Background:

On October 12, 2022 the STA approved the Countywide Wayfinding Sign Program Call for Projects Year 2 of a 3-Year Program. The STA's Board action was due in part by the recommendation of the BAC and PAC to install wayfinding signs around Solano County. Due to the recommendation, there was a set-aside funding allocation of \$25,000 each year for three years of the Transportation Act Article 3 (TDA-3) funds towards the development of the Wayfinding Sign Program.


The program seeks to install wayfinding signs around Solano County so residents can locate and access active transportation and/or provide directional information to important community locations such as downtowns, electrical vehicle charging stations, schools libraries, parks etc.

Public or private entities in the jurisdiction of Solano County are eligible to apply to this fund source. Some examples of eligible participants include but are not limited to, schools, trail groups, cities, and community-based organizations.

Discussion:

On October 6, 2022 STA staff presented on the Wayfinding Sign Program Call for Projects and to continue engagement the PAC is being tasked to review and approve the draft application template for the Wayfinding Sign Program Year 2 Call for Projects (Attachment A).

Timeline for the Wayfinding Sing Program Call for Projects:



May 4, 2023	STA staff will is scheduled to present on the project submittals, and BAC will discuss and forward funding recommendations of projects to the STA Board.
June 14, 2023	Project recommendations from both the BAC and PAC are to be taken to the STA Board for approval.

Background:


Solano Transportation Authority (STA) Board of Directors approved a funding allocation of \$25,000 a year for three years of Transportation Development Act Article 3 (TDA-3) funds towards the development of the Wayfinding Sign Program that started in January 2022. The STA Board's action was due in large part to the Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC) and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC) recommendation to install wayfinding signs around Solano County so residents can better locate and access active transportation infrastructures such as connections to transit, bicycle, and pedestrian projects.

There is \$25,000 available for the Wayfinding Sign Program for FY 2022-23 (Year 2 of a 3-Year Program).

Eligible Recipients:

Private and public entities in the jurisdiction of Solano County are encouraged to apply, such as schools, trail groups, cities, and community-based organizations. Some examples of wayfinding projects include but are not limited to the replacement of old/broken signs and the procurement of new signs that are related to active transportation and/or provide directional information to important community locations such as downtowns, electric vehicle charging stations, schools, libraries, etc.

Background:

The Solano Transportation Authority's (STA) Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP) serves as the primary long range planning document that guides and prioritizes the STA's investments in transportation. Transportation projects and programs seeking STA discretionary funding (e.g. One Bay Area Grant (OBAG), Transportation Development Act (TDA) and Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD) Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) Program Funds) or support must be identified in the STA's Comprehensive Transportation Plan for consideration. The STA's CTP was last updated in 2020.

The STA's CTP is also the foundational document from which transportation projects and programs are considered for the Metropolitan Transportation Commission's (MTC) Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) called Plan Bay Area. MTC recently announced that they anticipate initiating their next RTP update in Spring/Summer 2023 with the goal to have counties provide input on updated county projects and programs by Spring 2024. This would allow time for MTC to complete their Plan Bay Area update by 2025.

The CTP includes the following elements:

- 1. Active Transportation Element
- 2. Arterials, Highways and Freeways Element
- 3. Transit and Rideshare Element Update

The CTP also includes a Transportation Equity Chapter and a Transportation and Land Use Chapter. A copy of the STA's 2020 CTP is available online from the STA's webpage at this web address:

https://sta.ca.gov/documents_and_report/solano-comprehensive-transportation-plan-ctp/#:~:text=The%20STA's%20Comprehensive%20Transportation%20Plan,was%20completed%20in%20June%202020.

Discussion:

The STA Board has established ad hoc policy subcommittees for each CTP element and working groups for the CTP chapters. Participants include STA Board members and their alternates as well as staff from the STA Technical Advisory Committee, Solano Express Transit Consortium and the Solano Planning Director's Group. Participants from the STA Bicycle Advisory Committee, Pedestrian Advisory Committee and Paratransit Coordinating Council will also be invited to participate. The policy subcommittees and working group's role is to assist in guiding the development of their respective element and chapters.

STA staff plans on reconvening and updating the participants list for each policy subcommittee and is seeking two appointments from the STA PAC at this time. The appointments are for: 1) Arterials, Highways and Freeways Element Subcommittee and 2) Active Transportation Element Subcommittee. STA staff anticipates having 4 Subcommittee meetings during the development of the CTP Plan with meetings held once per quarter. The goal is to update the CTP in time for MTC's PBA project submittal in 2024.

RE: One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) Cycle 3 Update

Background:

Every four or five years, the STA, as the Congestion Management Agency for Solano County, works with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) to program federal transportation planning funds, called the One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) process.

The OBAG 1 and OBAG 2 Programs established program commitments and policies for investing federal funds through FY 2021-22. The third cycle of OBAG, called OBAG 3, covers Fiscal Years (FYs) 2022-23 through 2025-26.

At its meeting on May 11th, the STA Board issued a Call for Projects and Programs for \$15.11 million (120% County Target) with the following three program categories that project sponsors can apply for: (1) Countywide Vision Zero/Active Transportation Program (*Funding Target:* \$11.11 million); (2) Suburban Housing Incentive Partnership (SubHIP) Program (*Funding Target:* \$2.5 million); and 3. Mobility Program (*Funding Target:* \$1.5 million). Per the STA Board direction, the Mobility Program was dedicated to the Solano Mobility's One-Stop Call Center and Employer Program.

The Call for Projects and Programs was open for six weeks, from May 12th through June 30th. The STA Board received a total of 12 applications from seven project sponsors. Project sponsors requested a total of \$19.5 million for their proposed projects and programs.

Discussion:

On September 14, 2022, the STA Board approved 10 projects/programs and submitted this list to MTC for their final review and approval prior to their September 30th deadline.

MTC OBAG Cycle 3 Funding Awards

On January 4th, MTC approved the OBAG 3 Funding Recommendations for all nine Bay Area Counties. In summary, MTC staff recommended fully funding 7 out of the 10 projects/programs that the STA nominated, for a total of \$11,911,000. This amount translates to Solano County receiving 99.93% of our County target share. The MTC OBAG 3 Funding Recommendations for STA nominated projects/programs are included as Attachment B.

Planning and Project Delivery Staff Next Steps

Three STA nominated projects were not recommended for OBAG 3 funding by MTC, which include the following:

- (1) City of Vacaville's Markham and Kairos Safe Routes to School Improvements (Funding Request: \$1,432,077),
- (2) City of Benicia's Military West Project (Funding Request: \$1,400,000), and
- (3) City of Suisun City's Driftwood Drive Path Gap Closure Project (Funding Request: \$366,515).

STA Planning staff plan on coordinating with these project sponsors to craft a multi-year funding implementation plan over the next few months. This will likely include future potential Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3 and Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD) Transportation Funding for Clean Air (TFCA) funding.

RE: Update on Other Funding Programs

Background:

Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) Cycle 11

The Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) is a competitive grant program administered by CalTrans. The Call for Projects for HSIP Cycle 11 was issued in summer of 2022 and there was\$174 million in funding available for Benefit Cost Ratio (BCR) Projects and \$36 million in funding set-asides, with each member agency able to secure up to \$250,000 in Pedestrian Set-Aside Funding. Eligible project types for this set-aside includes pedestrian safety improvements, such as striping, rectangular rapid-flashing beacons (RRFBs), curb bulb outs or curb ramps.

In June 2022, STA staff garnered the PAC's feedback on project ideas and prioritization of pedestrian projects from the Local Road Safety Plan to consider for HSIP Cycle 11. STA staff shared this feedback with member agencies for their consideration as they developed their HSIP applications. The application deadline was on September 2022 and project selection results are anticipated to be released in January 2023.

Safe Streets for All Program (SS4A)

The new Safe Streets for All Program (SS4A) was created as part of the federal 2021 Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) and provides up to \$5 billion in funding from Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23 to FY 2026-27. The goal of the program is to fund safety improvement projects that reduce crashes and fatalities, especially for cyclists and pedestrians. There was \$1 billion in funding available for the FY 2022-23 cycle and the Call for Projects opened in early 2022. The STA coordinated with member agencies to develop a program of safety projects in Solano County to apply for this grant opportunity. The STA submitted an application with a total project cost of \$28 million and requested \$19M in SS4A. The application deadline was on September 15, 2022 and the project selection results are anticipated to be released in January 2023.

Active Transportation Program Cycle 6

In 2013, Active Transportation Program (ATP) was created by Senate Bill 99 to encourage increased use of active modes of transportation, such as walking and biking. ATP funding is distributed with 50% for the statewide competitive program, 10% to the small urban and rural area competitive program that is managed by the state, and the remaining 40% for a regional competitive program, managed by Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs). The Metropolitan Transportation Commission administers the regional ATP program for the Bay Area counties.

There was \$853 million available for the statewide component and \$143 million for the MTC's regional program. ATP Cycle 6 was augmented by a one-time allocation of \$1 billion from the 2022-23 state budget, so the regional component was larger than years past with an additional

\$93 million in available funding. The CTC adopted the statewide ATP project awards in December 2022 and the MTC regional program results were adopted in January 2023.

Discussion:

STA staff will provide an update on the funding awards for the above-mentioned funding opportunities.

Statewide Competitive ATP & Quick Build Pilot Program Results

The CTC adopted the Statewide Competitive ATP list of projects on December 7, 2022. CTC funded six projects in the MTC region for a total of \$88 million, out of a statewide program of \$853 million (about 10% of the statewide total), as listed below.

The state received 434 applications requesting over \$3.1 billion in ATP funds. This cycle, the average ATP request size increased to \$7.1 million per application, up from \$5 million in Cycle 5. The CTC ultimately funded 67 projects from the statewide ATP component.

The 2023 Active Transportation Program included the Quick-Build Project Pilot Program with up to \$7 million in funding available from the Statewide component. None of the Quick-Build Project Pilot Program project applications met the funding recommendation scoring threshold of 89 points for the Statewide component. Therefore, CTC did not fund any quick-build projects. The CTC will continue to refine the pilot program and intends on including it in future ATP cycles.

Statewide Competitive ATP Discussion

MTC staff debriefed with the CTC ATP program management team immediately after the CTC's publication of the draft recommendations to discuss the Cycle 6 results, review application

patterns, and the future of the program. A notable discovery from these discussions is that small urban and rural agencies outperformed agencies within the ten large MPOs (large MPOs like MTC receive dedicated ATP funds for their regions). Further, agencies not in a large MPO tended to work more collaboratively with their MPO or regional agency to develop more robust and refined ATP applications. Since smaller MPOs and regional agencies do not have a regional program to administer, their staff have no conflict of interest in a regional component to support and prioritize member applications. Regional support and prioritization, along with local agencies engaged in the application process, seemed to contribute to better overall application performance in the statewide ATP competition.

Strategies for future ATP Cycles

Looking ahead to future ATP cycles, MTC staff recommends implementing a suite of strategies to improve performance in the program. This may include, but not limited to, strategies such as:

- Hold a singular call for projects for active transportation elements, that may include other programs such as OBAG4 and Regional Measure 3 Safe Routes to Transit;
- Develop a prioritization and screening process, in collaboration with County
 Transportation Agencies, with Commission approval;
- Provide early application scope review and development for prioritized projects,
 leveraging MTC and external consultant expertise; and
- Expand the MTC technical assistance program beyond application review.

Notably, on the last point, staff recommends programming OBAG3 regional funds for ATP technical assistance – which is included in the OBAG3 item on this month's Programming and Allocations Committee agenda. Staff will return to this committee in the coming months to present strategies for consideration ahead of ATP Cycle 7. Applications for ATP Cycle 7 is expected to be due in mid-2024.
