31, 2022. Construction of CP3 and CP4 has not been scheduled at this time.

Background:

Each year, the Solano Transportation Authority (STA) Board and staff identify and update the STA's priority plans, projects and programs. These tasks provide the foundation for the STA's OWP for the forthcoming two fiscal years. In July 2002, the STA Board modified the adoption of its list of priority projects to coincide with the adoption of its two-year budget. This marked the first time the STA had adopted a two-year Overall Work Plan.

Over the past 20 plus years, the STA's OWP has continued to evolve based on changing Board priorities, requests from the eight member agencies that comprise the STA's Joint Powers Authority (JPA), and to address priorities, policies and requirements emanating from the federal, state, and the region. The focus of the STA during the timeframe of 2000 to 2005 was to complete the first Solano County Comprehensive Transportation Plan, initiate various corridor studies, and identify a handful of priority projects to fund and advance into construction. From 2005 to the present, the STA has taken a more proactive role in advancing projects through a variety of project development activities and has expanded its transit coordination role in partnership with Solano's five local transit operators, the Capitol Corridors and the San Francisco Bay Ferry. STA is now managing numerous mobility programs designed to improve mobility and access for older adults, people with disabilities, low income residents traveling to work, shopping, medical appointments, and school age children and their parents traveling to and from school.

Planning FY 2021-22

STA's planning activities during this past fiscal year included focusing on supporting helping the City County Coordinating Council completing the Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RENA) and helping the cities and County get jump started on their Housing Elements. This efforted has been done through the Solano Housing Incentives Partnership (SolHIP) and will continue into the next FY. Planning staff will be carrying forward the Solano Rail Hub Implementation Plan effort into the next FY and has been updating the Active Transportation Plan to add 35 new projects. Staff has also been working with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) on the Plan Bay Area 2050 implementation which has 35 recommendations divided into four quadrants of transportation, housing, economic development and environment, and the allocation of One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) 3 funding.

Projects FY 2021-22

In 2009, the STA's eight member agencies approved an update and modification to the STA's Joint Powers Agreement that authorized the STA to perform all aspects of project development and delivery, including right of way functions for specified priority projects.

This past fiscal year, the STA's project development activities included the following:

- ➤ Completed the design phase for the upgrade to the SR 37/Fairgrounds Interchange and obtained a commitment of \$15 million of Regional Measure 3 funds for the construction phase, which is on hold pending litigation resolution by MTC.
- ➤ Working with MTC, the draft environmental document for SR 37 Interim Congestion Relief Project (Mare Island Interchange to SR37/121) is done.
- ➤ The construction is making good progress for Phase 2 of the I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange through a Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC) project delivery approach with STA serving as the lead for the right of way phase for the project.
- ➤ STA landed two SB1 Grants two years ago, \$123.4M for the I-80 Managed Lanes Project construction phase which is scheduled to start construction in May 2022, and \$26M for the I-80 Westbound Truck Scales design phase with STA taking the lead on the design phase.
- ➤ Implementation of the 2018 and 2020 State Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP) grants for SolanoExpress Service Integration and Electrification are still underway.
- ➤ In partnership with Caltrans and Vallejo, secured additional state funding for the SR 29 Sonoma Blvd. Complete Streets implementation as part of the Caltrans rehabilitation project which will begin work in FY 2023-24.
- ➤ In partnership with Caltrans and Rio Vista, the SR 12 SHOPP project will be delivered in three phases with the first phase set to start in FY 2023-24.
- ➤ Completed the eighth annual report for the Regional Transportation Impact Fee (RTIF) Program which passed the \$15 million milestone in funds generated for the Program.
- ➤ The Abandon Vehicles Abatement (AVA) Program reimbursed for 8,803 vehicles abated during the previous fiscal year.

Programs FY 2021-22

STA's Program Department has remained active in bridging service gaps resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic. The assortment of services and programs offered have continued through these challenges. STA's First and Last Mile Program partnership with LYFT continued to bridge service gaps resulting from the transit service cuts. While people commuting began to gradually return over this past year, the Solano Employer Commuter Information Program has updated the vanpool program, which formed eleven new van pools, and the bucks for bikes programs to encourage the transition from single vehicle occupancy. Staff has been focusing on building partnerships with our adjacent counties along the SR 37, and I-80 and I -680 travel corridors to eliminate barriers for the commuters between counties. The Safe Routes to School (SR2S) Program had another proactive and productive school year with the initiation of another round of Micro Grant Projects and another round of enforcement grants.

STA worked with the two regional transit operators, SolTrans and FAST, to begin transitioning the Green Line and the Blue Line. The STA has initiated a Connected Mobility Study which provides important information regarding performance measures and how best to restore Solano Express service, plan for future service along the SR 37, I-80 and I-505 corridors, and respond to the 27 recommendations brought forward by MTC's Blue Ribbon Transit Recovery Task Force. Overall, the Programs Department has continued to provide mobility services throughout the county, the summary includes:

- ✓ The Solano Mobility Call Center assisted over 6,600 individuals (in person and by phone)
- ✓ Assessed 1,008 individuals for American with Disabilities Act (ADA) eligibility
- ✓ Expanded the Intercity Paratransit Taxi Card Program to include non-ambulatory services and provided 5,580 trips with 232 active users through February 2022 and implemented the program in Suisun City with 57 residents signed up and began expanding the program to Veterans.

- ✓ Completed 130 Travel Trainings and 9 field trips.
- ✓ GoGo Grandparents provided 10,054 trips.
- ✓ 2,050 trips taken on First Last Mile Program.
- ✓ 78 employees participating employer program.
- ✓ Formed eleven new vanpools.
- ✓ Updated incentives programs to enhance goals of the programs.

Discussion:

Attached for review is the STA's Draft OWP for FY's 2022-23 and 2023-24. The 51 plans, projects and programs contained in the current OWP have been updated to reflect milestones achieved and contain new additions approved by the STA Board during FY 2021-22 that increase the OWP to 56 items.

PROJECT DELIVERY/COMPLETE PROJECTS/NEAR TERM CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Gearing up for the STA's Budget for FY 2022-23 and 2023-24, the following five OWP projects are fully funded and are now completed, currently under construction or slated to be in construction in FY 2022-2023 or 2023-24:

- I-80 Managed Lanes (Conversion of HOV Lanes to Express Lanes from Red Top Road to Air Base Parkway and the New Express Lanes from Air Base Parkway to I-505) Under Construction
- I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange Phase 2A Under construction
- SR 12 SHOPP/Complete Highways Project construction scheduled for 2023 and 2024
- SR 29 SHOPP/Complete Highways Project Construction scheduled for 2023-24

There are several projects that are currently in the project development phase with a specific project development phase currently funded so that work can continue, but the project is not fully funded and the STA is seeking additional future funds for construction.

- SR 37/Fairgrounds Interchange Improvements (Design phase completed, needs RM 3 to begin construction and seeking additional funding STA/County/Vallejo/Caltrans RM 3/STIP/Local Match/Federal Earmark/RAISE grant
- I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange Need to Identify next Phase and requires RM 3 to advance—STA- RM 3
- I-80 Westbound Truck Scales (design phase underway with SB 1 grant)— STA (environmentally cleared)-RM 3/SB1 TCEP/INFRA Grant
- SR 37 Interim Congestion Relief Project (SR 121 to Mare Island), seeking funds for design phase Caltrans/MTC/STA/SCTA/NVTA RM 3/SB1/State Funding
- Jepson Parkway remaining unfunded segments City of Fairfield and Vacaville Fairfield and Vacaville to seek Developer Implementation– STIP/RTIF/TIF

Finally, there are several projects that are included in the OWP, but the initial or next phase of the project is not currently funded in the current two-year budget.

- I-80 Express Lanes Project Carquinez Bridge to SR 37
- I-80 Express Lanes I-505 to Yolo County Line
- North Connector West Segment

TRANSIT CENTERS

In recent years, STA has partnered with local transit operators and cities to improve and upgrade regional transit centers. There are several priority transit centers that the STA has successfully pursued and obtained or programmed federal, state or regional funds for. Several of these projects are fully funded and are either in construction or moving through the project development stage into construction.

These projects are initial phases of larger planned transit projects that are not fully funded. The larger, long range transit centers are as follows:

- Vallejo Station Phase B
- Fairfield/Vacaville Hannigan Rail Station Phase 2 (Station Building/Additional Parking)
- Solano Rail Hub Capital improvements for expanded Capital Corridor service and future SMART service
- North County Bus Storage Facility Long Term

STA PLANNING ACTIVITIES

The following planning studies are currently underway, funded in the currently proposed budget, and scheduled to be undertaken or completed in FY 2022-23:

- Continue coordination with Housing Production Efforts, including the Solano Housing Investment Partnership (SolHIP)
- Continued development of 11 new Priority Production Areas (PPAs)
- Suisun Community Based Transportation Plan (CBTP) Programs Department
- Solano Parking Demand/Mode Shift Transition Plan
- Solano Connected Mobility Plan
- Monitor and update SolanoExpress Capital Bus Replacement Plan
- Continue to work with MTC on Plan Bay Area 2050
- One Bay Area Grant, Cycle 3 (OBAG 3)
- Congestion Management Program Update
- Countywide Local Road Safety Plan/Vision Zero Plan
- Solano Connected Mobility Implementation Plan

STA PROGRAMS

Some of the major program upcoming included the following:

- Solano Safe Routes to Schools (SR2Ss) Cycle 2 Micro-Grant and 5th Round Enforcement Grant
- Post Pandemic return to school engagement and Implementation of SR2S capital projects
- Completed Second Full Year of College Fee program for SCC students
- Implementation of Federal pandemic funding distributions to Solano County transit operators
- The Solano Mobility Management Call Center will continue to be marketed to likely users to increase awareness of mobility options
- Focus of mobility options for older adults and people with disabilities will also continue with focused outreach, travel training and GoGo Grandparents
- Completion of seventh year of In-Person ADA Eligibility Program will continue with the added ease of over the phone assessments if applicable
- The Employer-Commuter Program is looking to expand the use and marketing of Ride Amigos, First and Last Mile, vanpool connections and working along corridors with our neighboring counites
- Implementation eighth year of the RTIF Program

There are several primary tasks for STA working with the transit operators in FY 2022-23. First will be implementation and marketing for the return of customers to transit and working collaboratively on the Solano Connected Mobility Implementation Plan

The following items are new, and staff has had a request by a member agency to consider adding to the OWP or staff is recommending the inclusion of these activities, not all these have funds identified for the work.

Requested by Member Agencies:

- Vallejo Passenger Rail Feasibility Study
- Monitor Highway Landscaping

Requested by STA staff:

- Climate Adaptation Coordination

The Draft OWP contains 11 plans, 9 projects, 3 transit projects, 1 city project, 16 transit/mobility programs, and 14 coordination or funding programs. The draft OWP was presented to the Solano Express Transit Consortium (April 26) and the STA TAC (April 27) in April as a draft for review and comment and no comments were received. It will then be brought forward as an action item one month later. This item will lead up to the Board's adoption of STA's updated two-year budget scheduled for July.

Recommendation:

Release the STA draft OWP for FY 2022-23 and 2023-24 for a 30 day review and comment period.

RE: Active Transportation Plan (ATP) Amendments New Project Additions

Background:

The Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP) serves as STA's primary long range planning document that guides and prioritizes the STA's investments in transportation. An element of the CTP is the Active Transportation Element, which guides STA's investment in bike and pedestrian related projects and programs. The STA Board adopted the Solano ATP in April of 2020.

The Solano ATP is meant to be viewed as a guiding document and will be used as the basis from which future bike and pedestrian projects are selected and prioritized by STA for grant funding sources like Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3. Additionally, the Solano ATP will be a living document that can be amended annually with new projects and priorities based on the requests of the seven cities and the county. A digital copy of the Solano 2020 Active Transportation Plan (ATP) is available at the following link:

Discussion:

Since adoption of the 2020 Active Transportation Plan, STA staff has conducted outreach to the seven cities and county to determine each entities priority bike and pedestrian projects for TDA Article 3 funding, Transportation Funds for Clean Air (TFCA) and other forthcoming grants. The goal of this outreach was to formulate a program that would align the goals of STA and its member agencies to create a transparent funding and implementation timeline. During these discussions, member agency staff have frequently identified several local projects that they would like to advance for funding that are not included in the ATP. Due to the fact that their exclusion from the plan deems them ineligible for TDA funding and less competitive for regional grants, STA staff determined that amending the original plan to include new projects is necessary. Additionally, STA staff has noted that the ATP contains some discrepancies between the individual jurisdiction's projects lists and the countywide SR2S projects list. Since most of the projects on the SR2S list inherently enhance bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure, the amendment process will establish consistency between both documents.

The ATP amendment period closed on February 28th. STA staff received over 35 new project submissions from its member agencies (For a full list of submissions please refer to Attachment A).

In order to evaluate each submission, STA used the same criteria for scoring that was included in the 2020 ATP and approved by the STA board. These criteria are: connectivity, school access, transit access, safety, equity, secured funding, proximity to MTC Designated Geographies, recreational trail access, and rider comfort.

STA planning staff solicited comments on the new submittals from the representatives of the Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC) and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC). Additionally, STA staff presented these projects to the TAC at their March 2022 meeting and allowing for a 3-week comment period. Now that the feedback on these comments have been received and reviewed, STA staff is bringing forward the projects for adoption at the TAC.

At the TAC meeting, the representatives from Solano County and the City of Dixon indicated their desire to add new projects to the list. The County of Solano added the Tremont Road Bike Improvements Project. The City of Dixon added the North Adams Bike Path Project, North Lincoln Street Bikeway Improvements Project, and the South First Street Corridor Improvements Project.

With these additions, the TAC unanimously voted to adopt the amended projects list.

Recommendation:

Approve the following:

- 1. Add the projects contained in Attachment A to the 2020 Solano Active Transportation Plan; and
- 2. Adopt the Active Transportation Plan to include the following statement "That all projects contained in the local Safe Routes to School Plans inherently increase bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure and therefore are eligible to receive local, regional, state, and federal grant funding".

RE: Solano Priority Conservation Area (PCA) Letter to MTC

Background:

The Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) initially began designating regional Priority Conservation Areas (PCA) in 2007. PCAs are locally identified areas for conservation which provide important agricultural, natural resource, historical, scenic, cultural, recreational, and/or ecological values and ecosystem functions. Solano County currently has 10 approved ABAG PCA designations:

To date, Solano County has received \$3.3 million in transportation funding from STA for projects located in PCA designated locations as part of MTC's North Bay PCA program for OBAG 1 and 2. The North Bay PCA Program was a set-aside of OBAG funds for the counties of Marin, Napa, Solano and Sonoma to implement projects within their PDAs and was a simple process for each county's administration. During OBAG 1, MTC made available \$5 million set aside for the North Bay PCA Program. The four north bay counties equally split the \$5 million at \$1.25 million for each county. Similarly, as part of OBAG 2, MTC made available \$8.2 million set aside for the 4 north bay counties to split equally in which Solano County received \$2.050 million as a result.

Discussion:

MTC staff has indicated that they are considering a delay in developing another North Bay PCA Program as part of OBAG 3. They explained their desire to develop a Bay Area Regional PCA Plan prior to allocating another round of PCA funding. Solano County currently has a PCA Plan which was developed in 2016. STA staff, with the support of County staff, recommends submitting a letter to MTC advocating for a similar North Bay PCA Program with the same flexibility as in prior OBAG cycles to continue advancing the current Solano PCA Plan rather than delaying it. The concern is that the STA and

other Bay Area County Transportation Authorities are currently in the process of selecting transportation projects for OBAG 3 and a delay in PCA funding could impact the County and other eligible jurisdictions from accessing the funds. A potential delay would likely result in no net benefit to Solano.

At their meeting on April 27, 2022, the TAC unanimously approved the recommendation to submit a letter recommending MTC continue the North Bay PCA Program as part of OBAG 3 without further delay and consistent with the process completed for OBAG 1 and OBAG 2.

Fiscal Impact

Recommendation:

Authorize the STA Executive Director to submit a letter recommending MTC continue the North Bay PCA Program as part of OBAG 3 without further delay and consistent with the process completed for OBAG 1 and OBAG 2.

RE: One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) Cycle 3 Option for Call for Projects Allocation

Background:

Every four or five years, STA works with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) to program federal transportation planning funds. This process was formally called the federal cycle process until MTC renamed it the One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) process beginning in 2013. This federal transportation funding combined Surface Transportation Program (STP) and Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) into four or five year grant cycles.

The OBAG 1 and OBAG 2 Programs established program commitments and policies for investing federal funds through FY 2021-22. MTC has approved the program framework and the County & Local Program Guidelines for the third cycle of OBAG, called OBAG 3, which covers Fiscal Years (FYs) 2022-23 through 2025-26.

To comply with federal corrective actions from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), MTC is no longer allowed to distribute OBAG funds to individual counties or jurisdictions on a formula-basis. To satisfy these new requirements, MTC proposed a call for projects process for the OBAG 3 County & Local Program that is more regional in nature, which will be administered and selected by MTC in coordination with the CTA, who will screen, prioritize, and nominate projects.

In both OBAG 1 and OBAG 2, the STA Board allocated OBAG funding to two of its priority countywide programs, Safe Routes to School and Solano Mobility. This funding provides both programs with reliable annual funding to operate these successful programs and this funding will be needed in future years if the programs are to be sustained.

At their February 11th meeting, the STA Board approved \$7.49 million in OBAG 3 funding to provide a stable, multi-year baseline of funding for the STA Planning and Projects Departments through the next four years (FY 2022-23 through 2025-26). The remaining balance of the OBAG 3 County Funding Target, estimated to be \$15.11 million, will be available for eligible transportation priority programs and projects in Solano County. A Call for Projects and Programs for the remaining balance of OBAG 3 funding is scheduled in May 2022.

At their meetings on March 30th and April 13th, STA staff engaged TAC members and the STA Board in a discussion on three potential allocation options for the Call for Projects within the guidelines established by MTC for OBAG 3. They indicated their interest in further exploring two Call for Projects options, which include the following:

- 1. <u>Combination of Option 2 and Option 3</u> Option 2 would combine the STP and CMAQ funds for one Open Call for Projects and Option 3 creates a countywide program or programs to fund eligible projects.
- 2. Option 3 Creates a countywide program or programs to fund eligible projects.

TAC Members and the STA Board felt that these two potential options would yield the most regionally competitive projects in the County being submitted to MTC, while still meeting the transportation goals of our member agencies.

Option 1 proposed a city target approach by MTC's formula based on population and housing factors, and jurisdictions can apply for funding for their projects/programs up to and beyond their city target amounts. MTC expressed concerns about Option 1 as an allocation method, given that the city target approach emulates a formula-based allocation that FHWA's federal corrective actions expressly prohibit. Given MTC's feedback, TAC members and the STA Board were unanimous in their direction to only consider either a combination of Option 2 and 3 or just Option 3.

Discussion:

Upon the request of the STA TAC and direction from the STA Board, STA staff has outlined these two Options of interest that were identified. Staff is seeking a recommendation from the STA Board on the Call for Projects options.

Further, under a separate staff report. STA staff proposes the development of a comprehensive funding strategy that coordinates the OBAG process with potential complementary local fund sources. Consistent with the past two OBAG cycles, STA staff will identify alternative fund sources to help local agencies develop funding plans for priority projects that may not be good candidates for the Federal funds through the OBAG Grant program. These potential alternative fund sources include the Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3 and Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD) Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) funding.

Looking forward over the four-year timeline of OBAG 3, STA anticipates to receive \$1.8 million from the TDA Article 3 program and another \$1 million dollars from the BAAQMD TFCA program. These proposed funds could be considered in the proposed allocation options.

In addition, the project nomination list from Solano County to MTC with our proposed projects must meet or exceed the required minimum investment of 50% benefiting approved Priority Development Areas (PDA)'s. To be credited towards the PDA investment threshold, a project must be located in or be within one-mile of a PDA boundary. Given that three member agencies, Dixon, Rio Vista and the unincorporated County, do not have PDAs, other jurisdictions will need to focus on the investment of PDA supportive projects for Solano County to meet the 50% target. Countywide programs or activities would get credited as meeting the required 50% minimum PDA investment threshold.

Lastly, a requirement for OBAG 3 funding eligibility is for proposed infrastructure projects to be included in an adopted STA Transportation Plan, such as the 2020 Solano Countywide Active Transportation Plan and the 2020 Comprehensive Transportation Plan.

With these considerations in mind, STA staff is presenting proposals for the two Call for Projects options of interest, for the Board's consideration:

I. <u>Combination of Option 2 and 3 – Competitive Call for Projects and Countywide Program or Programs</u>

This allocation option would create a hybrid approach that distributes a portion of the funds to One Competitive Call for Projects and Programs and the rest of the funds to create a countywide program or programs to fund eligible projects and programs.

A. Competitive Call for Projects and Programs--\$5 million in OBAG funds
A Competitive Call for Projects and Programs allows the highest scoring projects and programs to be funded and would ensure that the most regionally competitive projects from the County are submitted to MTC.

The project and program submittals from project sponsors will be evaluated against the Programs and Screening Criteria and the highest scoring projects and programs will be selected and included in the Project Nomination List that is submitted to MTC.

B. Countywide Program or Programs--\$10 million in OBAG funds,

The countywide program would include the following program categories:

1. Countywide Vision Zero/Active Transportation Program -- \$8 million in OBAG funds

This Active Transportation Program (Bike and Ped) category would fund Safe Routes to Schools Programs and Projects; Safe Routes to Transit Projects and Active Transportation Projects.

PBA 2050 includes aggressive mode shift and roadway safety goals and in line with this focus, the OBAG 3 criteria indicates a strong preference for projects and programs that promote clean air, build out a Complete Streets network, and implement Vision Zero policies. To reinforce the focus on these areas, OBAG 3 includes program-specific regionwide investment targets in the following:

- (1) \$200 million investment target for Active Transportation Infrastructure, such as bicycle/pedestrian improvements and programs, including Safe Routes to School (SRTS) programs; and
- (2) \$25 million investment target for SRTS programs and projects.

The project and program-types in this countywide program would advance the region's and Solano County's goals for active transportation and increased roadway, bike and pedestrian safety. Under a separate staff report, staff outlines the STA's past and current efforts in addressing traffic safety and federal, state, and regional focus in this issue area.

2. Electrification Efforts and Mobility Programs--\$2 million in OBAG funds
In 2018, the California Air Resource Board's (CARB) adopted a policy that
requires public transit agencies to fully transition to a 100 percent zero-emission
bus (ZEB) fleet by 2040. To comply with this mandate, STA has been working
with Solano County Transit (SolTrans), and Fairfield and Suisun Transit (FAST)
to implement the STA's adopted 2013 Alternative Fuels Plan to transition its fleet
to electric vehicles. Thus far, the STA has secured over \$14M in competitive
grants toward electrification infrastructure or to purchase electric buses. In order
to meet the 2040 deadline, additional investment will be needed for the
implementation of the Countywide Solano Express Transit Electrification Plan to
continue upgrading electrical infrastructure and phasing electric buses into the
transit system. Focusing OBAG investments on this effort will meet the region's
goals in curbing climate emissions and air pollution.

The Solano County Mobility Management Programs are a priority strategy to address the transportation needs of employers, older adults, people with disabilities, low income and transit-dependent individuals. Two key programs that

are offered by Solano Mobility are the One-Stop Call Center and Employer/Commuter Programs.

The Solano Mobility One-Stop Call Center provides older adults and people with disabilities with transportation information and mobility options, while the Solano Mobility Employer/Commuter Program serves to connect commuters to existing benefits to induce sustainable mode shift. Both programs have been highly successful and serve as a vital link for priority populations to transportation programs. Solano Mobility has received OBAG funding in the past two cycles and continued funding will be needed if the programs are to be sustained

This program category would the meet PBA 2050's goals related to equity and sustainable mode shift by providing air quality improvements through trip reduction.

II. Option 3 – Countywide Program or Programs

This allocation option would create a countywide program or programs to fund eligible projects. A countywide approach to plan and deliver transportation projects has been generally successful at the regional-level and favored by MTC. This option would meet the required 50% minimum PDA investment threshold, given that it consists of countywide programs or activities. Another benefit of this option is it would ensure that every city and the County gets at least one of their projects funded.

If this approach is selected, STA recommends selecting program categories that are strongly aligned with regional transportation goals in Plan Bay Area 2050 (PBA 2050) and the priority areas identified in the OBAG 3 guidelines.

With that said, STA staff recommends selecting the following three countywide program categories:

1. Countywide Vision Zero/Active Transportation Program -- \$10.5 million in OBAG funds

This Active Transportation Program (Bike and Ped) category would fund Safe Routes to Schools Programs and Projects; and Safe Routes to Transit Projects.

The benefits of this program category and its corresponding alignment with regional and Solano County goals is outlined in Allocation Option I.

2. Suburban Housing Incentive Program (SubHIP)--\$2 million in OBAG funds
This program category would fund transportation infrastructure in Priority
Development Areas (PDA) adjacent to Regional Transit for Affordable Housing
Projects.

The Solano SubHIP is STA's successful pilot program established in 2019 to leverage transportation funding for affordable housing developments within PDAs. Through this effort, STA secured \$4 million in SubHIP funds from MTC to advance affordable housing units located in two PDAs within close proximity to transit facilities of regional significance located the cities of Fairfield and Vacaville. Both Priority Development Area locations did not have an affordable housing project previously.

To build upon the success of this program, the STA is pursuing additional fund sources, such as the federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds and Regional Early Action Planning 2.0 funds, for a follow-up SubHIP effort. High levels of interest have already been received **frb3**n several cities and the County on this effort.

This countywide program category would leverage the SubHIP project proposals by providing crucial funding for transportation projects that support the affordable housing developments that are being pursued.

A fundamental goal in MTC's creation of the OBAG program is to strengthen the connection between transportation investments and regional goals for focused growth in Priority Development Areas, affordable housing, and emissions reductions. This countywide program will advance the implementation of this key objective. All projects being located in PDAs would also help address the 50% PDA criteria.

3. Electrification Efforts and Mobility Programs--\$2.5 million in OBAG funds
This program category would fund implementation of the Countywide Solano
Express Transit Electrification Plan and the Solano County Mobility Management
Programs, including the One-Stop Call Center and Employer/Commuter Programs.

The benefits of this program category and its corresponding alignment with regional goals is outlined in Allocation Option I.

These options were presented to the TAC at their April 27, 2022 meeting for their recommendation on the Call for Projects and Programs to the STA Board. In summary, the STA TAC members came to a consensus to recommend removing references to SolTrans Electrification as an eligible category for the combination of Options 2 and 3, and the standalone Option 3. In addition, the TAC unanimously agreed to recommend including \$1.5 million for the STA Mobility Program as part of the combination option and standalone option. This was recommended unanimously approved by the STA TAC.

After a lengthy discussion, the STA TAC ultimately had a split vote for either the combination option or the stand alone option, with the TAC members representing Dixon, Rio Vista, Vacaville, and Vallejo supporting the combination option and Benicia, the County, Fairfield, and Suisun City in support of the standalone option.

These two allocation options are presented to the STA Board for their recommendation on the Call for Projects and Programs.

Fiscal Impact:

\$15.11 million is available for the OBAG Call for Projects.

Recommendation:

Approve the following:

- 1. Approve the OBAG 3 Call for Projects and Programs:
 - a. Option 2 and 3; or
 - b. Option 3 as described in the staff report.
- 2. Issue a Call for Projects for \$15.11 million from the OBAG 3 Grant Program

RE: Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3 and Clean Air Funds-Future

Funding

Background:

Every four or five years, STA works with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) to program federal transportation planning funds. This process was formally called the federal cycle process until MTC renamed it the One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) process beginning in 2013. This federal transportation funding combined Surface Transportation Program (STP) and Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) into four or five year grant cycles. Each cycle, MTC develops policies about how the region will use this funding for projects and programs.

Due to recent federal corrective actions, OBAG funds are no longer allowed by MTC to be distributed to individual counties or jurisdictions on a formula-basis. To address this requirement, MTC proposed an OBAG 3 Call for Projects process that is more regional in nature, in which CTAs will screen, prioritize, and nominate projects in their County and MTC will review the submitted nominations and select projects that are funded. Each county received a nomination target that is 120% of the available funding capacity to ensure that MTC receives a sufficient pool of project nominations to select from, but these targets do not commit or imply a guaranteed share of funding.

Discussion:

Due to the highly competitive nature of the OBAG 3 process, STA staff anticipates that some of its member agencies may not receive funding or full funding for their OBAG project submittals. With that said, STA staff recommends that its member agencies and the STA Board consider the possibility of leveraging local grant funding to help realize these projects. The two sources that could be utilized for this funding plan are Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3 and the Bay Area Air Quality Management District's Transportation Funds for Clean Air (TFCA).

The TDA Article 3 program is an annual amount of funds given to all 9 Bay Area Counties via MTC for bicycle and pedestrian projects. STA is provided around \$450,000 a year from this program and has allocated over \$1.8 million dollars to projects throughout Solano County over the last four years.

The TFCA program is an annual allocation of funding for clean air projects within the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD) portion of Solano County (this includes the cities of Benicia, Fairfield, Suisun City, Vallejo, as well as the surrounding unincorporated areas of southwestern Solano County). STA is provided around \$375,000 per year from this program and after taking into account crucial contributions to the Solano Mobility Program, typically hosts a Call for Projects with the remaining \$200,000 of funds. Over the last four years, STA has allocated over a million dollars of TFCA funds to projects like electric vehicle chargers and Safe Routes to School projects.

Looking forward, over the next 4 years, STA staff anticipates receiving another \$1.8 million dollars from the TDA Article 3 program and another \$1 Million dollars from the BAAQMD TFCA program (minus the set aside for Rideshare Programs). With this amount of funds available, STA staff recommends the STA Board consider levering these grant monies to craft a multi-year funding plan for their projects in parallel to the OBAG 3 funding process.

At their meeting on April 27, 2022, the TAC unanimously approved the recommendation to leverage TDA Article 3 and TFCA funding with the OBAG 3 funding process.

Fiscal Impact:

Anticipated grant funding from the TDA Article 3 Program over the next 4 years is estimated to be \$1.8 Million dollars. Anticipated grant funding from the TFCA Program over the next 4 years is estimated to be \$1 Million dollars.

Recommendation:

Authorize the Executive Director to develop four-year funding plan for TDA Article 3 and TFCA funds, in coordination with the OBAG call for projects.

Background:

Each year, STA staff monitors state and federal legislation that pertains to transportation and related issues. On January 12, 2022, the STA Board approved its 2022 Legislative Platform to provide policy guidance on transportation legislation and the STA's legislative activities during 2022.

Monthly legislative updates are provided by STA's state and federal lobbyists and are attached for your information (Attachments A and B). An updated Legislative Bill Matrix listing state bills of interest is available at: https://sta.ca.gov/operations/legislative-program/current/

Discussion:

The State Route 37 (SR37) and Fairgrounds Interchange Improvement Project was submitted by staff on April 13th for the rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) discretionary grant program. Seventeen support letters were received from a variety of elected officials, government agencies, community-based organizations, and private sector businesses. Senators Dianne Feinstein and Alex Padilla, and Congressmembers John Garamendi and Mike Thompson solicited requests for Fiscal Year 2023 Community Project Funding or "earmarks." Three projects were submitted to each office: I-505/Vaca Valley Multi-Modal Interchange Improvement Project, Jepson Parkway Phase 2C (Canon Rd Overcrossing), and SolanoExpress Electrification Electric Bus purchases. Staff is currently preparing STA's Infrastructure for Rebuilding America (INFRA) grant application for the Westbound I-80 Clean Freight Truck Scales Project, which is due on May 23. As part of the application process, staff will be seeking additional support letters to supplement the letters received in 2019 for the SB1: Trade Corridor Enhancement Program application. Guidelines for other programs of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) have yet to be released. Staff will continue to monitor the Department of Transportation for the release of program guidelines and Notices of Funding Opportunities (NOFO) and prepare application submissions as appropriate.

STA Executive Director Daryl Halls testified at the April 20th Senate Committee on Governance and Finance hearing on behalf of Senator Bill Dodd's Senate Bill 1050 (SB 1050): The State Route 37 Toll Bridge Act. SB 1050 passed out of committee by a unanimous vote of 5-0 and is currently in the Senate Committee of Appropriations and set for a hearing on May 2. The Appropriation Committees have until May 20th to pass proposed legislation to the full chamber of origin. April 29th was the final day for fiscal legislation to move out of policy committees into appropriation committees, and non-fiscal bills have until May 6th to move legislation to the floor.

Senate President Pro-Tem Toni Atkins (D-San Diego) and Senate Budget & Fiscal Committee Chair Nancy Skinner (D-Berkeley) announced an updated Senate Budget Plan: Putting Wealth to Work on April 28th. This Plan includes a transportation package that "builds on the Governor's \$5 billion General Fund proposal to create a \$20 billion, four-year package, with the third and fourth years being subject to appropriation." Additional details will be released in the coming weeks. The Assembly is expected to release an update to their version of a budget proposal in the coming days. Governor Gavin Newsome is also expected to release the May Budget Revise and the Legislature has until June 15th to pass the State Budget and the Governor has until June 30th to sign before the start of the new Fiscal Year.

On April 27th Governor Newsom appointed Vallejo City Councilmember Pippen Dew, to the San Francisco Bay Area Water Emergency Transportation Authority (WETA) Board in replacement of retiring WETA Board Member Anthony Anthony Intinoti. This appointment is subject to Senate confirmation.

<u>State Legislative Update (Shaw/Yoder/Antwih/Schmelzer/Lange):</u>

The Legislature is concluding its initial hearings on the state budget and discussions will resume once the Governor releases the May Revise. The State's budget surplus is anticipated to grow from the initial estimate of \$21 billion in January. The budget revision will likely also include additional details from the Governor's proposed \$11 billion plan to address the impact of high fuel prices. STA's state legislative advocate (Matt Robinso and Josh Shaw of Shaw Yoder) is working with staff to schedule briefings with the Solano delegation and provide updates on projects and advocate for state transportation funding.

RE: STATE LEGISLATIVE UPDATE – May 2022

Legislative Update

The Legislature has mostly concluded its first round of policy committee hearings, with the policy committee deadline of May 6. STA Executive Director Daryl Halls provided lead witness testimony on support of SB 1050 (Dodd) when the bill was heard in the Senate Governance and Finance Committee on April 20.

The Legislature is wrapping up its initial round of budget hearings on the proposals in the Governor's Proposed Fiscal Year 2022-23 State Budget. Most of the key proposals, including funding for transportation, will be subject to future discussions after the Governor releases his May Revise — the spring update to the budget - on, or around, May 15. We expect the state's budget surplus may grow once tax revenues have been accounted for. As a reminder, the Governor pegged the discretionary surplus at approximately \$21 billion in January.

State Senate Unveils Transportation Funding Proposal

On April 28, the California State Senate <u>unveiled</u> a comprehensive budget proposal. The Senate's plan comes approximately two-weeks ahead of the Governor's May Revise and includes a reference to a transportation package and notes the package "builds on the Governor's \$5 billion General Fund proposal to create a \$20 billion, four-year package, with third and fourth years being subject to appropriation." Unfortunately, at this time, we do not have many details, but believe they will emerge in the weeks ahead. We have been told that the package includes transit, active transportation, freight, congestion mitigation, and bridge funding. The Plan also prioritizes zero-emission vehicles and infrastructure, as well as funding to address sea-level rise at ports and public infrastructure, amongst other areas.

Vallejo Council Member Appointed to WETA

On April 27, Governor Newsom announced the appointment of Vallejo City Councilmember Pippin Dew, to the San Francisco Bay Area Water Emergency Transportation Authority (WETA). Ms. Dew will replace long-time WETA Board Member Anthony J. Intintoli, Jr.

Bills With Positions

SB 922 (Wiener) CEQA Exemptions for Transit – SUPPORT (April 13, 2022)

This bill would permanently extend statutory exemptions from the requirement of the California Environmental Quality Act for clean transportation projects that make streets safer for walking and biking; speed up bus service on streets and improve its on-time performance; support faster bus service on state highways; expand carpooling; and improve wayfinding for people using transit, biking, or walking. This bill would similarly permanently extend CEQA exemptions for the construction of infrastructure of facilities to charge or refuel zero-emission transit vehicles; and the building of new bus and light rail stations or terminals.

SB 1049 (Dodd) Transportation Resilience Program – SUPPORT (April 13, 2022)

This bill would establish the Transportation Resilience Program in Caltrans, to be funded in the annual state budget using 15 percent of available federal National Highway Performance Program funds and 100 percent of the available federal Promoting Resilient Operations for Transformative, Efficient, and Cost-Saving Transportation program funds. The bill would provide for funds to be allocated by the California Transportation Commission for climate adaptation planning and resilience improvements that address or mitigate the risk of recurring damage to, or closures of, the state highway system, other federal-aid roads, public transit facilities, and other surface transportation assets from extreme weather events, sea level rise, or other climate change-fueled natural hazards.

SB 1050 (Dodd) State Route 37 Toll Bridge Act – SUPPORT (March 15, 2022)

This bill would create the State Route 37 Toll Authority (Authority), governed by the same board as the Bay Area Infrastructure Financing Authority (BAIFA), and would require the Authority to operate and maintain tolling infrastructure, including installing toll facilities and collecting tolls on State Route 37. The bill would authorize the authority to issue bonds payable from the revenues derived from those tolls and would authorize revenues from the tolls to be used for capital improvements in the State Route 37 corridor. The bill would require the Authority to develop and approve an expenditure plan and would require the Authority's toll schedule to provide a 50 percent discount to qualifying high-occupancy vehicles and between a 25 percent and 50 percent discount to low-income drivers who reside in the Counties of Marin, Napa, Solano, or Sonoma.

AB 455 (Wicks) Bay Bridge Fast Forward Program – SUPPORT (March 10, 2021)

This bill would allow the Bay Area Toll Authority (BATA), in consultation with Caltrans, to designate transit-only traffic lanes on the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge, accessible to mass transit vehicles, or other designated vehicles including taxis and vanpools, during posted times.

AB 2622 (Mullin) Sales Tax Exemption for Transit Buses – SUPPORT (April 13, 2022)

This bill would extend the sunset date from January 1, 2024 to January 1, 2034 on the state sales and use tax exemption for zero-emission buses (ZEBs) purchased by California public transit agencies. This bill is likely to be amended to shorten the sunset.

ACA 1 (Aguiar-Curry) Local Government Financing: Affordable Housing and Public Infrastructure: Voter Approval – SUPPORT (February 10, 2021)

This constitutional amendment would lower the necessary voter threshold from a two-thirds supermajority to 55 percent to approve local general obligation bonds and special taxes for affordable

housing and public infrastructure projects, including public transit. The STA Board supported a nearly identical measure, also ACA 1 (Aguiar-Curry), in 2019.

Bills of Interest

SB 917 (Becker) Seamless Bay Area - WATCH

This bill would require the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) to develop and adopt a Connected Network Plan, adopt an integrated transit fare structure, develop a comprehensive, standardized regional transit mapping and wayfinding system, develop an implementation and maintenance strategy and funding plan, and establish open data standards to support a more integrated public transportation network in the nine-county San Francisco Bay Area. This bill would also require the region's transit agencies to comply with those established integrated fare structure, regional transit mapping and wayfinding system, implementation and maintenance strategy and funding plan, and open data standards.

AB 1778 (Garcia) Prohibition on Highway Projects – WATCH

This bill would require Caltrans to consult the <u>California Healthy Places Index</u> as a condition of using state funds or staff to fund or permit freeway projects and would prohibit any state funds or staff time from being used to fund or permit freeway projects in areas that fall within the 0 to 50th percentile on the index.

AB 1919 (Holden) Youth Free Transit – WATCH

This bill would require transit agencies to provide free transit passes to individuals 25 years of age and under to be eligible to receive state funding from the State Transit Assistance Program, the Low Carbon Transit Operations Program, and the Transportation Development Act if sufficient funding is provided. The bill does not currently provide new funding, but the author has signaled that the bill may soon provide funding ranging from \$100 million to \$150 million per year.

AB 1938 (Friedman) Transit and Rail Recovery Task Force - WATCH

This bill would require CalSTA, on or before July 1, 2023, to convene the Transit and Intercity Rail Recovery Task Force with representatives from Caltrans, various local agencies, academic institutions, and nongovernmental organizations and would require the Task Force to develop policies to grow transit and intercity rail ridership and improve transit and intercity rail operations for users. The bill would require CalSTA to prepare and submit a report of findings to the appropriate policy and fiscal committees of the Legislature on or before January 1, 2025. The bill would require the report to include a detailed analysis of specified issues and recommendations on specified topics.

AB 2011 (Wicks) Ministerial Housing Approvals in Commercial Zones - WATCH

This bill would create a ministerial (by-right) pathway for affordable and mixed-income housing development in commercially zoned areas, if certain conditions are met. These housing developments would need to meet specified affordability and site criteria, as well as objective development standards and be within a zone where office, retail, or parking are a principally permitted use. The bill would require a developer using the process to require that certain wage and labor standards will be met, including that all construction workers shall be paid at least the general prevailing rate of wages.

AB 2237 (Friedman) Sustainable Communities Strategies Implementation – WATCH

This bill would require the Strategic Growth Council, in consultation with ARB, the Department of Housing and Community Development, and CalSTA to convene a task force to review the roles and responsibilities of MPOs and to define "sustainable community." This bill would also require that projects included in each RTIP be consistent with the MPO's current SCS and the state's climate goals, as defined in the bill to mean the California Transportation Plan, state and federal air quality standards, and state land-use policies (SB 375) and emissions reduction targets. The bill would require the MPO to rank all transportation projects and prioritize projects based on their adherence to its most recently adopted SCS and the state's climate goals and submit the list to ARB. ARB and the CTC would then make a consistency determination with the project list and the SCS. Finally, the bill would require the MPO to submit a report on local transportation tax measures to the CTC by March 30, 2023 and would require CTC and ARB to propose recommendations on alignment of local tax measures with the state's climate goals and would require projects funded by local tax measures, in order to be included in RTIPs, to adhere to the most recently adopted SCS.

AB 2438 (Friedman) Transportation Funding Programs – WATCH

This bill would require the state agencies and departments that administer transportation funding programs (SHOPP, STIP, SCCP, RMRA, LPP, TCEP, LSR) to revise the guidelines or plans applicable to those programs to ensure that projects included in the applicable program align with the California Transportation Plan, the Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure and specified greenhouse gas emissions reduction standards. The bill would require CalSTA, Caltrans, and the CTC, in consultation with ARB and the Strategic Growth Council, to prepare and submit a report to the Legislature on or before January 1, 2025, that comprehensively reevaluates transportation program funding levels, projects, and eligibility criteria with the objective of aligning the largest funding programs with the goals set forth in the above-described plans and away from projects that increase VMT.

Re: April Report

During the month of April, we monitored transportation legislation relevant to Solano Transportation Authority. We kept STA staff apprised of developments with the Department of Transportation's implementation of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). We also scheduled meetings with congressional staff to brief them on the community projects STA is seeking funding for in the fiscal year 2023 Department of Transportation annual funding bill.

Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act

On April 6, the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) <u>announced</u> more than \$20 billion in investment in American transit. The funding will enable transit agencies to modernize and expand services for residents in communities large and small. Full-year funding is available following Congressional passage of an FY 2022 appropriations bill in March.

On April 12, DOT <u>published</u> a \$1 million Notice of Funding Opportunity for the Bus Exportable Power Systems (BEPS) Program. The funding would be for an organization or partnership to develop standards for exportable power systems from electric and fuel cell-powered buses, which can supply electricity to community buildings, emergency shelters, and hospitals during power disruptions. Applications are open until June 13.

On April 21, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) <u>announced</u> that it was issuing guidance for the new Carbon Reduction Program (CRP), which will \$6.4 billion in formula funding for states and localities over five years to help states develop carbon reduction strategies and address the climate crisis. The CRP will fund projects that would include installing infrastructure to support the electrification of commercial and passenger vehicles, Bus Rapid Transit corridors, and projects to facilitate micro-mobility and non-motorized transportation.

DOT also has announced target dates for releasing notices of funding opportunity for the following competitive grant programs that may be of interest to STA:

• Safe Streets and Roads for All Grants – May.

- Bridge Investment Program (competitive grants) May.
- Railroad Crossing Elimination Grants June.
- Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvements (CRISI) Grants August.
- Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation Grants (SMART) September.

Fiscal Year 2023 Appropriations

After including community projects (formerly known as earmarks) in the fiscal year 2022 appropriations legislation, the chairs of the House and Senate Appropriations Committees announced they would once again accept requests for community projects from Members of Congress. STA submitted requests for funding for Vaca Valley Parkway, Jepson Parkway, Travis Air Force Base North Gate Access and Canon Road, SR 37 and Fairground Drive and SolTrans electric buses. We briefed congressional staff regarding the projects.

The bipartisan leadership of the House and Senate and Senate Appropriations Committees are meeting on Thursday to discuss the timeline and process for advancing the fiscal year 2023 appropriations bills. Their objective is to eventually settle on top-line funding levels that pave the way to final passage of the 12 annual spending bills. Debate over the fiscal year 2022 appropriations bills dragged on with the legislation not passing until February of this year. With this year being an election year it remains to be seen whether Congress can wrap up work on appropriations legislation before the start of the new fiscal year on October 1.

Mask Mandate for Transportation

On April 18, Judge Kathryn Kimball Mizelle ruled in the United States District Court, Middle District of Florida regarding the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Mask Mandate. The mandate requires face masks to be worn while using public transportation. Judge Mizelle vacated the mask mandate on the basis that the regulation violates rulemaking procedures and exceeds the CDC's authority. The CDC released a statement on April 20 stating that the mandate continues to be necessary for public safety, and the Department of Justice subsequently appealed the decision.

Background:

With the recent actions related to the One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) Cycle 3 process, STA staff is providing a summary of the history of traffic safety, the Regional Safety/Vision Zero initiative and local streets and road safety policies. The purpose of this informational item is to provide background information to the STA Board as they consider future actions related to the allocation options being considered for the OBAG 3 County Program.

Discussion:

Safety and Active Transportation has been a priority for the STA since the agency was established in 1990. The first Solano Countywide Bicycle Plan was developed by STA in 1998 and the Solano Countywide Trails Plan in 2002, which, collectively, plan a safe, accessible, and connected bicycle and pedestrian network in Solano County. The first Solano Travel Safety Plan was created in 2005 to identify traffic deficiencies in the County and recommend a program of cost-effective travel safety programs and projects. One of the key findings of the Travel Safety Plan was the limited travel safety education programs in the County, which became the impetus for the creation of the STA Solano Safe Routes to School Program (SR2S). This program will be discussed further in this report.

Federal, State and Regional Focus on Traffic Safety

In recent years, a new approach to addressing traffic safety, called Vision Zero, has received increased attention in addressing traffic collisions on highways and roadways. Vision Zero is a policy-based framework that seeks to eliminate all traffic fatalities and severe injuries from roadways while increasing safe, healthy and equitable mobility for all. This concept was introduced in Sweden in 1997 and achieved significant success in reducing fatal or severe injuries on roadways using proven countermeasures. Since then, the implementation of this approach has seen highly successful outcomes in other countries.

The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) recognized the importance of addressing traffic safety in the Bay Area region, and thus, initiated their efforts to implement their regional Vision Zero initiative with the goal of eliminating traffic fatalities and serious injuries in the Bay Area by 2030. To reinforce their commitment to this issue, Plan Bay Area 2050 identifies the advancement of a Vision Zero road safety policy as a key strategy in their goal to "Create Healthy and Safe Streets."

In 2020, MTC passed *Resolution 4400: Regional Safety/Vision Zero Policy* to motivate and facilitate action across the region by eliminating some duplication of costs among local jurisdictions through a regional safety strategy and approach. MTC provides data and technical assistance related to traffic safety to jurisdictions that need it, allowing local governments to redirect their limited safety dollars towards enforcement and engineering.

At the federal level, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) prioritizes safety on the nation's roadways by coordinating efforts with the states under the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP). Federal regulations require that each State has a Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP), a statewide data-driven traffic safety plan to reduce traffic accident fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads.

Solano Countywide Local Road Safety Plan

Beginning with HSIP Cycle 11 in 2022, a Local Road Safety Plan (LRSP), or its equivalent such as Systemic Safety Analysis Report (SSAR) or Vision Zero Action Plan, will be required for an agency to be eligible to apply for federal HSIP funds. An LRSP provides a framework to systematically identify, analyze, and prioritize roadway safety improvements on local roads, creating an opportunity to address unique highway safety needs in local jurisdictions while contributing to the success of the SHSP. Many state and regional funding programs have already adopted similar requirements for a LRSP, including MTC's OBAG Cycle 3 Program, and more funding programs are anticipated to follow suit.

In order to help local agencies be proactive in meeting these new eligibility requirements for state and regional funding, the STA has been working with member agencies to develop a *Solano Countywide Local Road Safety Plan (Solano LRSP)* that will include individual plans for each jurisdiction. In conjunction with this effort, a countywide Vision Zero policy was also adopted that will provide blanket eligibility for all Solano jurisdictions pursuing State or Regional funding opportunities. The *Solano LRSP* is anticipated to be completed by June 2022, in time for the HSIP Cycle 11, and will include a prioritized list of safety improvements and actions across the County that member agencies will be focused on implementing.

STA Safe Routes to School Program (SR2S)

SR2S is another key strategy to improve pedestrian/bicycle safety, targeting students across Solano County schools. Created in 2008 upon the adoption of Solano's first Safe Routes to School Plan, the program focuses on activities and programs that educate students and parents on safety, health awareness and identifying improvements within communities countywide to enhance active student travel safety. The program addresses the 6 "E's": education, encouragement, enforcement, engineering, engagement, and evaluation. SR2S is available to all schools countywide and engages the seven Safe Routes to School Community Task Forces in each city, including the school district, to guide their work.

Safe Routes to Transit (SR2T)

Bicycling and walking are cost-effective and sustainable ways to reach regional transit stations, yet many commuters cite safety as the main reason they decide to drive instead. SR2T promotes bicycling and walking to transit stations by planning and funding projects that make non-motorized feeder trips easier, faster, and safer. Improving the safety and convenience of bicycling and walking to regional transit provides commuters the opportunity to leave their cars at home.

The STA originally focused on SR2T in 2011 with the goal to increase transit ridership by identifying specific strategies that improve transit center access and bicyclist and pedestrian safety.

2020 Solano Countywide Active Transportation Plan

Improving multi-modal infrastructure is essential to achieving the zero-fatality goal put forward by Vision Zero, including ensuring adequate bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure. Our member agencies have made good progress in building out the bicycle and pedestrian network in Solano County over the years and apply for federal, state, and regional grant funding to obtain resources to be able to continue delivering their active transportation projects.

The STA developed the 2020 Solano Active Transportation Plan (ATP), an element of the County Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP), that identifies gaps in the County's bike and pedestrian network. The Plan builds upon previous active transportation planning efforts and consolidates Solano Transportation Authority's Countywide Bicycle, Pedestrian, Safe Routes to School, and Safe Routes to Transit Plans into one cohesive Plan. The Plan establishes countywide priorities and provides project lists for each jurisdiction. Implementation of this plan is key to creating a safer, and more connected network to help people of all ages and abilities feel comfortable walking and bicycling.

Complete Streets

Lastly, in 2008, the California Complete Streets Act was signed into law. It requires all cities and counties to include Complete Streets policies in general plans in all substantive revisions of the circulation element. Subsequently, the California Department of Transportation (CalTrans) adopted a Complete Streets directive in 2010, which requires that the design and implementation of facilities support all modes of transportation, including bicyclists, pedestrians, people with disabilities, and transit riders. MTC also requires the implementation of Complete Streets to receive regional funding, including access to the OBAG funding. Member agencies have been in compliance with the Complete Streets requirements and will continue to focus on delivering active transportation projects in the ATP with and/or Active Transportation and Complete Streets elements.

All of these strategies to address traffic safety tie into key Plan Bay Area 2050 goals, by encouraging active transportation, reducing reliance on greenhouse gas emitting modes of transportation, and addressing significant equity issues.

Discussion:

Below is a list of funding opportunities that will be available to STA member agencies during the next few months, broken up by Federal, State, and Local. Attachment A provides further details for each program.
