RE: Executive Director's Report – May 2024

The following is a brief status report on some of the major issues, projects, and programs currently being advanced by the Solano Transportation Authority (STA). An asterisk (*) notes items included in this month's Board agenda.

STA's Draft Overall Work Plan for FY 2024-25 and FY 2025-26*

STA staff has updated the agency's current 61 item Overall Work Plan (OWP) for review by the STA Board and member agencies. The draft OWP for FY 2024-25 and FY 2025-26 contains 22 plans, 13 projects and 26 programs.

STA Legislative Update*

STA legislative staff will provide an update on pending federal funding, state legislation and the region's effort to seek authorization from the State Legislature to develop a regional transit/transportation measure targeted for 2026.

Draft Solano Express Operating Budget for FY 2024-25*

STA staff and consultant have developed the draft Solano Express Operating Budget for FY 2024-25. This draft operating budget has been provided to the transit operators/funding partners for their review and forthcoming recommendation to the STA Board, and is based on an estimated 45,000 annual revenue hours combined for the Blue Line, Green Line, Red Line, Yellow Line and Route 82.

Safe Routes to Schools (SR2S) Plan Update/Walk to School Events *

The month of May is busy for the SR2S Program staff as the school year comes to a close. Dozens of schools are taking advantage of the various SR2S programs to promote safety and healthy activity. The SR2S plan update is underway as well. SR2S staff will provide an update.

Solano Mobility Second Quarter Update/Solano Mobility Call Center *

The Solano Mobility Programs staff that operate the Solano Mobility Call Center have provided their second quarter report. This report summaries the array of mobility and transit options the Call Center staff assists with via the website, phone or in person.

Vacaville City Coach Launches Electric Bus Fleet

On April 30th, STA staff attended a christening event hosted by the City of Vacaville celebrating their ten new electric buses. Congratulations City Coach!

2024 Solano Express Ridership and Analysis Study

Recommendation:

Authorize the Executive Director to amend the current contract with Quantum Market Research for the Solano Express Ridership and Analysis Study for an amount not-to-exceed \$169,463.

Brandon Thomson addressed the STA Board on the importance and purpose of the survey and analysis study. He cited that this data will be used to help calculate the new Intercity Transit Funding Agreement formula based upon rider residency. He added that the 2024 Study will include an on-board passenger survey and analysis, on-time performance, as well as on and off passenger counts at the various bus stops. Additionally, with the new Solano Express service changes recently implemented by SolTrans, this information will be informative to help make any necessary adjustments to the system in the future.

Summary of Board Comments and STA Staff Responses:

Questions were raised by Board Member Young and Benicia Vice Mayor and SolTrans Chair Terry Scott regarding the potential spending of \$169k and lack of a scope of work for the Study. Brandon Thomson responded that the transit operators involved with Solano Express participated in the Request for Proposals (RFP) process previously, additionally the funding for the Study is already programmed into the budget that was approved by the STA Board. Daryl Halls added that STA Board has set aside \$5M of State Transit Assistance Funds (STAF) to backfill Solano Express operating once ARPA funds are depleted and to be used for capital.

On a motion by Board Member Mashburn and a second by Board Member Moy, the STA Board approved the recommendation. (8 Ayes)

9. ACTION FINANCIAL ITEMS

A. Conduct Public Hearing and Adopt Resolution of Necessity to Acquire Property by Eminent Domain, if necessary, for the Westbound I-80 Cordelia Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Facility Project

Chair Kott started the item by reviewing the process and time limits that will be used for comments. Nick Burton, STA and Dale Dennis, Project Manager presented the project overview, benefits, right-of-way requirements, relocation assistance overview, and acquisition process related to three properties needed for the construction of the Westbound I-80 Cordelia Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Facility Project. Robin Thornton, Project Counsel, responded to questions directed at the Court process and certain due diligence inquiries related to the specific properties and the negotiations. The necessity of each acquisition was clarified in detail, noting the property needs for the facility and the need for access control for the facility. The Project timing was presented with emphasis on the importance of maintaining project schedule so that funding is not lost from the Project. They detailed why this is a critical safety and freight project for the I-80 corridor with the project's construction funding in the amount of \$198M; a combination of state and regional funding sources. They added that adoption of the Resolutions of Necessity will allow the condemnation process to proceed, and all property acquired for the project will be transferred to Caltrans. Mr. Dennis explained that despite proceeding with condemnation, staff will continue their efforts to try to reach an amicable agreement with all the property owners.

Dale Dennis cited that the recommendation is to conduct a separate public hearing and adopt a separate Resolution of Necessity to acquire by eminent domain property interest for this Truck Scale Project for each of the following property owners as listed in the staff report and Attachments He concluded by noting that after closing each of the public hearings, it is recommended that the STA Board adopt the Resolution of Necessity to acquire the needed property by eminent domain. A 4/5ths vote is required.

Summary of Board Member Comments:

Several questions were raised by the Board regarding the ongoing discussions and negotiations throughout the project schedule and Right of Way Acquisition process. There was discussion about the need for fair negotiations in property acquisitions and the challenges of balancing individual property owners' impacts against the overall project benefits and funding schedule.

Property No. 1 (Loney, et al. – Abutter's Rights of Access (Access Control)

At this time, Chair Kott bypassed the property owner's comments since a request to be heard within 15 days of notice was not submitted. Chair Kott proceeded with the staff's recommendation to conduct a public hearing and adopt STA Resolution of Necessity No. 2024-02 for Property No. 1 (Loney, et al.), needed for the Westbound I-80 Cordelia Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Facility Project.

On a motion by Vice Chair Mashburn, and seconded by Board Member Hernandez, the recommendation to adopt STA Resolution of Necessity No. 2024-<u>02</u> for Property No. 1 (Loney et al.) for the Westbound I-80 Cordelia Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Facility Project was unanimously approved by an **8/0 vote**.

Property No. 2 (Valine, et al. – Future Truck Scales Site)

Dale Dennis presented and summarized improvements to be located within the Valine acquisitions, including the new Truck Scales Facility and the ramps entering and leaving the new Truck Scales Facility. Mr. Dennis outlined the relocation eligibility and benefits which, while not part of the Public Hearing consideration, were explained. Additionally, Dale Dennis stated there is a relocation appeals process for the property owner should a dispute arise in this benefit process. Negotiations with Ms. Valine remain on-going, and staff will make every effort to reach a settlement with the property owner as discussions have been on-going.

At this time, Chair Kott proceeded with asking the property owner to make comments for the Board to consider.

Open Public Hearing: 7:07 p.m.

Summary of Property Owner Comments:

Kristen Renfro, Attorney for Michelle Valine, discussed Ms. Valine's history of ownership of the property and Ms. Valine's knowledge of planning for the project and experience with the eminent domain process. Ms. Renfro addressed the STA Board regarding the unresolved issues of the relocation process. She urged the Board to make every effort and consider the findings that will be made for the project as planned to be done in a manner has the least private injury and to be responsible for adequate relocation not only for Ms. Valine, but for her animals as well.

At this time, Chair Kott proceeded with staff's recommendation to conduct a public hearing and adopt STA Resolution of Necessity No. 2024-<u>03</u> for Property No. 2 (Valine, et al.), needed for the Westbound I-80 Cordelia Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Facility Project.

Summary of Public Comments:

None Presented.

Close Public Hearing: 7:13 p.m.

Summary of Board Comment/s:

Board members raised concerns regarding the relocation process for Ms. Valine and her animals. Robin Thornton explained that the purchase price differential, which is part of the relocation benefit, has been presented to Ms. Valine for use upon the identification of a relocation site and that this available benefit could converted to a rental differential. She noted that she is currently working with Ms. Renfro to find solutions possible under the regulations as well as complying with Caltrans guidelines in the process.

At this time, Board Member Moy informed the Board that she is voting no because she does not believe it to be true that there is the least private injury to the property owner in this case.

On a motion by Board Member Young, and seconded by Vice Chair Mashburn, the recommendation to adopt STA Resolution of Necessity No. 2024-<u>03</u> for Property No. 2 (Valine et al.) for the Westbound I-80 Cordelia Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Facility Project was approved by a **7/1 vote**.

Property No. 3 (Garaventa, et al.)

Dale Dennis presented and summarized the improvements to be located within the Garaventa acquisition which include the ramp leaving the new Truck Scales Facility. He also presented the acquisition details and process noting the necessity for the construction of a new on-ramp for the project. Mr. Dennis summarized that the subject property is located on a light commercial ownership of 19.5 acres with the proposed acquisition being 1.2 acres.

Before opening the public hearing, Chair Kott invited questions from the Board. A question was raised related to the ownership issues outlined in the staff report, including a question regarding whether a title report had been obtained. Ms. Thornton provided additional details regarding the litigation guarantee and outreach to the property owner to substantiate the claims of ownership not reflected in the litigation guarantee.

At this time, Chair Kott proceeded with asking the property owner to make comments for the Board to consider.

Summary of Property Owner Comments:

Mr. Joe Garaventa, Co-Trustee of the Garaventa Family Children's Trusts and a member of 88/12 LP and 88/12 LLC, provided a preamble regarding the respective ownership interests of the properties as between the Garaventa Children's Trust and 88/12 LP and 88/12 LLC. Mr. Garaventa also detailed development plans for the properties and disputes with the appraisal. Mr. Garaventa questioned the impact on adjacent properties. Mr. Garaventa concluded his presentation and sought to introduce additional speakers. Chair Kott indicated the additional persons could speak during public comment as stated at the beginning of the meeting.

At this time, Chair Kott proceeded with staff's recommendation to conduct a public hearing and adopt STA Resolution of Necessity No. 2024-<u>04</u> for Property No. 3 (Garaventa, et al.), needed for the Westbound I-80 Cordelia Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Facility Project.

Open Public Hearing: 7:24 p.m.

Summary of Public Comments:

Mr. Frazier, the appointed Manager of 88/12 LLC addressed the STA Board regarding confusion as to ownership. Mr. Frazier further stated his position that the process has not been fair. He added that it is his hope that the Board would take a pass on the Resolution of Necessity on the Garaventa property because of the unknown impacts on their affordable housing project. Further, he urged the Board to delay the project until a proper environmental analysis could be conducted with specific understanding of the impacts on their planned housing project. He also emphasized the importance of local elected officials handling land use decisions for their constituents' best interest and asked to reconsider the proposed resolution considering the stated concerns.

Elena Neigher, Attorney for 88/12 LLC/from the firm of Dickenson, Peatman & Fogarty, raised concerns on the Environmental Impact Report (EIR) that is being cited as part of the Resolution based on a report that was completed and approved 12 years ago.

She added that there may be unknown impacts that may flow from the project that were not specifically evaluated in the prior EIR. She urged the Board not to adopt the Resolution based on an outdated environmental report.

Jim Spering, MTC Commissioner, addressed the Board that the questions and issues being raised should be considered, but to note that the right process is being done tonight. He added that the action being taken tonight does not affect the valuation and that the process is being handled locally, which allows for this Board to ensure the process is fair and that he recommended that the Board take this step.

Mr. Joe Garaventa urged the Board not to move forward with the project with so many unknowns based on a 12-year-old EIR.

Close Public Hearing: 7:42 p.m.

Summary of Board Comments:

Additional comments and concerns were raised related to current zoning of the land and any plans submitted related to the affordable housing development. Mr. Frazier responded that there would need to be a zoning change to accommodate residential development. Mr. Frazier further noted that the draft plan for residential development was submitted in the Fall of 2023 to the City of Fairfield. There were additional questions raised regarding the impact on the housing project if the acquisition proceeds. In response to inquiries regarding the environmental compliance, Robin Thornton responded that there are court cases that make the ability to proceed with a project conditional on any required additional action with respect to environmental compliance. She added that process in which the law provides for as an alternative to stopping the project altogether. STA staff added that if there were no subsequent approval, the funding for the project would be lost.

At this time, Board Member Moy declared her intention to vote no due to the many issues brought before this Board.

On a motion by Board Member Carli, and seconded by Board Member Young, the recommendation to adopt STA Resolution of Necessity No. 2024-04 for Property No. 3 (Garaventa et al.) for the Westbound I-80 Cordelia Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Facility Project was approved by a 7/1 vote.

Vincent Ma provided an update on Senate Bill 1031 – The Connect Bay Area Act, which is sponsored by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission. This bill proposed to raise \$1.5 billion annually and the estimated return to Solano County is between \$55 million and \$78 million and divided between Safe Streets, Connectivity, Transit Transformation, and flexible category. SB 1031 has an additional revenue source that mandates employers with more than 50 full-time employees, and located near regional transit centers, purchase transit passes for each employee. STA currently has a "watch" position on the bill and staff recommended maintaining that position until future amendments are introduced.

B. Regional Measure 3 (RM3) Safe Routes to Transit/Bay Trail Program

Kathrina Gregana outlined the projects submitted by STA staff for initial funding consideration. The projects are Carquinez Straight Loop Trail – Vallejo/Benicia Bluff Trail Project Segment (\$3M), Solano Rail Hub (\$6M), Ulatis Creek Path/I-80 Undercrossing (\$3M), and Heart of Fairfield/West Texas Safe Routes to Transit (\$3M). Call for Projects is scheduled in the Fall of 2024.

After discussion, Robert Guerrero made a motion, seconded by Gwendolyn Hill, to approve:

1. Extending the funding agreement with the Solano Superior Court for the Equitable Access to Justice Pilot Program to 30 June 2025 at the current cost of an amount not-to-exceed \$50,000 per year with STA contributing up to \$40,000 per year from Solano County TDA funds and the Court contributing 20% in matching funds up to \$10,000 per year and to include the caveat noted above in *bold italics*.

The motion passed unanimously with a 9/0 vote.

Lorene Garrett proceeded with her presentation related to recommendations 2 through 4 noted below. She reviewed the statistics noting a decrease in vanpool program numbers due to the end of the two-year subsidy, and an increase in participation in the Guaranteed Ride Program. She also discussed the success of the Solano Mobility Express Vanpool Pilot Program and outlined the request to amend their agreements with Uber and Shared Mobility.

- 2. Extend the agreement with Uber for the Solano Express Guaranteed Ride program (under Guaranteed Ride Home) and Equitable Access to Justice Pilot Program to June 30, 2025.
- 3. Amend the agreement with Uber for the Solano Express Guaranteed Ride program to increase to an amount not-to-exceed \$175,000.

4. Amend the agreement with SHARE Mobility for the Solano Mobility Express Vanpool Pilot Program to extend the program to 30 June 2025 at a cost in the amount not-to-exceed \$116/revenue hour and \$555,636 per year.

RE: Renaming Consortium to Solano County Intercity Transit Consortium

Background:

On September 17, 1997, the Solano County Board of Supervisors unanimously accepted the 1996-97 Solano Intercity Transit Coordination Plan which proposed the establishment of the Solano Intercity Transit Consortium consisting of representatives from all Solano cities and the County. The action also authorized a revision to the STA Joint Powers Agreement to formally recognize the Consortium as an advisory body to Solano Transportation Authority and each member would be requested to sign a Memorandum of Understanding by January 1998. The Consortium was intended to help facilitate the implementation of the Solano Intercity Transit Coordination Plan and coordinate intercity transit services.

The Intercity Transit Consortium is considered a consensus-building advisory committee to the Solano Transportation Authority (STA). The initial Consortium Members consisted of representatives from the following participating transit agencies:

Vallejo Transit

Fairfield-Suisun Transit

City Coach (Vacaville)

Benicia Transit

Dixon Transit

Rio Vista Transit

Solano Transportation Authority (Staff)

Solano Commuter Information (SCI)

With the development of the intercity transit system known as SolanoLinks in 1997, the Solano Intercity Transit Consortium assumed the name of the SolanoLinks Intercity Transit Consortium. In September 2006 SolanoLinks transitioned to Solano Express and the SolanoLinks Intercity Transit Consortium became known as the Solano Express Intercity Transit Consortium.

Discussion:

Since 2006 many changes have transpired in Solano County's world of transit. The Solano Express Intercity Transit System is still a core component of transit service in Solano County. However, STA like many of our partner agencies has expanded services to include Microtransit. STA is also utilizing Transportation Network Companies like Lyft and Uber to support transit service through Solano Mobility's First/Last Mile Program, and the Solano Express Guarantee Ride Program. With Solano Mobility celebrating its 10th Anniversary and now having 16 Solano Mobility Programs focusing on Commuters, Employers, Older Adults, and People with Disabilities, the Solano Express Intercity Transit Consortium feels that changing the name to focus on a broader spectrum is more appropriate.

On March 26, 2024, the chair of the Consortium proposed a discussion item to change the name to Solano County Intercity Transit Consortium. The item was brought back as an action item on April 23, 2023, and passed unanimously. On April 24, 2023, the STA TAC met and concurred with forwarding the recommended Consortium name change to the STA Board for approval.

Fiscal Impact:

There is no fiscal impact with this action.

Recommendation:

Approve the recommendation to rename the Solano Express Intercity Transit Consortium to the Solano County Intercity Transit Consortium.

Background:

Since 2014, STA has partnered with the City of Suisun City to provide IT services for STA. These services have averaged less than \$15,000 per year, which is far less than the average cost of IT services for an agency of STA's size. The contract has been amended seven times, totaling \$139,910 over the past nine years.

Discussion:

STA staff recommends amending the existing contract to extend the term through June 30, 2025 and increase in the amount of \$60,000. The current contract with the City of Suisun City for IT services terminates on June 30, 2024. The term extension will allow STA to continue partnering with the City and the additional funding will cover the costs for STA's IT services need for Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25. The additional funding requested is an increase of \$20,000 over the previous request from FY 2023-24 and covers increase in personnel cost and benefits and increase is still competitive with other commercial or provide IT services.

Fiscal Impact:

\$60,000 in general funds to pay for STA's IT services for FY 2024-25.

Recommendation:

Authorize the Executive Director to amend the contract with the City of Suisun City for IT services for an amount not to exceed \$60,000 and to extend the contract term through June 30, 2025.

Background:

The STA's Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC) is responsible for providing funding and policy recommendations to the STA Board on pedestrian-related issues for monitoring, implementing, and updating the Countywide Pedestrian Plan. The PAC's membership currently has vacant positions for representation from the Solano Community College and the County of Solano (Attachment A).

The PAC representatives are nominated either by their respective city council or mayor before being considered by the STA Board for a formal appointment. Member-at-large positions are appointed directly by the STA Board. Appointments are for a 3-year term and are voluntary. Non-elected citizens are encouraged to participate in these citizen advisory committees.

Discussion:

David George is seeking to serve as the new PAC representative for the City of Suisun City, which has remained vacant for the last couple of years. Mr. George is a retired teacher with 37 years of experience serving in the Fairfield-Suisun Unified School District. He has been a resident of Suisun City since 1980's and is an active community member, who is currently working with the Solano Land Trust on an art installation piece for the Patwino Worrtla Kodoi Dihi Open Space Park. Mr. George's appointment as the Suisun City PAC representative was approved at the Suisun City Council Meeting held on April 2, 2024 (Attachment B).

STA staff recommends appointing David George as the PAC representative for the City of Suisun City for a term set to expire on December 31, 2026.

Background:

The Paratransit Coordinating Council (PCC) has a focus on developing expertise and understanding of the range of transportation services for Solano older adults, people with disabilities, low income, and transit dependent passengers; as well as, outreach activities, and making funding recommendations to the STA Board of Directors and Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC). The PCC Work Plan is the mechanism in which this may be achieved. The PCC Work Plan is approved by the STA Board.

Discussion:

STA staff initially presented the 2024 PCC DRAFT Workplan (Attachment A) to the PCC committee for review, comments, and approval on November 16, 2023. At that time, staff requested discussion on potential outreach opportunities, that may be available to better facilitate and achieve goals in the Work Plan.

The Work Plan lists proposed activities and potential community involvement suggestions as in previous workplans, while incorporating the ongoing committee tasks such as TDA allocation funding recommendations to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC). RE: Solano Countywide Wayfinding Sign Program Year 3 of a 3-Year Program

Funding Recommendations

Background:

The 2020 Solano Countywide Active Transportation Plan (ATP) identifies a wayfinding signage system as a critical strategy for enhancing the region's Active Transportation Network. The Solano ATP includes guidance and a summary of best practices that can be used to implement a Countywide Wayfinding Program. The report also provides recommended locations for signage placement in each jurisdiction.

To support the development of a Countywide Wayfinding Program, in 2020 the Solano Transportation Authority (STA) Board of Directors approved a \$25,000 set-a-side of Transportation Development Act Article 3 (TDA-3) funds for three years. The STA Board's action was due in large part to the STA Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC) and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC) recommendation to install and/or replace wayfinding signs around Solano County so residents can better locate and access Active Transportation infrastructure that connects to transit, jobs, recreation and promotes bicycle and pedestrian projects.

In February 2024, Year 3 of the Solano Countywide Wayfinding Sign Program Call for Projects was implemented with a funding capacity of \$25,000 to be allocated to competitive projects.

Discussion:

The Call for Projects went live on February 1, 2024, with application submittals due March 1, 2024. STA received three project submittals from the City of Rio Vista, Solano County Fair Association, and the Bay Area Ridge Trail for a total of \$55,993 in funding requests noted below:

- 1. The City of Rio Vista requested \$20,000 in funds for their Rio Vista Wayfinding Signs Project for a total project cost of \$24,000.
- 2. Solano County Fair Grounds Association requested \$25,000 in funds for their Solano County Fairgrounds Wayfinding Signage Project for a total project cost of \$25,000.
- 3. Bay Area Ridge Trail requested \$10,993 in funds for their Carquinez Straight Scenic Loop Trail (CSSLT) Wayfinding Signage Project on Solano County for a total project cost of \$46,750.

As part of the application review process, a member of the STA Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee participated in reviewing and scoring the projects based on the project's scope, location of signs, and the project's capability of enhancing visibility to active transportation facilities. In addition to the project scores submitted by the BAC and PAC, STA staff also took into consideration the project implementation timeline and deliverability and recommended the following funding allocations:

- 1. The City of Rio Vista \$10,000 for their Rio Vista Wayfinding Signs Project.
- 2. Solano County Fair Grounds Association \$5,000 for their Solano County Fairgrounds Wayfinding Signage Project.

3. Bay Area Ridge Trail – \$10,000 in funds for their Carquinez Straight Scenic Loop Trail (CSSLT) Wayfinding Signage Project to support with the maintenance component of this project.

Additional project information is provided in Attachment A. If funding allocations are approved by the STA Board, the project sponsors have until December 31, 2025 to expend funds.

At their meeting on April 24, 2024, the STA TAC unanimously approved the recommendation to forward for STA Board approval at their meeting on May 8, 2024.

Fiscal Impact:

None to the STA Budget. The \$25,000 available for projects will be funded through the Transportation Development Act Funds in the form of TDA-3.

Recommendation:

Authorize the Executive Director to approve and enter into a funding agreement for the following:

- 1. Rio Vista Rio Vista Wayfinding Signs Project in the amount of \$10,000;
- 2. Solano County Fair Grounds Association in the amount of \$5,000 for their Solano County Fairgrounds Wayfinding Signage Project; and

Background:

Since 2010, STA staff has been working in partnership with MTC, Caltrans, and Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) to implement the I-80 Express Lanes Project from Red Top Road to I-505 (Project). Environmental clearance (Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration) for the Project was completed and signed by Caltrans in December 2015 with the STA Board Approving the Project as a Responsible Agency in January 2016.

The Project is currently in construction and building the conversion approximately 8 miles of existing High Occupancy Vehicle (HOV) Lanes to Express Lanes (Red Top Rd to Air Base Pkwy) and constructing 8-miles of new Express Lanes (Airbase Parkway to I-505). The newly constructed lanes from Airbase to I-505 in both the east and west directions will primarily be constructed in the existing median. This \$243 M Project is funded with a combination of SB1 Trade Corridor Enhancement Funds, Regional Measure 2 and 3 Bridge Toll Funds, and Solano Regional State Transportation Improvement Program funds.

Caltrans is the Lead Agency for both California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) compliance for the Project. STA is the project sponsor for this Project, as it took the lead in preparing the environmental document, Final Design and Right of Way Phases of project development.

Discussion:

As mentioned above, STA has assumed responsibility for the right-of-way phase, including acquiring all necessary property rights (including fee, easements, and temporary construction easements). Staff is currently working with the property owners to acquire these property rights. In addition to signing right of way contracts, the Executive Director may need to complete the following activities for the Project: 1) Possession and use agreements and other documents required to complete right-of-way acquisition; 2) accept and record property deeds and easements; 3) accept temporary construction easements and record if appropriate; 4) make property exchanges; 5) assign and convey easements to other parties; and 6) transfer property rights to Caltrans as appropriate.

Approval of the attached Resolution (Attachment A) will authorize the Executive Director to sign right-of way contracts and related documents on behalf of Solano Transportation Authority for the I-80 Express Lanes Project noted above.

Fiscal Impact:

All costs associated with the Right of Acquisition Phase will be funded with project specific funds.

Recommendation:

Approve STA Resolution No. 2024-<u>05</u> authorizing the Executive Director to sign right-of-way contracts and related documents required for the Right of Way Phase for a project on behalf of the Solano Transportation Authority.

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 27281 directs that deeds or grants conveying any interest in or easement upon real estate to a public agency be accepted with the consent of the agency as evidenced by a certificate or resolution of acceptance attached to or printed on the deed or grant; and

WHEREAS, the Solano Transportation Authority is participating with the State of California Department of Transportation in the delivery of the I-80 Express Lanes (Red Top Road to I-505) Project (Project); and

WHEREAS, the Project would consist constructing High Occupancy Vehicle/High Occupancy Toll lanes (HOV/HOT or Express Lanes) in both westbound and eastbound directions of I-80 from west of Red Top Road to east of I-505, within Solano County. The I-80 Express Lanes Project (Project) would construct approximately 18-miles of Express Lanes in the I-80 corridor through conversion of existing HOV lanes and highway widening for new Express Lanes. The project limit is approximately 20 miles because of the need to install express lanes signs and equipment 1 mile in advance of the actual express lane entrance. The general location of the proposed improvements extends along I-80 from post mile (PM) R10.4 to 30.2 and passing through the cities of Fairfield and Vacaville.; and

WHEREAS, STA on January 13, 2016 has approved the Project as a Responsible Agency including acceptance of the Initial Study with Mitigated Negative Declaration/Environmental Assessment with Finding of No Significant Impact prepared by Caltrans for the Project; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Solano Transportation Authority Board of Directors authorizes the Executive Director to complete the following activities for the Project: 1) execute right-of-way contracts, possession and use agreements and all other documents necessary to complete right-of-way acquisition; 2) to accept and record property deeds and easements; 3) to accept temporary construction easements and record if appropriate; 4) make property exchanges; 5) to assign and convey easements to other parties; and 6) to convey such interests to Caltrans as needed for the Project as appropriate.

RE: STA's Draft Overall Work Plan (OWP) for FYs 2024-25 and 2025-26

Background:

Each year, the Solano Transportation Authority (STA) Board and staff identify and update the STA's priority plans, projects, and programs. These tasks provide the foundation for the STA's OWP for the forthcoming two fiscal years. In July 2002, the STA Board modified the adoption of its list of priority projects to coincide with the adoption of its two-year budget. This marked the first time the STA had adopted a two-year Overall Work Plan.

Over the past 20 plus years, the STA's Overall Work Plan (OWP) has continued to evolve based on changing Board priorities, requests from the eight member agencies that comprise the STA's Joint Powers Authority (JPA), and to address priorities, policies, and requirements emanating from the federal, state, and the region. The focus of the STA during the timeframe of 2000 to 2005 was to complete the first Solano County Comprehensive Transportation Plan, initiate various corridor studies, and identify a handful of priority projects to fund and advance into construction. From 2005 to the present, the STA has taken a more proactive role in advancing projects through a variety of project development activities and has expanded its transit coordination role in partnership with Solano's five local transit operators, the Capitol Corridors, and the San Francisco Bay Ferry. STA is now managing numerous mobility programs, through our role as a Consolidated Transit Service Agency (CTSA), designed to improve mobility and access for older adults, people with disabilities, low-income residents traveling to work, shopping, medical appointments, veterans, and school-age children and their parents traveling to and from school.

Planning FY 2023-24

STA's planning activities during this past fiscal year included focusing on supporting the City County Coordinating Council and helping the cities and County complete their Housing Elements. This effort has been done through the Solano Housing Collaborative and will continue into the next FY. Planning staff will be carrying forward the Solano Rail Hub Implementation Plan effort into the next FY and has initiated the start of the Comprehensive Transportation Plan. Planning staff has undertaken updating the Safe Routes to Schools Plan, and the Rail Crossing Study. Staff has worked with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) on the Plan Bay Area 2050 implementation which has 35 recommendations divided into four quadrants of transportation, housing, economic development and environment, and the allocation of One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) 3 funding. Planning staff also continued administering Clean Air and Active Transportation funds through the Bay Area Air Quality Management District, Transportation for Clean Air Program and TDA Article 3 Program.

Projects FY 2023-24

In 2009, the STA's eight member agencies approved an update and modification to the STA's Joint Powers Agreement that authorized the STA to perform all aspects of project development and delivery, including right of way functions for specified priority projects.

This past fiscal year, the STA's project development activities included the following:

- Received Board approval to initiate the construction for the upgrade to the SR 37/Fairgrounds Interchange and obtained Regional Measure 3 funds for the construction phase.
- ➤ Worked with MTC and Caltrans to initiate the design phase for SR 37 Interim Congestion Relief Project (Mare Island Interchange to SR 37/121).
- The construction is complete for Phase 2 of the I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange through a Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC) project delivery approach with STA serving as the lead for the design and right of way phases for the project. Received Board approval to initiate design for Phase 5 of the Interchange.
- > STA landed two SB1 Grants two years ago, \$123.4M for the I-80 Managed Lanes Project construction phase which started construction in May 2022 and is slated to be open in 2025., and \$26M for the I-80 Westbound Truck Scales design phase with STA taking the lead on the design phase which is at 95% completion.
- ➤ This year, STA obtained another SB 1 grant (\$129M) for construction of the I-80 Westbound Truck Scales with STA taking the lead for right of way acquisition.
- ➤ Implementation of the 2018 and 2020 State Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP) grants for Solano Express Service Integration and Electrification are still underway.
- ➤ In partnership with Caltrans and Vallejo, secured additional state funding for the SR 29 Sonoma Blvd. Complete Streets implementation as part of the Caltrans rehabilitation project which will begin work in FY 2025.
- ➤ In partnership with Caltrans and Rio Vista, the SR 12 SHOPP project will be delivered in three phases with the first phase nearly completed and phases 2 and 3 to start in FY 2025.
- ➤ Completed the tenth annual report for the Regional Transportation Impact Fee (RTIF) Program which passed the \$20 million milestone in funds generated for the Program.
- ➤ The Abandoned Vehicles Abatement (AVA) Program reimbursed 3,596 vehicles abated during the previous fiscal year.
- ➤ Submitted SR 113 to Caltrans as a 2024 SHOPP priority.
- > Developed updated funding plan for Jepson Parkway project phases.
- ➤ Obtained \$850,000 federal earmark from Congressman Garamendi for SR 37 Fairgrounds project.

Programs FY 2023-24

STA's Program Department has remained active in providing mobility programs and options. The assortment of 16 countywide and local communities services and programs offered have continued to grow and evolve. STA's First and Last Mile Program partnership with LYFT continued to bridge service gaps resulting from the transit service cuts. While people commuting began to gradually return over this past year, the Solano Employer Commuter Information Program has updated the vanpool program, which formed 11 new vanpools, and the bucks for bikes programs to encourage the transition from single vehicle occupancy. Staff has been focusing on building partnerships with our adjacent counties along the SR 37, I-80 and I-680 travel corridors to eliminate barriers for the commuters between counties. The Safe Routes to School (SR2S) Program had another proactive and productive school year with the initiation of a 3rd cycle of Micro Grant Projects and another round of enforcement grants.

STA initiated a subsidized vanpool pilot between Vacaville, Dixon and Sacramento following the suspension of Blue Line service by SolTrans. The STA, with funding provided by MTC, has initiated a Connected Mobility Implementation Plan which provides important information regarding performance measures, developed a SR 37 Transit/TDM Plan, and how best to respond to the 27 recommendations and six focus areas brought forward by MTC's Blue Ribbon Transit Recovery Task Force. Overall, the Programs Department has continued to provide mobility services throughout the county, the summary includes:

- ✓ The Solano Mobility Call Center assisted 7,486 individuals by phone, 355 in person, and 84,987 website users
- ✓ Assessed 123 individuals for American with Disabilities Act (ADA) eligibility.
- ✓ Expanded the Intercity Paratransit Taxi Card Program to include non-ambulatory services and provided 1,1,38 trips with 479 active users and implemented the program in Suisun City with 126 residents signed up and began expanding the program to Veterans (75 Registered with 389 rides). 945 WAV rides were provided.
- ✓ Completed 89 Travel Training and 7 field trips.
- ✓ GoGo Grandparents provided 8,842 trips.
- ✓ trips taken on First Last Mile Program.
- ✓ 41,312 trips taken on First Last Mile Program.
- ✓ 253 employer engagements through Solano Mobility and the Solano EDC at Chamber and tabled events in fiscal year 2023/24.
- ✓ Formed 3 new vanpools and subsidized up to 20.
- ✓ Launched the Equitable Access to Justice Pilot providing 74 rides for jurors and collaborative court participants through the second quarter.
- ✓ Launched the Solano Mobility Express Vanpool Pilot providing 3,016 rides with zero runs missed and 4.96 /5 for 300 ratings.
- ✓ Updated incentives programs to enhance goals of the programs.

Discussion:

Attached for review is the STA's Draft OWP for FY's 2024-25 and 2025-26. The 22 plans, 13 projects and 26 programs contained in the current OWP have been updated to reflect milestones achieved and contain new additions approved by the STA Board during FY 2023-24 that increase the OWP to 61 items.

PROJECT DELIVERY/COMPLETE PROJECTS/NEAR TERM CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Gearing up for the STA's Budget for FY 2024-25 and 2025-26, the following five OWP projects are fully funded and are now completed, currently under construction or slated to be in construction in FY 2024-2025 or 2025-26:

- I-80 Managed Lanes (Conversion of HOV Lanes to Express Lanes from Red Top Road to Air Base Parkway and the New Express Lanes from Air Base Parkway to I-505) Under Construction
- I-80 Westbound Truck Scales (design phase underway with SB 1 grant and requesting RM 3 for right of way)— STA (environmentally cleared)-RM 3/SB1 TCEP/Federal Earmark — Construction 2025.
- SR12 SHOPP/Complete Highways Project construction scheduled for 2025 and 2026
- SR 29 SHOPP/Complete Highways Project construction scheduled for 2024-25

There are several projects that are currently in the project development phase with a specific project development phase currently funded so that work can continue, but the project is not fully funded and the STA is seeking additional futures funds for construction.

- I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange Phase 5 design phase– RM 3
- SR 37 Interim Congestion Relief Project (SR 121 to Mare Island), design phase funded Caltrans/MTC/STA/SCTA/NVTA RM 3/SB1/State Funding
- Jepson Parkway remaining unfunded segments City of Fairfield and Vacaville Fairfield and Vacaville to seek Developer Implementation– RTIF/TIF/LPP/Others

Finally, there are several projects that are included in the OWP, but the initial or next phase of the project is not currently funded in the current two-year budget.

- I-80 Express Lanes Project Carquinez Bridge to SR 37 seeking environmental phase funding
- I-80 Express Lanes I-505 to Yolo County Line Seeking PID Funding
- Mare Island Interchange- Seeking PID funding

TRANSIT CENTERS

In recent years, STA has partnered with local transit operators and cities to improve and upgrade regional transit centers. There are several priority transit centers that the STA has successfully pursued and obtained or programmed federal, state or regional funds for. Several of these projects are moving through the project development stage into construction. These projects are initial phases of larger planned transit projects that are not fully funded. The larger, long range transit centers are as follows:

- Vallejo Station Phase B- RM 3 eligible -initial funding requested for environmental/design
- Fairfield/Vacaville Hannigan Rail Station Phase 2 (Station Building/Additional Parking)
- Solano Rail Hub Capital improvements for expanded Capital Corridor service and future SMART service -RM 3 funds requested for Environmental and Initial Design
- Fairgrounds Mobility Hub Project initial phase fully funded OBAG3/County TDA
- Suisun City Mobility Hub-Project under construction

STA PLANNING ACTIVITIES

The following planning studies are currently underway, funded in the currently proposed budget, and scheduled to be undertaken or completed in FY 2023-24:

- 2023 Congestion Management Program Update completed
- Comprehensive Transportation Plan- three elements, plus equity underway
- Solano Connected Mobility Implementation Plan in process

STA PROGRAMS

Some of the major upcoming programs included the following:

- Solano Safe Routes to Schools (SR2Ss) Cycle 3 Micro-Grant and 6th Round Enforcement Grant
- Completed fourth Full Year of College Fee program for SCC students
- The Solano Mobility Management Call Center will continue to be marketed to likely users to increase awareness of mobility options
- Focus on mobility options for older adults and people with disabilities will also continue with focused outreach, travel training and GoGo Grandparents
- Completion of ninth year of In-Person ADA Eligibility Program will continue with the added ease of over the phone assessments if applicable

- The Employer-Commuter Program is looking to expand the use and marketing of Ride Amigos, First and Last Mile, vanpool connections and working along corridors with our neighboring counties
- Implementation tenth year of the RTIF Program

There are several primary tasks for STA working with the transit operators in FY 2024-25. First will be implementation and incentives for the return of customers to transit, working collaboratively on the Solano Connected Mobility Implementation Plan, coordination with the Solano County Transit 2030 committee, and update of Solano Express Funding Agreement.

The OWP contains plans, projects, transit projects, city project, transit/mobility programs, and coordination or funding programs. The draft OWP will be presented to the Consortium and TAC in April and the STA Board in May with Board adoption scheduled for June of 2024.

The two-year OWP will lead up to the Board's adoption of STA's updated two-year budget scheduled for July.

Recommendation:

Release the STA's Draft Overall Work Plan (OWP) for FY 2024-25 and 2025-26 for a 30-day review period as shown in Attachment A.

RE: Draft Fiscal Year 2024-25 Operating Budget for Solano Express

Discussion/Background:

The Solano Express Intercity Transit Funding Agreement provides for the annual funding of four intercity transit routes, known as Solano Express. Funding contributions by partner agencies are based on a bi-annual Solano Express ridership survey utilizing a formula of 80% ridership and 20% population. A draft forecast for the FY 2024-25 Solano Express Operating Budget was presented to the Intercity Funding Working Group (ITFWG) on April 23, 2024. The FY 2024-25 Solano Express Operating Budget will be brought back to the Solano County Intercity Transit Consortium on May 28, 2024, and the STA TAC on May 29, 2024, then back to the STA Board on June 12, 2024, for final approval.

The draft Solano Express operating Budget (Attachment A) provides for 2 scenarios, one based on the current operating cost of \$210 per revenue hour and a second based on a 4% cola increase of \$218 per revenue hour. Both scenarios are based on 45,000 revenue hours. TDA contributions from partner agencies are recommended to remain the same. The cost differential will be absorbed by the remaining American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds. In FY 2025-26 the ARPA funds are expected to be fully utilized and State Transit Assistance funds will be needed to fill the funding gap. On July 12, 2023, the STA Board established a Solano Express Capital and Operating Reserve of \$5.8 million for this purpose.

STA staff will continue to provide regular updates to the STA Board on the Solano Express operations, ridership, costs, and revenues based on quarterly reports provided by Soltrans. If service changes are implemented, future adjustments to the Solano Express Operating budget may be required. The transfer of Solano Express operational funds for FY 2024-25 is subject to an STA Board-approved TDA Matrix and an updated Intercity Transit Funding and Operational Agreement between STA, SolTrans, and all the funding partners.

Fiscal Impact:

The FY 2024-25 draft Solano Express operating budget at \$210 per revenue hour is \$9.4 at \$218 per revenue hour is \$9.8 million to be funded with RM2, RM3, ARPA, Fares, Solano College fees, and TDA contributions from partner agencies. Once finalized the Solano Express Operating budget funding amounts will be included in the FY 2024-25 TDA Matrix.

RE: Regional Measure 3 (RM3) Safe Routes to Transit/Bay Trail Program Priorities

Background:

In 2017, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) worked with the State Legislature to authorize a ballot measure, called Regional Measure 3 (RM3), to finance a variety of highway, transit, and active transportation improvements which was passed in 2018. RM3 included an Expenditure Plan that identified specific programs and projects with designated funding amounts.

The legislation included a \$150 million carve out for a San Francisco Bay Trail/ Safe Routes to School Transit to be administered by MTC and is defined as "a competitive grant program to fund bicycle and pedestrian access improvements on and in the vicinity of the state-owned toll bridges connecting to rail transit stations and ferry terminals."

Litigation prevented RM3 allocations from occurring until January of 2023 when the State Supreme Courts upheld the Appellate Courts decision. With the litigation resolved, MTC has started developing the Call for Projects for the Safe Routes to Transit & Bay Trail Program (SR2TBT) to allocate these bicycle and pedestrian grant funds.

Discussion:

The SR2TBT is a new program with \$150 million in funding available in one-time funds from RM3 revenues. Eligible applicants include cities, counties, transit operators, school districts, community colleges, and universities. MTC recently released their program framework for the SR2TBT Program (included as Attachment A).

Based on MTC's program eligibility framework, STA staff submitted the following projects for initial consideration for funding:

1) <u>Carquinez Straight Loop Trail – Vallejo/Benicia Bluff Trail Project Segment</u>
Bay Trail/Ridge Trail project connecting two cities Vallejo and Benicia to both the
Carquinez Strait bridge and the Benicia Martinez Bridge and further to the East Bay
Parks District in Contra Costa through Martinez and Crockett.

Request: \$3 million

2) Solano Rail Hub

Improve access to rail station and Fairfield and Suisun City Priority Development Areas/Downtown Centers.

Request: \$6 million

3) <u>Ulatis Creek Path/I-80 Undercrossing</u>

Class 1 Path connecting Vacaville Transportation Center and Allison Drive Priority Development Area to Downtown Vacaville.

Request: \$3 million

4) Heart of Fairfield/West Texas Safe Routes to Transit

Access improvements to Fairfield Transportation Center and Downtown Fairfield Priority Development Area.

Request: \$3M

Each project has a nexus to the rail and ferry access and/or a toll bridge. A call for projects is anticipated in Fall 2024.

Background:

The Solano Safe Routes to School (SR2S) Program works to increase the number of students walking and bicycling to school by helping to make the journey safe, fun, and healthy. Using a comprehensive approach, the program includes 6 "E's": education, encouragement, enforcement, engineering, engagement, and evaluation. The Program is available to all schools countywide and focuses on activities and programs that educate students on safety, health awareness and identifying improvements within communities countywide to enhance active student travel safety.

In 2008, the STA Board adopted Solano's first Safe Routes to School Plan (Plan) and authorized STA staff to create a Safe Routes to School Program in Solano County. This Plan provided the direction for the SR2S Program. In June 2023, STA Staff initiated the 3rd iteration of the Safe Routes to School Plan Update with selected consultants, DKS and Associates. Staff, along with its partner agency, Solano Public Health, reengaged with Community Task Forces in each city to discuss the Plan update as well as the Program's 5-year vision, which includes evaluating the effectiveness of the Program. During the Fall of 2023 Safe Routes to School Staff, along with the Consultant implemented a public communications and outreach plan to solicit feedback from the community on their vision for bicycling and walking in Solano County.

Discussion:

Staff have continued to work with the SR2S Community Task Forces to prioritize schools in their respective cities/school districts that will be evaluated for walk audits in May 2024. Once the audits have been completed, a Recommendations Report including a base map of each walk audit will be shared with STA partners and the schools assessed. These selected schools can be viewed in Attachment A. Additionally, STA staff and DKS and Associates are also working to develop comprehensive evaluation metrics and performance measures to analyze the efficacy of components of the Safe Routes to School program. The Plan is scheduled to be completed by the Fall of 2024.

The SR2S Staff have successfully reengaged the schools in Solano County, resulting in a return to pre-COVID participation levels. Currently, the SR2S Program is actively involved with 80 out of the 114 schools in the county. In the fiscal year 2023-24, SR2S Program Coordinators attended 53 events throughout the county, with 18 more yet to come. Details of these upcoming events can be found in Attachment B.

Fiscal Impact:

Funding through the Metropolitan Transportation Commission's (MTC) Quick-Strike, One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) and The Office of Traffic and Safety (OTS) grants.

RE: Legislative Update

Background:

Each year, STA staff monitors state and federal legislation that pertains to transportation and related issues. On January 10, 2024, the STA Board approved its 2024 Legislative Platform to provide policy guidance on transportation legislation and the STA's legislative activities during 2024.

Monthly legislative updates are provided by STA's state and federal lobbyists and are attached for your information (Attachments A and B). An updated Legislative Bill Matrix listing state bills of interest is available at: https://sta.ca.gov/operations/legislative-program/current/

Discussion:

On April 11th, the US Department of Transportation (DOT) awarded \$20 million in Promoting Resilient Operations for Transformative, Efficient, and Cost-Saving Transportation (PROTECT) funds to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) for the Resilient State Route 37 – Sears Point to Mare Island Improvement Project. MTC is also submitting a \$130 million grant request from Multimodal Project Discretionary Grant (MPDG) Rural Surface Transportation Grant (Rural) to further advance this project.

Congressional Members announced their requests for FY 2025 Community Project Funding and STA staff and member agency staff have submitted four projects for funding consideration in the Transportation, Housing, and Urban Development (THUD) appropriations bill. STA staff will schedule meetings with the offices of Senators Alex Padilla and Laphonza Butler, and Congressman Mike Thompson to brief their staff on these projects. STA Staff is also supporting the City of Dixon with its Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvements (CRISI) Program application for the Parkway Blvd Overcrossing project.

Senate Bill 1031 (SB 1031) The Connect Bay Area Act, is sponsored by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission and proposes to raise \$1.5 billion annually. MTC Staff provided an estimate on the return to source (minimum of 70%) to Solano County. The estimated amount of \$55 million and \$78 million would be divided between the following categories Safe Streets (\$20 million), Connectivity (\$12 million), Transit Transformation (\$14 million), and a county flexible category (\$9 million). The Regional Share is estimated to receive \$241 million and Solano County would be eligible to receive an additional estimated \$23 million from this amount. SB 1031 has an additional revenue source that mandates employers with more than 50 full-time employees, and located near regional transit centers, to purchase transit passes for each employee. SB 1031 passed out of the Senate Transportation Committee on April 23rd, and passed the Senate Tax and Revenue Committee on April 24th. The bill is currently in the Senate Appropriations Committee awaiting amendments requested by Senate Transportation Committee Chair, Dave Cortese (D-Santa Clara).

STA currently has a "watch" position on the bill and staff recommended maintaining that position until future amendments are introduced.

Assembly Bill 2719 (AB 2719) Transit Vehicle Inspections, which would exempt public transit buses, that have previously been inspected and certified by the California Highway Patrol (CHP), from stopping at a CHP weigh station. AB 2719 passed the Assembly Transportation Committee and is now in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

STA Staff continue to monitor the following bills:

- SB 960 (Wiener) Complete Streets Projects on the State Highway System
- AB 1837 (Papan) San Francisco Bay area: public transit: Regional Network Management Council

<u>State Legislative Update</u> (Shaw/Yoder/Antwih/Schmelzer/Lange):

The Legislature returned from Spring Recess on April 1st with policy committees holding hearings to move bills to appropriations committees by April 26th. It is expected that appropriation committees will hear bills that were placed on the suspense file on May 16th to move them to the floor and then bills must be passed out of the first house by May 24th. Governor Newsom and Legislative Leadership agreed to take early action on the State Budget ahead of the Governor's May Revise, which is expected to be announced around May 14th. The Legislature will then have until June 15th to pass the State Budget.

On April 23rd, SB 1031 was heard in the Senate Committee on Transportation, which is chaired by Senator Dave Cortese. This authorization bill contains four revenue models (sales tax, employer tax, vehicle fees, and property-related fees) and would guarantee a minimum of 70% return to source with 45% allocated to transit transformation, 25% allocated for safe streets, 15% allocated for connectivity projects, and 15% allocated for flexible priorities. Additional amendments were requested by Chair Cortese, including:

- The stated goal of raising \$1.5 billion in revenues, while limiting the sale tax portion to a half-cent
- Limiting the duration of the measure to 30 years
- Sunsetting the authority to place a measure on the ballot in 2040
- "Limiting" MTC's control and application of the regional network manager's objectives to only State Transit Assistance funds
- A limit on MTC's bonding authority to capital projects and to funds "retained" by MTC
- An agreement to continue working on the return to source provisions in the bill
- Retain placeholder language for universal transit pass requirements

SB 1031 passed out of the Senate Transportation Committee and was then heard and passed out of the Senate Revenue and Taxation Committee on April 24th.

Federal Legislative Update (Akin Gump):

STA's federal legislative advocate (Susan Lent of Akin Gump) continues working with staff to align upcoming federal funding opportunities with STA and STA Member Agency projects.

RE: STATE LEGISLATIVE UPDATE – May 2024

Legislative Update

The Legislature has been busy hearing bills in policy committees since returning from Spring Recess on April 1. Policy committees have until April 26 to hear bills with fiscal impacts and move them to the appropriations committees, where most bills will be placed on the suspense file. We anticipate the suspense file hearings to take place on May 16. Bills must move out of the first house by May 24. For more information about key legislative and budget deadlines, see the adopted 2024 Legislative Calendar available here.

State Budget Update

Governor Newsom will release the May Revise, the Governor's update to the January budget on or around May 14. We expect the May Revise to include updated projections for the state's deficit and revised proposals to address the shortfall.

As we reported last month, on April 4, Governor Newsom, Senate President pro Tempore Mike McGuire, and Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas announced an agreement on roughly \$17 billion in early actions to "significantly reduce the existing [budget] shortfall and best position California to responsibly address the budget in June." Importantly, the agreement preserves the state's commitment to provide the full balance of the \$4 billion for the population-based Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (commonly referred to as AB 102 / SB 125 funding). The main elements of the agreement are included in AB 106 (Gabriel), which was signed by the Governor on April 15.

It is worth noting that the AB 106 provides the Department of Finance with the ability to suspend the authority to expend any one-time funding provided in the Budget Acts of 2021, 2022, or 2023. No additional details on this authority are currently available on how this authority will be exercised.

SB 1031 - Regional Measure

As you are aware, the effort to authorize a regional transportation funding measure for voter consideration is now ensconced in SB 1031 (Wiener and Wahab). The bill currently includes various revenue mechanisms (sales tax, employer tax, vehicle fees, property related fees) and identifies the funding priorities for the revenue generated from the measure, focusing on transit operations and

transformation, safe streets and pothole repair, connectivity/mobility improvements, and climate resilience. The bill also now includes some high-level return to source provisions, with minimum funding guarantees for transit operators based on the size of the system and a proposed breakdown of funding categories. The revenues are only to be used to fund transportation improvements in the Bay Area, and are required to be equitably allocated throughout the Bay Area, while guaranteeing a minimum 70% return to source for each county, as follows:

- 45% of revenues allocated for transit transformation investments, which includes minimum guarantees for operators.
- 25% of revenues for investments that support safe streets which would flow to STA and can be used for street repairs.
- 15% of revenues allocated for investments supporting connectivity.
- 15% of revenues allocated to agencies for transit transformation investments, and investments in safe streets and connectivity, for the purpose of maintaining the minimum county benefit threshold, preventing service cuts and increasing ridership, or investing in other regional priorities.

On April 23, the bill was heard in the Senate Transportation Committee. At the direction of the Chair, additional elements were agreed to by the authors, which include:

- The stated goal of raising \$1.5 billion in revenues, while limiting the sale tax portion to a half-cent.
- Limiting the duration of the measure to 30 years.
- Sunsetting the authority to place a measure on the ballot in 2040.
- "Limiting" MTC's control and application of the regional network manager's objectives to only State Transit Assistance funds.
- A limit on MTC's bonding authority to capital projects and to funds "retained" by MTC.
- An agreement to continue working on the return to source provisions in the bill.
- Retain placeholder language for universal transit pass requirements.

During the hearing, Chair Cortese said that these amendments were the "absolute minimum" needed for the bill to advance from his committee and raised concerns about return to source and a desire to work on a more direct pass-through to individual counties. The bill passed the Senate Transportation Committee. The following day, April 24, the bill passed the Senate Revenue and Taxation Committee. It now heads to the Senate Appropriations Committee, where we will likely see the agreed to terms reflected in print.

Bills of Interest

SB 532 (Wiener) Bridge Toll Increase

This bill would increase the toll for vehicles for crossing toll bridges in the San Francisco Bay area by \$1.50 until December 31, 2028, and require the revenues collected from this toll to be used by MTC for allocation to transit operators that provide service within the San Francisco Bay area and experiencing an operations funding challenge. Any transit operator seeking an allocation would be required to submit a 5-year projection of its operating need. *This bill is in the Assembly.*

SB 960 (Wiener) Complete Streets Projects on the State Highway System

On complete streets, this bill would require all transportation projects funded or overseen by Caltrans to provide complete streets facilities unless exempt pursuant to the bill. It would also require the targets and performance measures adopted by the California Transportation Commission to include within the SHOPP asset management plan objective targets and measures reflecting state transportation goals and objectives, including for complete streets assets on the state highway system. This bill would also require Caltrans' performance report to include a description of complete streets facilities on each project. Lastly, this bill would require Caltrans to develop and adopt a project intake, evaluation, and encroachment permit review process for complete streets facilities that are sponsored by a local jurisdiction or transit agency. As a part of this process, Caltrans would be required to designate an encroachment permit manager in each district to oversee the review of complete streets facilities applications. Caltrans would then be required to produce a report on the project applications submitted for complete streets facilities.

On transit priority projects, this bill would require the Director of Transportation to, on or before July 1, 2027, adopt a transit priority policy to guide the implementation of transit priority facilities on the state highway system. The bill would also require the Caltrans-prepared State Highway System Management Plan (SHSMP) to include specific and quantifiable accomplishments, goals, objectives, costs, and performance measures for transit priority facilities consistent with SHOPP asset management plan and Caltrans' most recent policy.

AB 817 (Pacheco) Brown Act - Advisory Bodies

This bill provides a narrow exemption under the Brown Act for non-decision-making legislative bodies to participate in meetings via teleconferencing outside of a declared state of emergency without posting the physical location of members or requiring a quorum to be present at a meeting location.

AB 1798 (Papan) Stormwater Runoff

This bill would require Caltrans and the State Water Resources Control Board, the Department of Toxic Substances Control, and the Department of Fish and Wildlife, to develop a programmatic environmental review process to prevent toxic compounds generated from vehicle tires from entering salmon and steelhead trout bearing waters. The bill would require Caltrans' process to include a pilot project at an unspecified location to study the effectiveness and cost effectiveness of installing and maintaining bioretention and biofiltration systems.

AB 1837 (Papan) Bay Area Transit Coordination

Modeled after the work underway at MTC, this bill would create the Regional Network Management Council as an 11-member council to provide leadership and critical input on regional transit policies, and to provide executive guidance on regional transit policies and actionable implementation plans in pursuit of transformative improvements in the customer experience San Francisco Bay area transit.

AB 2061 (Wilson) State Sales Tax Exemption for Public Ferry Vessels

This bill would establish, through January 1, 2030, a new exemption for the purchase of zero-emission ferries by public transit agencies from the state portion of the sales and use tax.

AB 2503 (Lee) CEQA Exemptions for Railroad Electrification

This bill would exempt from the requirements of CEQA railroad electrification projects and railroad siding projects.

AB 2719 (Wilson) Transit Vehicle Inspections

This bill would authorize a public transit agency to request that the California Highway Patrol conduct an annual inspection and certification of its fleet. The bill would exempt any public transit agency vehicle that has been certified through that inspection from the requirement to stop at a roadside inspection (weigh station).

AB 2824 (McCarty) Transit Employee Assaults

Currently a spot bill, this legislation will be amended to enhance penalties for individuals who commit assault or battery against a public transit operator or employee. This bill also allows transit agencies to prohibit individuals convicted of assault or battery from entering transit facilities and vehicles using a more streamlined process. This bill is sponsored by the California Transit Association. *This bill is not moving forward in 2024.*

Re: March Report

In March, Akin monitored developments in Washington. Susan Lent met with STA staff to discuss priority projects for 2024 and presented to the Board of STA regarding developments and outlook in Washington.

Fiscal Year 2024 Appropriations

Congress finally was able to pass the 12 appropriations bills that will fund the federal government for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2024. On March 9, President Biden signed into law six of the Fiscal Year 2024 spending bills—including the Transportation, and Housing and Urban Development, and Related Agencies appropriations, Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies; Commerce, Justice, Science, and Related Agencies; Energy and Water Development; Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies; and Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, and Related Agencies appropriations. The Transportation bill included the following STA community projects:

- \$850,000 -- State Route 37 / Fairgrounds Drive Interchange Improvement Project CA
- \$500,000 -- City of Fairfield, Fairfield Transit and Municipal Fleet Electrification Project

On March 23, the President signed into law the remaining six funding bills, including Defense; Financial Services and General Government; Homeland Security; Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies; Legislative Branch, and State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs bills.

Fiscal Year 2025 Appropriations

On March 11, President Joe Biden released his <u>Fiscal Year 2025 budget request</u>, totaling \$7.3 trillion. Of note, the budget includes \$78.4 billion for highway, highway safety, and transit formula programs outlined in the *Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act* (IIJA; <u>P.L. 117-58</u>). Moreover, the budget provides an additional \$9.5 billion in advance appropriations included in the IIJA. These funds are directed toward bridge replacement and rehabilitation efforts, electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure, and other programs centered on boosting the safety, sustainability, and resilience of the transportation network.

The House and Senate Appropriations Committees have still not issued deadlines for community projects and appropriations guidance, however, members have posted individual forms and deadlines. We have been working with STA staff to brief members of Congress on STA priorities.

Department of Transportation Update

On March 11, the DOT—as part of the President's Fiscal Year 2025 budget—recommended that 14 large transit projects receive almost \$4 billion in federal funding through the Capital Investment Grants and Expedited Project Delivery Pilot Program. Of note, two California projects were recommended, including the suggestion to provide \$200 million to the <u>Inglewood Transit Connector Project</u> and \$500 million to the <u>Transbay Downtown Extension Project</u>.

On March 11, the DOT <u>released</u> a notice of funding opportunity for the Innovative Finance and Asset Concession Grant program, providing \$100 million over five years to support public entities in facilitating public-private partnerships, as well as the exploration of innovative financing. State, local, and tribal governments are eligible to apply for funding and applications are due on May 10, 2024.

On March 12, the DOT <u>issued</u> a notice of funding opportunity for the Port Infrastructure Development Program. The federal funding totals \$450 million and is available to port authorities, as well as state, local, and tribal governments. Applications are due on May 10, 2024.

On March 12, the DOT <u>launched</u> the Low Carbon Transportation Materials Program to reduce air pollution by incentivizing low-carbon construction materials and products used in transportation. The first tranche of funding will release \$1.2 billion to states and the second pot of money will provide \$800 million to cities, tribes, and metropolitan planning organizations.

On March 13, the DOT <u>awarded</u> \$3.33 billion in Reconnecting Communities Pilot and Neighborhood Access and Equity funds. The money seeks to reconnect communities cut off by transportation infrastructure. 17 California-based projects were awarded.

On March 19, the DOT <u>opened</u> applications for \$44.5 million in funding through the Active Transportation Infrastructure Investment Program. The funds aim to improve safety and access to bicycling, walking, and public transit. The grant funding can be used to plan, design, or construct sidewalks, bikeways, and trails. State, local, and tribal governments may apply for funds. Applications are due on June 17.

On March 8, Rep. Seth Moulton (D-MA) introduced the *American High-Speed Rail Act* (<u>H.R. 7600</u>) to provide grants in support of high-speed rail corridor development. The bill is cosponsored by 41 Democrats, including Reps. Barbara Lee (D-CA), Juan Vargas (D-CA), Mark Takano (D-CA), Zoe Lofgren (D-CA), Robert Garcia (D-CA), and Jim Costa (D-CA).

Projects

Background:

During the Summer of 2023, Caltrans District 4 has kick-started their <u>Caltrans District</u> 4 <u>Bike Plan Update</u>, which includes updating their 2018 Bike Plan Projects List. As part of this plan update, Caltrans staff will continue to do a location-based needs identification of projects along the State Highway System where infrastructure investments would most benefit people bicycling and best achieve the goals of Toward an Active California and Directors Policy 37. As part of the methodology for location-based needs, Caltrans staff incorporated projects identified in the 2020 Active Transportation Plan. A Draft Plan is anticipated to be available for the public to review by Summer 2024 with a Final Plan anticipated in early Fall 2024.

Discussion:

Caltrans staff have completed their initial draft list of county bicycle priority projects (Attachment A) and are seeking feedback on the project list. The top-scoring bicycle projects will be prioritized for future State Highway Operation and Projection Program (SHOPP) funds. At this point, no additional bicycle projects are requested to be added.

The following three metrics were used in the development of the location-based project tier list, with additional information provided via this <u>Story Map Link</u>:

- Safety (33% weight) Measures- Severity-weighted crash density
- Mobility (33% weight) Measures- Density of Short Trips, Regional Bike Network, Proximity to transit, Permeability, Public Feedback
- Equity (33% weight) Measures- MTC's Equity Priority Community/Cal Enviro Screen

STA staff is requesting input on the proposed projects they have listed for Solano County with May 8th as the deadline for member agencies to submit their feedback to Dulce Jimenez, djimenez@sta.ca.gov. The STA TAC received a presentation on this agenda item at their April 24th TAC meeting.

Background:

The Solano Mobility Program of the Solano Transportation Authority (STA) began as part of a statewide network of rideshare programs funded primarily by Caltrans for the purpose of managing countywide and regional rideshare programs in Solano County and providing air quality improvements through trip reduction.

Starting in February 2014, the STA expanded its services to include the Solano Mobility Call Center which was originally one of four Solano Mobility priorities identified in 2011 recent Solano Transportation Study for Older Adults and People with Disabilities. It initially began as Solano Napa Commuter Information that provided commuters and Solano County employers with information on a variety of transit services and incentive programs, and now, the Mobility Call Center also provides Older Adults and People with Disabilities with a range of various mobility information. Some of the programs include GoGo Grandparent, ADA paratransit and Intercity Taxi card program.

Discussion:

Solano Mobility Call Center

For the 2nd Quarter of FY 2023-24, the Solano Mobility Call Center assisted 2,315 customers in person and over the phone. There were also 25,947 website hits.

The Call Center Activity Quarterly Summary:

- Assisted 119 walk in customers
- Processed 15 Regional Transit Connection (RTC) Applications
 (RTC: A discount ID card that is available to persons with qualifying disabilities. Once
 qualified, are able to use on fixed-route, BART, and ferry systems throughout the San
 Francisco Bay Area.)
- Processed 203 PEX cards
 (PEX: The Intercity Taxi card program can be used by ADA (American Disabilities Act) certified individuals to pay discounted taxi fare in Solano County)
- Attended 5 events/presentations and helped prepare materials for 16 events in Solano County

The efficiency and effectiveness of these services are determined using the corresponding STA Connected Mobility Implementation Plan Guidelines, Performance Measures, & Benchmarks, which were approved and adopted by the STA Board on June 28, 2022. The plan is included in Attachment A.

Using the performance measures, STA can determine the ongoing relevance, usability, adaptability, and sustainability of the mobility services currently offered in Solano County. Specifically, the STA Connected Mobility Implementation Plan Guidelines, Performance Measures, & Benchmarks goals and objectives support the recommendations of the Metropolitan Transportation Commission's (MTC's) Blue Ribbon Transit Recovery Task Force. All standards meet the criteria as defined in the evaluation methodology.

Fiscal Impact:

The approved FY 2023-24 budget for the One-Stop Call Center programs is \$419,677 funded through FTA 5310, One Bay Area Grant 3(OBAG), and State Transit Assistance Funds (STAF).

STA Connected Mobility Implementation Plan Guidelines, Performance Measures & Benchmark Goals and Objectives

Solano Mobility Call Center roles and responsibilities: Inquiries and requests that are handled clearly and quickly in a way that enhances mobility program usability and accessibility, and in a manner that meets the quantifiable conditions listed below.

To ensure quality, the program has customer service standards that detail methods of effectively handling responses, as well as detailing acceptable answer speeds or hold times. These conditions include the following:

- Consistent communication with partnered agencies to keep up to date with relevant information. Fully staffed call center to ensure little to no hold times between the hours of 8-5pm M-F.
- Average call answer time is less than 20 seconds.
- Average call hold time is less than 30 seconds.
- Return messages within one business day of message receipt.
- Respond to valid complaints within 48 hours of complaint receipt.
- Five percent increase in program participation annually.
