Employer/Commuter Programs – Amend and Extend the Solano Mobility Express
Vanpool Program, Extend the Equitable Access to Justice Program, and Amend and

Extend the Solano Express Guaranteed Ride Program

Lorene Garrett reported on the second quarter of the Employer and Commuter Programs for FY 2023-24. She presented and outlined each of the recommendations.

Chair Feinstein requested STA staff to schedule a coordination meeting in May or June to have discussion with the STA, transit operators and Solano Superior Court on how our transit systems can assist in providing services beyond what is currently recommended to be approved for the Equitable Access to Justice Program.

After discussion, Robert Guerrero made a motion, seconded by Gwendolyn Hill, to approve:

1. Extending the funding agreement with the Solano Superior Court for the Equitable Access to Justice Pilot Program to 30 June 2025 at the current cost of an amount not-to-exceed \$50,000 per year with STA contributing up to \$40,000 per year from Solano County TDA funds and the Court contributing 20% in matching funds up to \$10,000 per year and to include the caveat noted above in *bold italics*.

The motion passed unanimously with a 9/0 vote.

Lorene Garrett proceeded with her presentation related to recommendations 2 through 4 noted below. She reviewed the statistics noting a decrease in vanpool program numbers due to the end of the two-year subsidy, and an increase in participation in the Guaranteed Ride Program. She also discussed the success of the Solano Mobility Express Vanpool Pilot Program and outlined the request to amend their agreements with Uber and Shared Mobility.

- 2. Extend the agreement with Uber for the Solano Express Guaranteed Ride program (under Guaranteed Ride Home) and Equitable Access to Justice Pilot Program to June 30, 2025.
- 3. Amend the agreement with Uber for the Solano Express Guaranteed Ride program to increase to an amount not-to-exceed \$175,000.

4. Amend the agreement with SHARE Mobility for the Solano Mobility Express Vanpool Pilot Program to extend the program to 30 June 2025 at a cost in the amount not-to-exceed \$116/revenue hour and \$555,636 per year.

After discussion, Robert Guerrero made a motion, seconded by Lori DaMassa, to approve recommendations 2, 3, and 4. The motion passed by a 7 to 2 vote. Diane Feinstein and Beth Kranda voted no.

RE: STA's Draft Overall Work Plan (OWP) for FYs 2024-25 and 2025-26

Background:

Each year, the Solano Transportation Authority (STA) Board and staff identify and update the STA's priority plans, projects, and programs. These tasks provide the foundation for the STA's OWP for the forthcoming two fiscal years. In July 2002, the STA Board modified the adoption of its list of priority projects to coincide with the adoption of its two-year budget. This marked the first time the STA had adopted a two-year Overall Work Plan.

Over the past 20 plus years, the STA's Overall Work Plan (OWP) has continued to evolve based on changing Board priorities, requests from the eight member agencies that comprise the STA's Joint Powers Authority (JPA), and to address priorities, policies, and requirements emanating from the federal, state, and the region. The focus of the STA during the timeframe of 2000 to 2005 was to complete the first Solano County Comprehensive Transportation Plan, initiate various corridor studies, and identify a handful of priority projects to fund and advance into construction. From 2005 to the present, the STA has taken a more proactive role in advancing projects through a variety of project development activities and has expanded its transit coordination role in partnership with Solano's five local transit operators, the Capitol Corridors, and the San Francisco Bay Ferry. STA is now managing numerous mobility programs, through our role as a Consolidated Transit Service Agency (CTSA), designed to improve mobility and access for older adults, people with disabilities, low-income residents traveling to work, shopping, medical appointments, veterans, and school-age children and their parents traveling to and from school.

Planning FY 2023-24

STA's planning activities during this past fiscal year included focusing on supporting the City County Coordinating Council and helping the cities and County complete their Housing Elements. This effort has been done through the Solano Housing Collaborative and will continue into the next FY. Planning staff will be carrying forward the Solano Rail Hub Implementation Plan effort into the next FY and has initiated the start of the Comprehensive Transportation Plan. Planning staff has undertaken updating the Safe Routes to Schools Plan, and the Rail Crossing Study. Staff has worked with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) on the Plan Bay Area 2050 implementation which has 35 recommendations divided into four quadrants of transportation, housing, economic development and environment, and the allocation of One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) 3 funding. Planning staff also continued administering Clean Air and Active Transportation funds through the Bay Area Air Quality Management District, Transportation for Clean Air Program and TDA Article 3 Program.

Projects FY 2023-24

In 2009, the STA's eight member agencies approved an update and modification to the STA's Joint Powers Agreement that authorized the STA to perform all aspects of project development and delivery, including right of way functions for specified priority projects.

This past fiscal year, the STA's project development activities included the following:

- Received Board approval to initiate the construction for the upgrade to the SR 37/Fairgrounds Interchange and obtained Regional Measure 3 funds for the construction phase.
- ➤ Worked with MTC and Caltrans to initiate the design phase for SR 37 Interim Congestion Relief Project (Mare Island Interchange to SR 37/121).
- The construction is complete for Phase 2 of the I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange through a Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC) project delivery approach with STA serving as the lead for the design and right of way phases for the project. Received Board approval to initiate design for Phase 5 of the Interchange.
- > STA landed two SB1 Grants two years ago, \$123.4M for the I-80 Managed Lanes Project construction phase which started construction in May 2022 and is slated to be open in 2025., and \$26M for the I-80 Westbound Truck Scales design phase with STA taking the lead on the design phase which is at 95% completion.
- ➤ This year, STA obtained another SB 1 grant (\$129M) for construction of the I-80 Westbound Truck Scales with STA taking the lead for right of way acquisition.
- ➤ Implementation of the 2018 and 2020 State Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP) grants for Solano Express Service Integration and Electrification are still underway.
- ➤ In partnership with Caltrans and Vallejo, secured additional state funding for the SR 29 Sonoma Blvd. Complete Streets implementation as part of the Caltrans rehabilitation project which will begin work in FY 2025.
- ➤ In partnership with Caltrans and Rio Vista, the SR 12 SHOPP project will be delivered in three phases with the first phase nearly completed and phases 2 and 3 to start in FY 2025.
- ➤ Completed the tenth annual report for the Regional Transportation Impact Fee (RTIF) Program which passed the \$20 million milestone in funds generated for the Program.
- ➤ The Abandoned Vehicles Abatement (AVA) Program reimbursed 3,596 vehicles abated during the previous fiscal year.
- ➤ Submitted SR 113 to Caltrans as a 2024 SHOPP priority.
- > Developed updated funding plan for Jepson Parkway project phases.
- ➤ Obtained \$850,000 federal earmark from Congressman Garamendi for SR 37 Fairgrounds project.

Programs FY 2023-24

STA's Program Department has remained active in providing mobility programs and options. The assortment of 16 countywide and local communities services and programs offered have continued to grow and evolve. STA's First and Last Mile Program partnership with LYFT continued to bridge service gaps resulting from the transit service cuts. While people commuting began to gradually return over this past year, the Solano Employer Commuter Information Program has updated the vanpool program, which formed 11 new vanpools, and the bucks for bikes programs to encourage the transition from single vehicle occupancy. Staff has been focusing on building partnerships with our adjacent counties along the SR 37, I-80 and I-680 travel corridors to eliminate barriers for the commuters between counties. The Safe Routes to School (SR2S) Program had another proactive and productive school year with the initiation of a 3rd cycle of Micro Grant Projects and another round of enforcement grants.

STA initiated a subsidized vanpool pilot between Vacaville, Dixon and Sacramento following the suspension of Blue Line service by SolTrans. The STA, with funding provided by MTC, has initiated a Connected Mobility Implementation Plan which provides important information regarding performance measures, developed a SR 37 Transit/TDM Plan, and how best to respond to the 27 recommendations and six focus areas brought forward by MTC's Blue Ribbon Transit Recovery Task Force. Overall, the Programs Department has continued to provide mobility services throughout the county, the summary includes:

- ✓ The Solano Mobility Call Center assisted 7,486 individuals by phone, 355 in person, and 84,987 website users
- ✓ Assessed 123 individuals for American with Disabilities Act (ADA) eligibility.
- ✓ Expanded the Intercity Paratransit Taxi Card Program to include non-ambulatory services and provided 1,1,38 trips with 479 active users and implemented the program in Suisun City with 126 residents signed up and began expanding the program to Veterans (75 Registered with 389 rides). 945 WAV rides were provided.
- ✓ Completed 89 Travel Training and 7 field trips.
- ✓ GoGo Grandparents provided 8,842 trips.
- ✓ trips taken on First Last Mile Program.
- ✓ 41,312 trips taken on First Last Mile Program.
- ✓ 253 employer engagements through Solano Mobility and the Solano EDC at Chamber and tabled events in fiscal year 2023/24.
- ✓ Formed 3 new vanpools and subsidized up to 20.
- ✓ Launched the Equitable Access to Justice Pilot providing 74 rides for jurors and collaborative court participants through the second quarter.
- ✓ Launched the Solano Mobility Express Vanpool Pilot providing 3,016 rides with zero runs missed and 4.96 /5 for 300 ratings.
- ✓ Updated incentives programs to enhance goals of the programs.

Discussion:

Attached for review is the STA's Draft OWP for FY's 2024-25 and 2025-26. The 22 plans, 13 projects and 26 programs contained in the current OWP have been updated to reflect milestones achieved and contain new additions approved by the STA Board during FY 2023-24 that increase the OWP to 61 items.

PROJECT DELIVERY/COMPLETE PROJECTS/NEAR TERM CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Gearing up for the STA's Budget for FY 2024-25 and 2025-26, the following five OWP projects are fully funded and are now completed, currently under construction or slated to be in construction in FY 2024-2025 or 2025-26:

- I-80 Managed Lanes (Conversion of HOV Lanes to Express Lanes from Red Top Road to Air Base Parkway and the New Express Lanes from Air Base Parkway to I-505) Under Construction
- I-80 Westbound Truck Scales (design phase underway with SB 1 grant and requesting RM 3 for right of way)— STA (environmentally cleared)-RM 3/SB1 TCEP/Federal Earmark — Construction 2025.
- SR12 SHOPP/Complete Highways Project construction scheduled for 2025 and 2026
- SR 29 SHOPP/Complete Highways Project construction scheduled for 2024-25
- SR 37/Fairgrounds Interchange Improvements (Design phase completed, RM 3 to begin construction and seeking additional funding STA/County/Vallejo/Caltrans RM 3/STIP/Local Match/Federal Earmark

There are several projects that are currently in the project development phase with a specific project development phase currently funded so that work can continue, but the project is not fully funded and the STA is seeking additional future funds for construction.

- I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange Phase 5 design phase– RM 3
- SR 37 Interim Congestion Relief Project (SR 121 to Mare Island), design phase funded Caltrans/MTC/STA/SCTA/NVTA – RM 3/SB1/State Funding
- Jepson Parkway remaining unfunded segments City of Fairfield and Vacaville Fairfield and Vacaville to seek Developer Implementation– RTIF/TIF/LPP/Others

Finally, there are several projects that are included in the OWP, but the initial or next phase of the project is not currently funded in the current two-year budget.

- I-80 Express Lanes Project Carquinez Bridge to SR 37 seeking environmental phase funding
- I-80 Express Lanes I-505 to Yolo County Line Seeking PID Funding
- Mare Island Interchange- Seeking PID funding

TRANSIT CENTERS

In recent years, STA has partnered with local transit operators and cities to improve and upgrade regional transit centers. There are several priority transit centers that the STA has successfully pursued and obtained or programmed federal, state or regional funds for. Several of these projects are moving through the project development stage into construction. These projects are initial phases of larger planned transit projects that are not fully funded. The larger, long range transit centers are as follows:

- Vallejo Station Phase B- RM 3 eligible -initial funding requested for environmental/design
- Fairfield/Vacaville Hannigan Rail Station Phase 2 (Station Building/Additional Parking)

- The Solano Mobility Management Call Center will continue to be marketed to likely users to increase awareness of mobility options

- Completion of ninth year of In-Person ADA Eligibility Program will continue with the added ease of over the phone assessments if applicable

- The Employer-Commuter Program is looking to expand the use and marketing of Ride Amigos, First and Last Mile, vanpool connections and working along corridors with our neighboring counties
- Implementation tenth year of the RTIF Program

There are several primary tasks for STA working with the transit operators in FY 2024-25. First will be implementation and incentives for the return of customers to transit, working collaboratively on the Solano Connected Mobility Implementation Plan, coordination with the Solano County Transit 2030 committee, and update of Solano Express Funding Agreement.

The OWP contains plans, projects, transit projects, city project, transit/mobility programs, and coordination or funding programs. The draft OWP will be presented to the Consortium and TAC in April and the STA Board in May with Board adoption scheduled for June of 2024.

The two-year OWP will lead up to the Board's adoption of STA's updated two-year budget scheduled for July.

Recommendation:

Forward a recommendation to the STA TAC and STA Board to release the STA's Draft Overall Work Plan (OWP) for FY 2024-25 and 2025-26 for a 30-day review period as shown in Attachment A.

SOLANO COUNTY TRANSIT ("SolTrans")

JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT

This Joint Powers Agreement is by and among the CITY OF BENICIA, a municipal corporation (hereinafter "BENICIA"), the City of Vallejo, a municipal corporation (hereinafter "VALLEJO"), and the SOLANO TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY (hereafter "STA"), a joint powers agency and the congestion management agency for Solano County (hereinafter "STA"), which public entities (collectively "Members" or "Member Agencies") have entered into this Joint Powers Agreement ("Agreement") creating Solano County Transit hereinafter "SolTrans", a joint powers agency. All Members of SolTrans are public entities organized and operating under the laws of the State of California and each is a public agency as defined in California Government Code Section 6500.

RECITALS

- A. Government Code Sections 6500-6515 permit two or more local public agencies, by agreement, to jointly exercise any power common to them and, thereby, authorizes the Members to enter into this Agreement.
- B. In the performance of their essential governmental functions, Benicia and Vallejo each provide transit services within their respective municipal boundaries and to areas outside of said boundaries in order to perform or participate in intercity, regional transit services.
- C. Among the responsibilities and transportation functions performed by STA, said agency provides planning, funding and management of intercity transit routes and paratransit services and, further, STA is eligible to act as a transit provider.
- D. Public entities have the opportunity to provide transit and related services in a cooperative and coordinated manner, in order to best manage the public resources committed and necessary for delivery of such transit services.
- E. The formation of SolTrans enables the Members to take advantage of the opportunities for more economical provision of transit services through economies of scale and to improve and expand the provision of a variety of transit services including, but not limited to, normal and customary intra-city bus transit, intercity transit, paratransit services, dial-a-ride, commuter and passenger ferries, and connecting transit to other transportation providers such as BART and/or the Capitol Corridor commuter train in such manner and at such time as the Members may decide necessary and appropriate for public benefit.
- F. The governing board of each Member has determined that it is in the Member's best interest and in the public interest, that this Agreement be executed and they become Participating Members of SolTrans.

AGREEMENT

1. Formation of Solano County Transit ("SolTrans")

Pursuant to Chapter 5, Division 7, Title 1 of the Government Code of the State of California (commencing with Section 6500) as amended from time to time, and commonly known as the Joint Powers Authority Law, the Members create a joint powers agency which is named Solano County Transit and may otherwise be referred to as "SolTrans" or such other acronym, brand or identifier as determined appropriate by the Board.

2. Parties to Agreement

In mutual consideration of the promises herein, each Member certifies that it intends to, and does, contract with every other Member which is a signatory to this Agreement and, in addition, with such other Member as may be later added as provided in Section 23. Each Member also certifies that the deletion of any Member from this Agreement does not affect this Agreement or the remaining Members' intent to contract with the other Members then remaining.

3. Purpose

SolTrans will be the agency created by the merger of the presently existing transit services in Benicia and Vallejo through this joint powers agreement. Upon execution of this Agreement, SolTrans will operate as a unified entity separate and apart from the originating Members.

4. Transfer of Assets; Succession to Existing Contracts

Upon approval of this Agreement, the Members will endeavor to enter into use agreements with regards to the assets designated in the transition plan for the transition period which will be from date of execution of this Agreement until July 1, 2011. The transition period may be extended by mutual consent of the parties. Once SolTrans receives approval of its status as a qualified grantee by necessary grantors, including the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), Benicia and Vallejo will transfer, and SolTrans will receive, designated transit related assets, personal property, rolling stock and equipment of each presently operating transit service. Unless prohibited by law, SolTrans shall succeed to and undertake designated transit related agreements in place as set forth in the transition plan. Any debt of a Member to be assumed by SolTrans such as, but not limited to, funds advanced by Members to their transit system, shall be specifically set forth and described in the asset transfer inventory and/or transition plan; provided, that nothing in this agreement shall require transfer of any asset subject to a lien or leasehold securing certificates of participation or other evidence of indebtedness issued by or on behalf of any Member unless such lien or leasehold is duly released by the holders of such certificates of participation or other evidence of indebtedness.

5. Transit Employees

To the degree allowed by law, or otherwise negotiated, existing transit employees of each Member Agency will become employees of SolTrans. Notwithstanding paragraph 22 of this Agreement (indemnification), SolTrans accepts responsibility for any claims arising due to such transfer of employment post formation of SolTrans, including, but not limited to, any Federal Section 13(c) claims or any employee association claims regarding changes in wages, benefits or working conditions.

6. Membership

In addition to the originating members Benicia, Vallejo and STA, the following entities, or types of entities, are eligible for membership in SolTrans:

- a. Municipal corporations located within the County of Solano;
- b. The County of Solano; or
- c. Any other public entity or public/private partnership providing, or proposed to provide, transit in Solano County.

7. Limitation

For purposes of California Government Code Section 6509, the powers of SolTrans shall be exercised subject to the restrictions upon the manner of exercising such powers as are imposed upon the City of Benicia, a general law city. Should Benicia withdraw as a Member, then the powers of SolTrans shall be exercised subject to the restrictions upon the manner of exercising such powers as are imposed upon any other general law city which is then a Member and, if there be none, as are imposed upon STA.

8. Guiding Principles

The following Principles are intended to guide SolTrans' provision of transit services:

- a. The Benicia Breeze and Vallejo Transit services were consolidated to streamline, simplify, and improve access for transit riders through enhanced service coverage, frequency, affordability, and mobility options contingent upon available funding. The consolidated service shall be responsible for coordinating transportation services in Benicia and Vallejo and to locations beyond the two cities such as Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART).
- b. Consolidated transit service is intended to improve standards for greenhouse gas emissions and energy reductions, reduce single-occupant vehicle miles traveled, thereby minimizing the carbon footprint of Benicia and Vallejo residents. A consolidated transit service will further the Benicia and Solano County Climate Action Plans greenhouse gas reduction targets.
- c. The Benicia Breeze and Vallejo Transit consolidation shall be consistent with the STA's Countywide Transportation Plan Transit Element to maximize the ability of Solano residents, workers, and visitors to reach destinations within, and adjacent to, Solano County, and to access regional transportation systems.
- d. The consolidated transit service shall be designed to be comparatively cost effective and efficient while considering the unique characteristics of each jurisdiction.
- e. The consolidation of services shall be managed in a public and transparent process to encourage participation by residents, stakeholders, and decision-makers in both communities.
- f. The consolidated transit service shall strive to maintain the continuity of current service provided by both jurisdictions, minimizing service disruptions and passenger inconveniences due to the transition. If possible, service levels shall be maintained or expanded.
- g. The consolidated transit service shall maximize opportunities for regional funding.

9. Powers

SolTrans is authorized, in its own name, to do all acts necessary to fulfill the purposes of this Agreement including, but not limited to, each of the following:

- a. Make and enter into contracts;
- b. Incur debts, liabilities and obligations; provided that no debt, liability or obligation of SolTrans is a debt, liability or obligation of any Member except as separately agreed to by a Member agreeing to be so obligated;
- Acquire, own, lease, hold, construct, manage, maintain, operate, sell or otherwise dispose of real and personal property by appropriate means, excepting only eminent domain;
- d. Receive gifts, grants, contributions and donations of property, funds, services and other forms of assistance from any source including, but not limited to, special or general taxes and assessments:

- e. Sue and be sued in its own name;
- f. Employ officers, agents and employees;
- g. Lease real or personal property as lessee and as lessor;
- h. Receive, collect, invest and disburse moneys;
- i. Issue revenue bonds or other forms of indebtedness, as provided by law;
- j. Carry out other duties as required to accomplish other responsibilities as set forth in this Agreement;
- k. Assign, delegate or contract with a Member or third party to perform any of these duties of the Board, including, but not limited to, acting as Executive Director for SolTrans;
- 1. Exercise all other powers necessary and proper to carry out the provisions of this Agreement;
- m. Claim transit funds from state and federal sources;
- n. These powers will be exercised in the manner provided by applicable law and as expressly set forth in this Agreement or reasonably inferred therefrom.

10. Board of Directors

- a. The powers of SolTrans are vested in the Voting Members of its Board of Directors ("Board"). The initial Governing Board of SolTrans is comprised of five (5) voting directors and one (1) ex-officio, non-voting director as follows:
 - Two Voting Directors from each Member Agency other than STA: Upon approval of this Joint Powers Agreement, the City Councils of Benicia and Vallejo will each appoint two Directors and one Alternate. When a Director is absent, the Alternate may act in his/her place. Each appointed and alternate Board member shall be a member of the governing body of the Member Agency that he or she represents and shall serve at the pleasure of such governing body.
 - 2. One Voting Director who shall be the Solano County representative to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission ("MTC"). In addition to the two Directors from each Member Agency, one additional Voting Director, who is the Solano County representative to the MTC shall be a Voting Director unless such Director is either a council member of one of the Member Agencies or a County Supervisor whose district includes all or part of any city which is a Member Agency. If no Director is so qualified or available, the remaining members of the SolTrans Board shall appoint a Voting Director who may, but need not be, the MTC representative notwithstanding his or her service as a member of the governing body of a Member Agency or as a County Supervisor whose district includes a Member Agency who shall serve until a new Solano County representative to MTC is appointed and is qualified to serve. Such process may include the appointment of the MTC representative from the aforementioned jurisdictions at the sole discretion of the remaining Voting Members of the JPA Board.
 - 3. One Non-Voting STA representative to participate as an ex officio Director. The STA Board will appoint the STA Representative which may be either a STA Board Director or staff. Notwithstanding any language to the contrary in this Agreement, the STA representative may participate in all discussions but shall have no vote in any action of the Board.

- b. All actions of the Board require the affirmative vote of a majority of the Voting Directors, which must include at least one affirmative vote of a Director representing each Voting Member Agency.
- c. Directors shall serve a term of two (2) years unless earlier removed or replaced by the appointing Member Agency in accordance with that Member Agency's procedures. A Voting Director is automatically removed if he or she is no longer an elected official or the Solano County representative to the MTC unless that Director is appointed by action of the remaining Directors pursuant to Section 10(a)(2) above, in which case, holding another elective or appointive office shall be a condition of service only if so provided in a resolution of the Board of SolTrans at the time he or she is appointed. Directors may serve any number of terms consistent with the appointment process of the Director's appointing governing body.
- d. Directors and Alternates are eligible for a stipend of up to \$100 per meeting with a maximum of one compensated meeting per month. The Board may authorize actual and necessary reimbursement of expenses incurred by Directors or Alternate Directors on behalf of SolTrans for which receipts are provided.
- e. The Board may delegate certain powers to specified committees but may not delegate the power to amend the Bylaws of SolTrans, to approve the budget, to appoint the Executive Director, or to appoint the Director under 10(a)(2).
- f. A majority of the voting Directors must be present to constitute a quorum for action on the business of the Board.
- g. The Board shall establish by resolution the date, time and place for regular meetings which shall occur at a minimum of four (4) times per year. Special meetings may be called by the Chairperson or by a majority of the voting Directors then in office. All meetings of the Board shall be in conformance with the Ralph M. Brown Act (California Government Code sections 64950 et seq.).

11. Conflicts of Interest

In accordance with state law, Directors and Officers are "public officials" within the meaning of the Political Reform Act of 1974, as amended, and its regulations, for purposes of financial disclosure, conflict of interest and other requirements of such Act and regulations. SolTrans shall adopt a conflicts of interest code in compliance with the Political Reform Act and all other applicable laws and regulations applicable to public officials, including, but not limited to, the restrictions on the acceptance or solicitation of contributions.

12. Committees

The following committees are established:

a. Executive Management Committee. The Executive Management Committee periodically meets as necessary to assist in advising the employees or agents and the SolTrans Board, to review proposed budget items, service and fare adjustments, and to otherwise provide management assistance and oversight as necessary. The Executive Committee shall consist of the city manager or executive director, or chief administrative officer, or designee of each Member Agency.

- b. Technical Advisory Committee. The Technical Advisory Committee will consist of staff representatives appointed by the city manager or executive director of the Member Agencies to coordinate with Agency staff on funding and service issues.
- c. Public Advisory Committee. Each Member Agency will appoint three members of the public with demonstrated expertise or special interest in, transit issues and who reside within the boundaries of the agencies that they represent to serve on a Public Advisory Committee (PAC). This will include representatives selected by each Member Agency. The PAC will serve as an advisory committee to the SolTrans Board and will review and comment to the SolTrans Board on the following matters:
 - i. Service and fare adjustments,
 - ii. Development of Short Range Transit Plans, and
 - iii. Review SolTrans' annual work plan.
- d. Other Committees. The Board may create other committees from time to time as necessary and appropriate.

13. Officers and Employees

- a. The officers of SolTrans are the Board Chair, Vice-Chair, Executive Director, Legal Counsel, Chief Financial Officer/Treasurer, and Clerk to the Board. The positions of Chair and Vice-Chair shall be appointed by the members of the SolTrans Board from their membership. The Chair and Vice-Chair are Directors elected or appointed by the Board at its first meeting and serve the remainder of the year in which appointed and one additional year. Thereafter, terms for Chair and Vice-Chair are one year beginning January 1. The Chair and Vice Chair assume their office upon election by the SolTrans Board. If either the Chair or Vice-Chair ceases to be a director, the resulting vacancy will be filled at the next meeting of the Board.
- b. The Board shall appoint an Executive Director and Legal Counsel to SolTrans who shall serve at the pleasure of the Board. The Executive Director shall be charged with managing the operations of SolTrans, subject to the authority and direction of the Board. The Executive Director shall have charge of, handle and have access to all property of SolTrans, shall appoint the SolTran's Chief Financial Officer and the Clerk, both of whom shall serve at the pleasure of the Executive Director. Pursuant to California Government Code section 6505.1, the Executive Director shall file an official bond in an amount determined by the Member Agencies, through the Board, which shall not be less than the smallest bond required of the chief financial officer, treasurer or other fiscal officer of each of the Member Agencies or, upon the approval of the SolTrans Board of Directors, satisfy this requirement pursuant to Government Code section 1463.
- c. The appointment of a Chief Financial Officer/Treasurer shall be made no later than the second regular meeting of Board and in any event before SolTrans receives any funds or properties from any source. The Chief Financial Officer/Treasurer may be a designated member of SolTrans staff or appointed from one of the Member Agencies.
- d. The Board may authorize reimbursement of expenses incurred by officers or employees on behalf of SolTrans.
- e. The Board may create such other offices and appoint individuals to such offices it considers either necessary or convenient to carry out the purposes of this Agreement.

14. By-Laws

The SolTrans Board shall adopt bylaws as necessary and proper for the efficient and effective functioning of SolTrans.

15. <u>Limitation on Liability of Members for Debts and Obligations of SolTrans</u>
Pursuant to Government Code section 6508.1, the debts, liabilities, and obligations of SolTrans do not constitute debts, liabilities, or obligations of any Member Agency.
However, a Member may separately contract for or assume responsibility for specific debts, liabilities, or obligations of SolTrans.

16. Limitation of Financial Commitment

SolTrans shall not look to Member Agencies for financial contributions from their general fund, or any other fund, unless each Member Agency separately contracts for and agrees to otherwise set aside transit moneys as part of their annual budgetary process.

17. Fiscal Year

The first fiscal year of SolTrans is the period from the date of this Agreement through June 30, 2011. Each subsequent fiscal year of SolTrans begins on July 1st and ends on June 30th unless the Board of Directors provides otherwise by resolution.

18. Budget

The Board shall adopt a budget not later than sixty (60) days before the beginning of a fiscal year. In the Board's sole discretion, the budget may be an annual or multi-year budget.

19. Annual Audits and Audit Reports

The Chief Financial Officer/Treasurer will cause an annual financial audit to be made by an independent certified public accountant with respect to all SolTrans receipts, disbursements, other transactions and entries into the books. A report of the financial audit will be filed as a public record with each Member. The audit will be filed no later than required by state law. SolTrans will pay the cost of the financial audit in the same manner as other administrative costs.

20. Establishment and Administration of Funds

- a. The Chief Financial Officer/Treasurer shall be responsible for the strict accountability of all funds and reports of all receipts and disbursements. It will comply with the provisions of law relating to the establishment and administration of funds, particularly section 6505 of the California Government Code.
- b. The funds will be accounted for on a full accrual basis according to generally accepted accounting principles and applicable laws and regulations.
- c. The Chief Financial Officer/Treasurer will receive, invest, and disburse funds only in accordance with procedures established by the Board and in conformity with applicable state or federal law.
- d. Should SolTrans contract with a Member Agency for the provision of all or some financial services, the funds of SolTrans will be maintained in a separate account(s) from those of the Member Agency itself.

21. Bi-Annual Transit Service Plan

SolTrans shall cause to have prepared a Transit Service Plan every two years. A SRTP (Short Range Transit Plan) may be used to fulfill this requirement. The Plan shall contain

the baseline levels of transit service to be provided and shall include days of service; hours of service, areas to be served, types of transit service to be provided and rates of passenger fares to be charged for said service. The Transit Service Plan shall be prepared and presented to the Board prior to December 1 of every odd numbered calendar year. The Board shall review said Plan and either approve and adopt said plan as presented or approve and adopt said Plan with modifications. The Plan may be expanded, modified or reduced by the Board.

22. Indemnification

- (a) SolTrans shall hold each member, its elective and appointive Boards, Commissions, officers, agents and employees, harmless from any liability for damage or claims for damage for any tort, personal injury, including death, as well as from claims from property damage which may arise from SolTran's employees, contractors, subcontractors, or agents' operation under this Agreement. SolTrans agrees to and shall defend each Member and its elective and appointive Boards, Commissions, officers, agents and employees from any suits or actions at law or equity for damages caused, or alleged to have been caused, by reason of any of the aforesaid operations that occur on or after the date of formation of SolTrans.
- (b) Each Member Agency shall indemnify SolTrans, its Boards, officers, agents and employees and the respective other Member Agencies, harmless from any liability for damage or claims for damage for any tort, personal injury, including death, as well as from claims from property damage which may arise from that Member Agency's employees, contractors, subcontractors or agent's operations occurring prior to the formation of SolTrans.

23. New Members

- a. For the purpose of this section only, all Members admitted after the initial creation of SolTrans are New Members. Each New Member Agency of SolTrans shall appoint two Directors and one Alternate.
- b. A public entity meeting the criteria in Section 6 above may be admitted as a New Member upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Voting Members of the Board and upon complying with all other requirements established by the Board and the Bylaws.
- c. Each applicant for membership as a New Member must pay all fees and expenses, if any, set by the Board in order to pay for the costs of adding the New Member and to address their participation in the ownership of SolTrans assets and liability for any debt of SolTrans upon approval as a New Member.

24. Withdrawal From Membership

Members may withdraw from SolTrans by filing a written notice of withdrawal with the Executive Director 180 days before the actual withdrawal. Such a withdrawal shall be effective on July 1st of the subsequent fiscal year after the 180 day period has passed following the filing of the withdrawal notice. The withdrawal of a Member Agency shall not in any way discharge, impair or modify voluntarily-assumed obligations of the withdrawn Member Agency in existence as of the date of the withdrawal. Withdrawal of a Member Agency shall not affect the remaining Member Agencies. A withdrawn Member Agency shall not be entitled to the return of any grant funds previously or historically allocated to it provided that SolTrans is the current grantee for those funds at the time of withdrawal. However, the return of assets previously contributed by the Member Agency to SolTrans shall be provided for in a withdrawal plan, prepared by SolTrans, to address return of funds or assets from SolTrans to a member opting to withdraw from SolTrans. Such withdrawal plan may include 1) the compensation for real

property whose title has passed to SolTrans; 2) the purchase of a withdrawing Member's assets used by but not yet transferred to SolTrans; or 3) compensation for the depreciated value of assets or rolling stock transferred at the time of formation. SolTrans and the Member Agency which proposes to withdraw will negotiate in good faith toward mutual agreement on a withdrawal plan to address return of funds or assets from SolTrans to the Member Agency and assignment of liabilities associated with those funds or assets to that Member Agency. In the event of a disagreement regarding the amount of compensation due for real property even after a reasonable period of good faith negotiations, the parties may resolve the matter via alternative dispute resolution or any other mutually acceptable means.

25. Termination and Distribution

- a. This Agreement continues until terminated or SolTrans is dissolved.
- b. This Agreement may be terminated by the written consent of two-thirds (2/3) of the governing bodies of the Member Agencies; provided, however, that this Agreement and SolTrans shall continue to exist after termination for the purpose of disposing of all claims, distribution or assets and all other functions necessary to conclude the obligations and affairs of SolTrans.
- c. At the termination of this agreement resulting in termination and dissolution of SolTrans, and after payment of debts, a dissolution plan shall be prepared by SolTrans and reviewed and approved by the Member Agencies to address the surplus property of SolTrans, both real and personal, including all funds on hand, after payment of all liabilities, costs, expenses, and charges validly incurred under this Agreement, shall be returned to the respective Member Agencies as nearly as possible in proportion to the contributions, if any, made by each.
- d. After termination or dissolution of SolTrans, any surplus money on deposit in any fund or account of SolTrans will be returned to the Member Agencies as required by law. The Board is vested with all powers of SolTrans for the purpose of concluding and dissolving the business affairs of the agency.

26. Notices

Notice to each Member under this Agreement is sufficient if mailed to the Member and separately to the Member's Directors to their respective addresses on file with SolTrans.

27. Prohibition Against Assignment

No Member may assign a right, claim, or interest it may have under this Agreement. No creditor, assignee or third party beneficiary of a Member has a right, claim or title to any part, share, interest, fund or asset of SolTrans. However, nothing in this section prevents SolTrans from assigning any interest or right it may have under this Agreement to a third party.

28. Amendments

This Agreement may be amended by the Members acting pursuant to a resolution of their respective governing bodies. A proposed amendment must be submitted to each Member at least thirty (30) days in advance of the date when the Member considers it. An amendment is to be effective upon execution unless otherwise designated.

29. Severability

If a portion, term, condition or provision of this Agreement is determined by a court to be illegal or in conflict with a law of the State of California, or is otherwise rendered unenforceable or ineffectual, the validity of the remaining portions, terms, conditions and provisions is not affected.

30. Liability of SolTrans

Subject to limitations thereon contained in any trust agreement or other documents pursuant to which financing of SolTrans is implemented, funds of SolTrans may be used to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless SolTrans, any Member Agency, any Director or Alternate, and any employee or officer of the agency for actions taken within the scope of their duties and acting on behalf of SolTrans.

31. Governing Law

This Agreement will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

32. Counterparts

This Agreement may be executed in several counterparts, each of which is an original and all of which constitutes but one and the same instrument.

33. Effective Date

This Agreement becomes effective and SolTrans exists as a separate public entity when approved by the governing boards of the three original Members.

Solano County Transit Joint Powers Agreement *

Last year, the STA Board recommended the consolidation of the Benicia Breeze and Vallejo Transit into one transit system. This was one of several recommendations to emerge following the conclusion of an 18-month long Countywide Transit Consolidation Study. The STA has worked with members of the city council and staff from both agencies through a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to develop a draft Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) and transition plan. The STA has been recommended to be a partner with the Cities of Benicia and Vallejo in the formation of the new transit JPA, to be called Solano County Transit (SolTrans). At the July 2010 Board meeting, the item was tabled at the request of STA staff in response to some last minute issues pertaining to the JPA and proposed transition plan that were raised by Vallejo's legal counsel and finance staff. These issues have been reviewed and responded to by the consultant team for the study and by STA legal counsel. Staff is recommending the STA Board authorize joining the SolTrans JPA and approval of the transition plan merging Benicia and Vallejo's transit systems subject to several conditions being addressed that will protect the financial and operational integrity of the proposed new transit JPA.

2010 Solano Commute Challenge Off to Promising Start

A record number of Solano County employers are participating in the 4th Annual Solano Commute Challenge. A total of 46 employers have registered to participate eclipsing last year's record total of 43. As of August 31st, 531 of their employees have signed up to take transit, ride a bike, vanpool or walk to work during the three month long Commute Challenge.

Commute Profile for Solano and Napa *

Earlier this year, the STA, in partnership with Napa County Transportation and Planning Agency, commissioned a Commute Profile survey of Solano and Napa residents. The purpose was to assess the issues, obstacles and priorities of residents as they travel both within and outside the county. A summary will be provided at the meeting.

Consolidation of Benicia and Vallejo Transit Services

Background:

The issue of consolidating some or all of the Solano's transit services had been discussed and proposed for evaluation for several years prior to the STA Board members discussing it formally at the February 2005 Board retreat. At the Board retreat, participants expressed interest and support for transit service becoming more convenient through a seamless system, that there should be a reasonable level of service throughout the county, and that local transit issues and needs would have to be considered and addressed. Subsequently, the STA Board directed STA staff to initiate a countywide Transit Consolidation Study and approved goals, objectives and evaluation criteria to be incorporated in the scope of work for this study. The Transit Consolidation Study was then conducted and in June 2009, the STA Board approved the following recommendations:

- 1. Option 1: Consolidation of Benicia and Vallejo transit services;
- 2. Option 4c: Decentralize intercity paratransit service to local transit operators and continue study of consolidation of interregional Solano transit services under one operator to be selected by the STA Board;
- 3. Forward the STA recommended transit consolidation recommendations to the affected agencies for their consideration and participation;
- 4. Direct STA staff to work with the affected local transit staff to develop Implementation Plans for Option 1 and Option 4c; and
- 5. Report back to the STA Board by September 2009 on the status of the Implementation Plan.

Discussion:

Since the STA Board action in June 2009, the STA, and the cities of Benicia and Vallejo have met multiple times to discuss and evaluate the potential consolidation of Benicia Breeze. Over the past year a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was approved by the three organizations to guide the development of a Solano County Transit Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) and Transition Plan. The JPA and the Transition Plan are the topic of this staff report.

The development of the MOU, JPA and Transition Plan have been guided by the Solano County Transit Coordinating Committee in coordination with a Management Committee

and a Staff Working Committee. The Coordinating Committee members are Benicia Mayor Patterson, Vallejo Mayor Davis, Benicia Councilmember Ioakimedes, and Vallejo Councilmember Hannigan. The Management Committee consists of the Benicia and Vallejo City Managers and the STA's Executive Director. The Staff Working Committee is comprised of transit and management staff from all three agencies with support from legal counsel and consultants.

Over the past year, there has been a high level of discussion and interest in working toward consolidation and better transit coordination and service. Guiding principles were developed and incorporating into a MOU that was approved by the three agencies (Benicia, Vallejo and STA) to establish a framework for moving toward consolidation (Attachment A). The STA approved the MOU in September 2009 (Attachment B).

A JPA was drafted by STA Legal Counsel, reviewed multiple times and approved by the Coordinating Committee in May 2010 (Attachment C). Key points contained in the JPA are:

- The consolidated Benicia/Vallejo transit agency will be known as Solano County Transit (SolTrans);
- The JPA Board will be comprised of the Mayors of Benicia and Vallejo, a City Councilmember from each jurisdiction, and the fifth voting member is designated as Solano's MTC representative;
- The STA will be an ex-officio member of the Board;

The Coordinating Committee directed that the JPA be forwarded to the member agencies once a Transition Plan was completed. The Transition Plan has been prepared to guide the development of the new SolTrans organization (Attachment D). The Transition Plan covers the following:

- Background
- Structure and Governance
- Financial Management (including a one and 10-year budget)
- Organizational and Human Resources Management
- Service Planning and Operations
- Capital Project Management
- Other Issues: WETA Transition and new Administration Building
- Implementation Schedule

In June 2010, the STA Board approved a contract to retain Phil McGuire, an experienced transit consultant, to function as a consultant to the MOU and as the Interim Executive Director of the new JPA. When the JPA is approved by the member agencies, it is intended that he will work with the new SolTrans Board to begin the steps necessary to build the organization prior to transferring and hiring staff, hiring a permanent Executive Director, transferring service and other contracts, and transferring operating funds and capital assets related to operating service. This transitional process is projected to conclude prior to July 1, 2011, the beginning of the next fiscal year.

Construction of transit capital projects such as Curtola Park and Ride, Vallejo Station, and Benicia's Park-and-Rides are recommended to remain with the cities of Benicia and Vallejo. With the transfer of transit service operations from the Cities to the JPA, the intention is to reimburse both cities for any documented and auditable funds they have

advanced to cover transit costs as well as to start the new JPA on sound financial grounds. To address these and other one-time transitional costs (moving, re-branding, professional services), an estimate has been developed with the Cities and is incorporated into the Transition Plan. It is proposed that STA and SolTrans approach MTC to assist with these one-time transitional costs. The STA Board has dedicated State Transit Assistance Funds (STAF) funds to serve as local match, subject to the JPA being approved by all three agencies as part of a transition plan. During the transition, service levels are proposed to remain consistent in both cities. Funding for a joint Short Range Transit Plan (SRTP), requested by the MOU Coordinating Committee, has been secured from MTC and will provide the opportunity for the new agency in its first year to review, assess, and prioritize how the newly combined transit service area may be served.

Subsequent to action by the MOU Coordinating Committee, additional and new issues were raised by Vallejo finance staff, legal counsel and members of the Vallejo Council's Transit Advisory Committee (VTAC). The STA Board tabled this agenda item at its July Board meeting at the request of STA staff to allow time to respond to the issues that had just been raised. As part of this action, the STA Board requested the item be returned to the September Board meeting. The STA consultant team, staff, and legal counsel and Vallejo transit staff have been working to respond to the issues raised by Vallejo finance and legal staff. A meeting was held in early August with Vallejo management and staff, STA staff, and consultants at the meeting. Responses to the issues raised by Vallejo finance and legal were presented and discussed including new information that was provided that potentially impacts the viability of the Soltrans JPA. The SolTrans JPA and Transition Plan have been agendized for the September 14 Vallejo Council meeting. The Benicia City Council had previously reviewed and discussed the JPA and Transition Plan at a Council Workshop on July 6, 2010.

In addition, STA has been requested by the City of Vallejo to become more involved with the discussion concerning the transfer of the Baylink Ferry from Vallejo to the Water Emergency Transportation Authority (WETA). Some of the issues being raised in those discussions should be incorporated into the SolTrans Transition Plan. The SolTrans Coordinating Committee will be reconvened to address any proposed modifications to either the Transition Plan or the JPA.

The issues raised are surmountable if certain conditions are met and these have been included in staff's recommendation. Although this process has its challenges, benefits remain to the transit riders of the systems, the Cities of Benicia and Vallejo and to the county and region; these have been summarized on Attachment E.

Conditions

 All key transit operating assets and rolling stock are identified to be transferred and are verified by a third-party as available for use by the JPA via transfer of assets or agreement, including the Broadway bus yard, prior to transfer of transit staff or service contracts;

Some of the recent issues that have been raised concerned the ability to transfer or use some key transit operating facilities. The SolTrans JPA needs to be assured that key operating assets and rolling stock can be transferred or used through an agreement prior to transfer of staff or service contracts.

2. An updated SolTrans FY2011-12 operating budget is approved by SolTrans Coordinating Committee without a projected operating deficit or service reduction prior to the completion of FY 2011-12;

Agencies' staff and the SolTrans Coordinating Committee have been discussing and updating an initial year SolTrans budget since the Fall of 2009. Since the beginning of the process, new revenues and expenses have become known. Throughout, the draft budget assumptions have been remained constant and conservative. A recent issue raised by Vallejo has a potential \$2.7m reduction to the TDA reserve which had not been taken into account previously. Staff recommends that the Coordinating Committee review and approve an updated SolTrans FY2011-12 operating budget to ensure there is not an operating deficit.

3. As part of the transition, the Vallejo bus system and its revenues and assets will be held separate from the City of Vallejo's bankruptcy proceedings;

To protect Vallejo transit funds and assets from being diminished by potential bankruptcy proceedings in the near future, staff recommends that they be held separate from the City of Vallejo general fund to ensure the transit funds and assets currently assumed for SolTrans remain secure.

4. A Request for Proposal (RFP) is released to begin the Benicia/Vallejo Short Range Transit Plan (SRTP) to assess and plan for future transit service in Benicia and Vallejo and to develop a longer range transit operating and financial plan;

A funding agreement has been executed between the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and the City of Vallejo to prepare a joint SRTP for the Benicia/Vallejo area. Although the joint SRTP is intended to be guided by the SolTrans JPA during the transition and staff from the three agencies involved, Vallejo is the grantee and will begin the process. This is a key planning process that needs to be initiated in the near term in order to be completed in time for implementation in FY2011-12. The SRTP will provide guidance on future service planning and financial plan.

 All Benicia and Vallejo transit funds (TDA, RM2, State, Federal, and other transit operating funds) are transferred to the SolTrans JPA as part of the JPA's preparation to be established as a direct transit claimant for Benicia and Vallejo;

Over the course of the transition, SolTrans JPA will be incurring the financial liability of staffing and service contracts, maintaining transit operating assets, and the new administration building. In the long-term, the JPA will directly claim various operating funds. In the interim, transit operating funds that have already been claimed by Benicia and Vallejo will need to be transferred to the SolTrans JPA in a timely manner.

6. SolTrans JPA operates as an independent agency per the JPA and Transition Plan and is not prevented or inhibited from utilizing the Guiding Principles outlined in the JPA for the proposed consolidation.

If the JPA is approved by these three agencies, the SolTrans JPA will become an agency independent of the member agencies: Cities of Benicia and Vallejo and the STA. Approval of the formation of the JPA is a major step which will be followed by many steps along the transition process. Each member agency is expected to facilitate and coordinate with, and not inhibit, the formation of the SolTrans JPA and the funding and operations of the specified transit service in a manner consistent with the Guiding Principles approved by the SolTrans Coordinating Committee.

Fiscal Impact:

STA is currently supporting the transition with staff time, legal counsel services, and consultant services. This is being funded through STAF funds approved by the STA Board.

Recommendation:

Approve STA entering into a JPA with the Cities of Benicia and Vallejo to form Solano County Transit contingent upon the Benicia and Vallejo City Councils approving the establishment of the SolTrans JPA and the conditions as specified in Attachment F.

Background:

The Solano Mobility Program of the Solano Transportation Authority (STA) began as part of a statewide network of rideshare programs funded primarily by Caltrans for the purpose of managing countywide and regional rideshare programs in Solano County and providing air quality improvements through trip reduction.

Starting in February 2014, the STA expanded its services to include the Solano Mobility Call Center which was originally one of four Solano Mobility priorities identified in 2011 recent Solano Transportation Study for Older Adults and People with Disabilities. It initially began as Solano Napa Commuter Information that provided commuters and Solano County employers with information on a variety of transit services and incentive programs, and now, the Mobility Call Center also provides Older Adults and People with Disabilities with a range of various mobility information. Some of the programs include GoGoGrandparent, ADA paratransit and Intercity Taxi card program.

Discussion:

Solano Mobility Call Center

For the 2nd Quarter of FY 2023-24, the Solano Mobility Call Center assisted 2,315 customers in person and over the phone. There were also 25,947 website hits.

The Call Center Activity Quarterly Summary:

- Assisted 119 walk in customers
- Processed 15 Regional Transit Connection (RTC) Applications
 (RTC: A discount ID card that is available to persons with qualifying disabilities. Once
 qualified, are able to use on fixed-route, BART, and ferry systems throughout the San

- Processed 203 PEX cards
 (PEX: The Intercity Taxi card program can be used by ADA (American Disabilities Act)
 certified individuals to pay discounted taxi fare in Solano County)

The efficiency and effectiveness of these services are determined using the corresponding STA Connected Mobility Implementation Plan Guidelines, Performance Measures, & Benchmarks, which were approved and adopted by the STA Board on June 28, 2022. The plan is included in Attachment A.

Using the performance measures, STA can determine the ongoing relevance, usability, adaptability, and sustainability of the mobility services currently offered in Solano County. Specifically, the STA Connected Mobility Implementation Plan Guidelines, Performance Measures, & Benchmarks goals and objectives support the recommendations of the Metropolitan Transportation Commission's (MTC's) Blue Ribbon Transit Recovery Task Force. All standards meet the criteria as defined in the evaluation methodology.

Fiscal Impact:

The approved FY 2023-24 budget for the One-Stop Call Center programs is \$419,677 funded through FTA 5310, One Bay Area Grant 3(OBAG), and State Transit Assistance Funds (STAF).

STA Connected Mobility Implementation Plan Guidelines, Performance Measures & Benchmark Goals and Objectives

Solano Mobility Call Center roles and responsibilities: Inquiries and requests that are handled clearly and quickly in a way that enhances mobility program usability and accessibility, and in a manner that meets the quantifiable conditions listed below.

To ensure quality, the program has customer service standards that detail methods of effectively handling responses, as well as detailing acceptable answer speeds or hold times. These conditions include the following:

- Consistent communication with partnered agencies to keep up to date with relevant information. Fully staffed call center to ensure little to no hold times between the hours of 8-5pm M-F.
- Average call answer time is less than 20 seconds.
- Average call hold time is less than 30 seconds.
- Return messages within one business day of message receipt.
- Respond to valid complaints within 48 hours of complaint receipt.
- Five percent increase in program participation annually.

RE: Legislative Update

Background:

Each year, STA staff monitors state and federal legislation that pertains to transportation and related issues. On January 10, 2024, the STA Board approved its 2024 Legislative Platform to provide policy guidance on transportation legislation and the STA's legislative activities during 2024.

Monthly legislative updates are provided by STA's state and federal lobbyists and are attached for your information (Attachments A and B). An updated Legislative Bill Matrix listing state bills of interest is available at: https://sta.ca.gov/operations/legislative-program/current/

Discussion:

Congress passed all twelve appropriation bills, which secures the following Community Project Funding requests: \$850,000 for the State Route 37 and Fairgrounds Drive Interchange Improvement Project, \$500,000 for Fairfield Transit and Municipal Fleet Electrification Project; and \$1,116,279 for the Tolay Creek Bridge Replacement and Restoration Project. Congressional Members have announced their requests for FY 2025 Community Project Funding. STA staff and member agency staff have submitted the following projects for funding consideration:

- Mare Island Interchange Project Initiation Document (PID)
- I-80 Express Lanes Gap Closure (Dixon) PID
- Heart of Fairfield Downtown Streetscape Phase 2 Project
- Jepson Parkway Segment 3A Project

STA staff met with Congressman Garamendi's staff on March 26th to discuss the merits of each project request and will schedule meetings with the offices of Senators Alex Padilla and Laphonza Butler, and Congressman Mike Thompson to brief their staff as well.

The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) sponsored "Connect Bay Area" Regional Transportation Measure was originally authored by Senator Scott Weiner as Senate Bill 925 (SB 925); however, under the direction of Senate Pro Tem Mike McGuire, it was merged with Senator Wahab's SB 926 Bay Area Transit Consolidation bill. The new combined bill, SB 1031, has been drafted and discussions continue on future amendments, including the geographic distribution of funds, the Transportation Demand Management mandate, and the potential reinstatement of a "flexible" spending category.

Assembly member Lori Wilson introduced Assembly Bill 2719 (AB 2719) Transit Vehicle Inspections, which would authorize public transit agencies to request that the California Highway Patrol (CHP) conduct inspections of public transit buses at an off-site location. Upon passing inspection and certification, these buses would then be exempt from the requirement to stop at a CHP weigh station. This spot bill still only includes intent language, but more substantive bill

language is expected before the April 1st hearing in the Assembly Transportation Committee. Staff continues to monitor the following bills:

- SB 960 (Wiener) Complete Streets Projects on the State Highway System
- AB 1837 (Papan) San Francisco Bay area: public transit: Regional Network Management Council

State Legislative Update (Shaw/Yoder/Antwih/Schmelzer/Lange):

The Legislature returned from Spring Recess on April 1, 2024 and policy committees will have until April 26th to hear any bills with fiscal impacts before moving them out of the first house by May 24th. Governor Newsom and Legislative Leadership agreed to take early action on the State Budget ahead of the Governor's May Revise, which is expected to be announced around May 14th. The Legislature will then have until June 15th to pass the State Budget.

The Transit Transformation Task Force held its second meeting on February 29th and focused its discussions on environmental mandates that must be met by 2030. California State Transportation Agency (CalSTA) will soon establish a Technical Working Group to support the Task Force with the development of the Final Report which is due to the Legislature in October 2025.

Legislative Update

The Legislature returned from its Spring Recess on April 1 and will continue hearing bills in policy committees. As we reported last month, hundreds of bills were introduced as "spot bills," but have since been amended to include substantive proposals. April will be a busy month because policy committees only have until April 26 to hear bills with fiscal impacts. Bills must also move out of the first house by May 24. Regional Measure Legislation Amended

The effort to authorize the San Francisco Bay Area to propose a regional measure to fund transportation, dubbed Connect Bay Area, will now be ensconced in SB 1031 (Wiener and Wahab). The bill was amended on March 18 to include substantive language authorizing the regional measure, amongst numerous other policy proposals. Related to the funding measure, SB 1031 includes various revenue mechanisms (sales tax, employer tax, vehicle fees, property related fees) and identifies the funding priorities for the revenue generated from the measure, focusing on transit operations and transformation, safe streets and pothole repair, connectivity/mobility improvements, and climate resilience. The bill does not yet include provisions for highway expansion projects. Additionally, the bill requires a minimum investment of \$750 million annually for transit operations and transformation.

In addition to the funding measure, SB 1031 includes provisions for transit governance and targets for transit operations (common fare payments/structures, acceptance of a regional transit pass, a common fare transfer policy, etc.), many of which stem from recent Seamless Bay Area efforts. The bill would establish clear control for MTC over both historical transit formula funding (STA and LTF), as well new measure money, and condition access to those funds on adherence to the abovementioned governance structure and operational targets. The bill also includes a maintenance of effort provision to access regional measure funds.

Finally, SB 1031 includes a detailed consolidation study and implementation plan, requiring CalSTA to enlist a transportation institute to conduct a study of transit in the Bay Area and then, based on the

study, recommend a comprehensive plan to consolidate all of the transit agencies that are located in the San Francisco Bay area. The Transportation Agency shall complete the plan on or before January 1, 2027.

Governor Newsom and Legislative Leaders Announce Agreement to Take Early Action on State Budget On March 20, Governor Gavin Newsom, Senate President pro Tempore Mike McGuire (D-North Coast), and Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas (D-Salinas) announced that they reached agreement to take early action to address the budget deficit. At this stage, the only information available about the agreement is that it represents "budgets solutions" worth \$12 billion to \$18 billion. The announcement follows the release of the Senate Early Action Budget on March 14. Dubbed "Shrink the Shortfall," the Senate's Early Action Budget would reduce the budget deficit by \$17 billion. Notably, the Governor's proposed Fiscal Year 2024-25 budget and the Senate's Early Action Budget preserve the state's \$5.1 billion commitment to public transit agencies but extend the appropriation timeline for the \$2 billion the state committed to appropriate to the population-based TIRCP in FY 2024-25. The Assembly has not yet released a proposed Early Action Budget.

Transit Transformation Task Force

On Thursday, February 29, the Transit Transformation Task Force held its second meeting in Sacramento, with much of the conversation focused on ideal areas of focus that the public transit industry must attain by 2030 in order to meet state environmental mandates. The discussion kicked off with moderators setting the tone and intention of the meeting and future Task Force meetings, asking that Task Force members endeavor to harbor "aspirational, unconstrained, positive, equitable, and focused" discussions meant to spark innovative ideas in transforming public transit.

Overall, the agenda included the following modules as topics for discussion:

- Review of Task Force's goals and objectives (as outlined in SB 125)
- Review of CA's (environmental) goals and implications for transit
 - Q: What challenges must we overcome / changes must we make to transit to reach these goals?
- Review of case studies of how CA might transform transit ridership
- Preview of next steps, meeting schedule, and responsibilities of the Task Force and Technical Working Group

Finally, as part of the discussion, CalSTA highlighted the responsibilities of the Task Force relative to a Technical Working Group that CalSTA will soon establish. In short, the Task Force will direct the state's overall effort, identify topics for further investigation, make recommendations, and review and sign onto the final report to the Legislature due October 2025. The Technical Working Group will support the Task Force in data analysis and provide technical guidance, provide feedback on the draft final report, and assimilate public comments in edits to the draft final report.

The Task Force is subject to the state's open meeting requirements for state bodies, known as Bagley-Keene, and as such, all agenda materials will be available on <u>CalSTA's website</u>. The next Task Force meeting will take place on April 15, 2024.

Bills of Interest

SB 532 (Wiener) Bridge Toll Increase

This bill would increase the toll for vehicles for crossing toll bridges in the San Francisco Bay area by \$1.50 until December 31, 2028, and require the revenues collected from this toll to be used by MTC for allocation to transit operators that provide service within the San Francisco Bay area and experiencing an operations funding challenge. Any transit operator seeking an allocation would be required to submit a 5-year projection of its operating need. *This bill is in the Assembly.*

SB 926 (Wahab) Bay Area Transit Consolidation

This bill would require the California State Transportation Agency to develop a plan to consolidate all transit agencies that are located within the geographic jurisdiction of the Metropolitan Transportation Commission. *This bill will not move forward due to the inclusion in SB 1031.*

SB 960 (Wiener) Complete Streets Projects on the State Highway System

This bill would require all transportation projects funded or overseen by Caltrans to provide "comfortable, convenient, and connected complete streets facilities" unless exempt pursuant to the bill and would require the SHOPP asset management plan to prioritize the implementation of "comfortable, convenient, and connected facilities" for pedestrians, bicyclists, and transit users on all projects in the program. The bill would require the CTC to adopt 4-year and 10-year objective targets and performance measures reflecting state transportation goals and objectives, including for complete streets assets that reflect the existence and conditions of bicycle, pedestrian, and transit facilities on the state highway system. The bill would require Caltrans and CTC to use the updated asset management plan and to guide the selection of transit priority projects for the SHOPP.

This bill would define "transit priority project" as a roadway design, operations, and enforcement action, treatment, or project that helps transit buses and other transit vehicles avoid traffic congestion, reduce signal delays, and move more predictably and reliably. The bill would require Caltrans to adopt a policy on transit priority projects for state and local highways and require Caltrans to take certain actions to streamline the approval of transit priority projects. The bill would require Caltrans to establish 4-year and 10-year targets for the fast and reliable movement of transit vehicles on state highways. Finally, this bill would require the Caltrans to establish a process to streamline the approval of pedestrian facilities, traffic calming improvements, bicycle facilities, and transit priority projects at locations where a local highway is above, below, or otherwise intersects with, a conventional state highway.

SB 1031 (Wiener and Wahab) Bay Area Regional Measure and Transit Consolidation

This bill would provide the Metropolitan Transportation Commission with the authority to propose a regional measure to fund transportation, dubbed Connect Bay Area. Additionally, the bill includes provisions for transit governance and targets for transit operations; provides clear control for MTC over both historical transit formula funding (STA and LTF), as well new measure money, and condition access to those funds on adherence to the abovementioned governance structure and operational targets; and requires CalSTA to conduct a study to consolidate all of the transit agencies in the Bay Area.

AB 817 (Pacheco) Brown Act - Advisory Bodies

This bill provides a narrow exemption under the Brown Act for non-decision-making legislative bodies to participate in meetings via teleconferencing outside of a declared state of emergency without posting the physical location of members or requiring a quorum to be present at a meeting location.

AB 1798 (Papan) Stormwater Runoff

This bill would require Caltrans and the State Water Resources Control Board, the Department of Toxic Substances Control, and the Department of Fish and Wildlife, to develop a programmatic environmental review process to prevent toxic compounds generated from vehicle tires from entering salmon and steelhead trout bearing waters. The bill would require Caltrans' process to include a pilot project at an unspecified location to study the effectiveness and cost effectiveness of installing and maintaining bioretention and biofiltration systems.

AB 1837 (Papan) Bay Area Transit Coordination

Modeled after the work underway at MTC, this bill would create the Regional Network Management Council as an 11-member council to provide leadership and critical input on regional transit policies, and to provide executive guidance on regional transit policies and actionable implementation plans in pursuit of transformative improvements in the customer experience San Francisco Bay area transit.

AB 2061 (Wilson) State Sales Tax Exemption for Public Ferry Vessels

This bill would establish, through January 1, 2030, a new exemption for the purchase of zero-emission ferries by public transit agencies from the state portion of the sales and use tax.

AB 2503 (Lee) CEQA Exemptions for Railroad Electrification

This bill would exempt from the requirements of CEQA railroad electrification projects and railroad siding projects.

AB 2719 (Wilson) Transit Vehicle Inspections

This bill would authorize a public transit agency to request that the California Highway Patrol conduct an annual inspection and certification of its fleet. The bill would exempt any public transit agency vehicle that has been certified through that inspection from the requirement to stop at a roadside inspection (weigh station).

AB 2824 (McCarty) Transit Employee Assaults

Currently a spot bill, this legislation will be amended to enhance penalties for individuals who commit assault or battery against a public transit operator or employee. This bill also allows transit agencies to prohibit individuals convicted of assault or battery from entering transit facilities and vehicles using a more streamlined process. This bill is sponsored by the California Transit Association.

Re: March Report

In March, Akin monitored developments in Washington. Susan Lent met with STA staff to discuss priority projects for 2024 and presented to the Board of STA regarding developments and outlook in Washington.

Fiscal Year 2024 Appropriations

Congress finally was able to pass the 12 appropriations bills that will fund the federal government for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2024. On March 9, President Biden signed into law six of the Fiscal Year 2024 spending bills—including the Transportation, and Housing and Urban Development, and Related Agencies appropriations, Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies; Commerce, Justice, Science, and Related Agencies; Energy and Water Development; Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies; and Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, and Related Agencies appropriations. The Transportation bill included the following STA community projects:

- \$850,000 -- State Route 37 / Fairgrounds Drive Interchange Improvement Project CA
- \$500,000 -- City of Fairfield, Fairfield Transit and Municipal Fleet Electrification Project

On March 23, the President signed into law the remaining six funding bills, including Defense; Financial Services and General Government; Homeland Security; Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies; Legislative Branch, and State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs bills.

Fiscal Year 2025 Appropriations

On March 11, President Joe Biden released his <u>Fiscal Year 2025 budget request</u>, totaling \$7.3 trillion. Of note, the budget includes \$78.4 billion for highway, highway safety, and transit formula programs outlined in the *Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act* (IIJA; <u>P.L. 117-58</u>). Moreover, the budget provides an additional \$9.5 billion in advance appropriations included in the IIJA. These funds are directed toward bridge replacement and rehabilitation efforts, electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure, and other programs centered on boosting the safety, sustainability, and resilience of the transportation network.

The House and Senate Appropriations Committees have still not issued deadlines for community projects and appropriations guidance, however, members have posted individual forms and deadlines. We have been working with STA staff to brief members of Congress on STA priorities.

Department of Transportation Update

On March 11, the DOT—as part of the President's Fiscal Year 2025 budget—recommended that 14 large transit projects receive almost \$4 billion in federal funding through the Capital Investment Grants and Expedited Project Delivery Pilot Program. Of note, two California projects were recommended, including the suggestion to provide \$200 million to the <u>Inglewood Transit Connector Project</u> and \$500 million to the <u>Transbay Downtown Extension Project</u>.

On March 11, the DOT <u>released</u> a notice of funding opportunity for the Innovative Finance and Asset Concession Grant program, providing \$100 million over five years to support public entities in facilitating public-private partnerships, as well as the exploration of innovative financing. State, local, and tribal governments are eligible to apply for funding and applications are due on May 10, 2024.

On March 12, the DOT <u>issued</u> a notice of funding opportunity for the Port Infrastructure Development Program. The federal funding totals \$450 million and is available to port authorities, as well as state, local, and tribal governments. Applications are due on May 10, 2024.

On March 12, the DOT <u>launched</u> the Low Carbon Transportation Materials Program to reduce air pollution by incentivizing low-carbon construction materials and products used in transportation. The first tranche of funding will release \$1.2 billion to states and the second pot of money will provide \$800 million to cities, tribes, and metropolitan planning organizations.

On March 13, the DOT <u>awarded</u> \$3.33 billion in Reconnecting Communities Pilot and Neighborhood Access and Equity funds. The money seeks to reconnect communities cut off by transportation infrastructure. 17 California-based projects were awarded.

On March 19, the DOT <u>opened</u> applications for \$44.5 million in funding through the Active Transportation Infrastructure Investment Program. The funds aim to improve safety and access to bicycling, walking, and public transit. The grant funding can be used to plan, design, or construct sidewalks, bikeways, and trails. State, local, and tribal governments may apply for funds. Applications are due on June 17.

Bills of Interest

On March 8, Rep. Seth Moulton (D-MA) introduced the *American High-Speed Rail Act* (<u>H.R. 7600</u>) to provide grants in support of high-speed rail corridor development. The bill is cosponsored by 41 Democrats, including Reps. Barbara Lee (D-CA), Juan Vargas (D-CA), Mark Takano (D-CA), Zoe Lofgren (D-CA), Robert Garcia (D-CA), and Jim Costa (D-CA).
