Minutes for the Meeting of January 5, 2017

1. CALL TO ORDER/SELF INTRODUCTIONS

The meeting of the STA's Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC) was called to order by Chair Lund at approximately 6:33 p.m. at the STA in Conference Room 1.

2. CONFIRM QUORUM

3. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

On a motion from Barbara Wood, and a second from Lori Wilson, the BAC unanimously approved the agenda.

5. CONSENT CALENDAR

A. Recommendation:

On a motion by Mike Segala, and a second by Lori Wilson, the BAC approved the minutes of November 3, 2016. (6 Ayes, 2 Absences, 0 Abstentions)

Mike Segala stated for the record to fix two errors in the third paragraph of the minutes. He request the correction to be made for "Suisun Valley" to "Suisun Elementary" and "Chief Meadows" to "Chief Mattos."

6. PRESENTATIONS

A. Presentation: Pleasants Valley Rd. Striping Plan

Nick Burton arrived at 7:40 p.pm. He provided an update on the Pleasants Valley Road Striping Plan. Mr. Burton stated that they are still working with PG & E, and running into some minor issues. He explained that they are still on track and aim to begin construction in late Spring. The thermal plastic audio striping will be used in this project but it will only be placed down for about 40% of the 4.6 miles stretch of Pleasants Valley Road. There's going to be a corridor study as to where most of the accidents occur as well as where most of the curves are located to place the thermal plastic audio striping. Nick Burton explained that the lanes on Pleasants Valley Road are already pretty narrow and by placing thermal plastic audio striping along the entire stretch of road will create too much noise. He also added that there is going to be painted shoulders which gives the appearance of a narrower lane reducing the speed of drivers commuting along Pleasants Valley Road.

Mike Segala has some concerns about the painted shoulders due to it being slippery during the rain. Nick Burton responded that he will look into adding a sand application over the paint to prevent it from turning into a slippery surface. He also note that delineators will also be added on certain parts of Pleasants Valley Road to prevent reckless driving.

Ryan Dodge departed at around 7:50 p.m.

8. ACTION NON – FINANCIAL

A. Top Ten Bike Rides in Solano County

Drew Hart updated BAC members on the Top Ten Rides in Solano County. He stated that for over a decade the Solano Transportation Authority (STA) has developed a bike map for Solano County. Mr. Hart highlighted in January 2016, the STA BAC approved a strategy to pursue funding for the purpose of redesigning the bike map and producing more wayfinding signs. Drew Hart noted that STA staff successfully secured \$100,000 for a combined effort to redesign the bike map and install wayfinding signs. He stated that this funding came from the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (\$60,000) and the Yolo-Solano Air Quality Management District (\$40,000). Mr. Hart added that the focus of these funds continue to be an opportunity to increase cycling in Solano County.

Drew Hart mentioned at the November 3, 2016 BAC meeting that STA staff proposes a more targeted map containing the best rides in Solano County, showcasing the natural assets and infrastructure investments enjoyed by cyclists in the area. He described the

benefits to this approach includes faster production time, smaller budget, and the flexibility to have both a comprehensive map and a promotional piece. Mr. Hart summarized that both the BAC and STA Board approved this approach and STA staff will soon be securing a consultant designer to develop the map.

Mr. Hart recommended BAC members to consider geographic equity, range of difficulty, and highlight recent investment on specific bicycle routes.

Barbara Wood stated that the Two Bridges Loop bike route should change the difficulty level from "novice" to "intermediate" due to hills and traffic the cyclist have to ride through.

BAC members agree to rate each bike ride with the level of difficulty and mileage. Drew Hart clarified that the Top Ten Bike Rides in Solano County will all be on one map.

Ray Posey recommended the Bucktown ride, a relatively flat ride of about 12 miles which is great for beginners, but it can be difficult during windy days. He also recommended the Berryessa Lake Loop ride as well as the Vacaville – Winters routes.

Mike Segala suggested to include parking areas on the bike map in case people who are interested in participating in riding these Top Ten Rides to have an area to park and unload their bikes to go on the ride. He also added that each route should be either be a loop or includes a return route. Mr. Segala recommended to include Grizzly Island (to Rush Ranch) bike route for the Top Ten rides.

Nancy Lund requested to include locations of public restrooms, water fountain locations, as well a nearby restaurants on the map to encourage residents and visitors to explore Solano County.

BAC members recommended the Rockville – Green Valley – Gordon Valley – Suisun Valley loop. They considered calling it the Four Valleys Loop or Suisun Valleys Loop.

Nancy Lund suggested BAC members to ride some the routes discussed to bring back feedback and proposals for additional routes to be included in the map.

Recommendation:

Discuss and recommend about ten rides in Solano County for use in the promotional map.

On a motion by Ray Posey, and a second by Mike Segala, the BAC agree to a subcommittee to further discuss the Top Ten Bike Rides in Solano County. (6 Ayes, 2 Absences, 0 Abstentions)

B. 2017 BAC Officer Elections

Nancy Lund was concerned to continue having David Pyle as Vice – Chair for the 2017 calendar year because of his health issues. He have not been able to attend many of the BAC meetings in 2016. BAC members agreed to delay electing a vice – chair until after discussing with David Pyle to see if he would like to continue as vice – chair or if he chooses to step down. BAC members requested Drew Hart to get in contact with David Pyle to discuss the matter of continuing as Vice – Chair.

The BAC members propose that Nancy Lund remain as Chair for the 2017 calendar year because she has been doing a wonderful job.

Mike Segala requested that "Chair" and "Vice – Chair" should be included on the agenda underneath the names of the BAC committee members.

BAC members requested an updated Membership Status of all the BAC members including when their terms expire for the next BAC meeting.

Elect a Chair and Vice-Chair for the 2017 calendar year.

On a motion by Barbara Wood, and a second by Mike Segala, the BAC elected Nancy Lund to continue as Chair for the 2017 calendar year. (6 Ayes, 2 Absences, 0 Abstentions)

On a motion by Mike Segala and a second by Lori Wilson, the BAC agreed to leave the Vice – Chair appointment vacant until the next BAC meeting. (6 Ayes, 2 Absences, 0 Abstentions)

9. INFORMATIONAL - DISCUSSION

A. One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) Cycle 2 Update

Drew Hart provided an overview of the OBAG Cycle 2 Update. He presented on all the project submittals and the amount of funds they are requesting from Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) funds. Mr. Hart indicated that there was a total of \$17,373,519 needed to fund all the projects listed but there was only \$4,606,003 available. Drew Hart stated that there is no current conclusion as to which project will receive the funding but the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) which is usually made up of the Public Works Directors will meet again to discuss how the funds will be distributed prior to bringing it to the STA Board.

Mike Segala was concerned that the TAC would not consider the Suisun City Lotz Way project that the BAC members recommended, but Drew Hart explained that the STA Board takes into account on all the different projects recommended from all the different advisory committees as well as considerations from the TAC. BAC members discussed this situation and requested the minutes from the upcoming TAC meeting to be emailed to all the BAC members.

Nancy Lund encouraged BAC members to attend the upcoming STA board meeting to show support for the project recommended.

Drew Hart clarified that all the projects listed were submitted by the public works department from the seven cities and the county. He explained that a project will not be pulled because it is not ready, but a project may get prioritize due to its deliverability such as if the project has received environmental clearance or if the design is completed.

B. Caltrans District 4 Bike Plan

Due to time constraint, BAC members have agreed to table this presentation until the next BAC meeting.

On a motion from Barbara Wood, and a second from Lori Wilson, the BAC unanimously agreed to table this presentation to the next meeting.

C. Reports and Updates from Staff

Drew Hart provided an overview on the Active Transportation Program (ATP) funding. He explained that STA staff assisted in submitting three applications on June 15, 2016 from Solano County which were Fairfield - East Tabor Avenue, Suisun City – McCoy Creek Trail Extension, and Vallejo – Bay Trail – Vine Trail. Mr. Hart highlighted that all three projects were recommended for funding. He stated that Fairfield's East Tabor Avenue project was recommended for funds from the State. Mr. Hart noted that the two remaining projects were recommended at the regional level. However, Suisun's request for \$4.1 million exceeded the remaining available funds for the region. Therefore, the region has stated that if Suisun City can provide the balance of \$2.4 million, the project will receive funding. Otherwise, the \$1.8 million of funding will be redirected to another project.

10. INFORMATIONAL - NO DISCUSSION

11. COMMITTEE MEMBER COMMENTS AND FUTURE AGENDA TOPICS

Mike Segala indicated to Nick Burton that a lot of trucks are parked on the Class I bike lane on Peterson Road and there are very few signs that indicates that there is a bike lane present. Nick Burton noted the situation and proposed to place some glued down delineators to prevent trucks from parking into the bike lane. He also stated to notify the police to warn trucks from parking in the bike lane.

Mike Segala was also concerned about the road condition on Cordelia Road between the Suisun City line and Beck Avenue. Cordelia Road is in bad condition making it difficult for bike riders. Mr. Segala addressed new bike safety ideas, the left turn pockets for bicyclists so they can safely make a left turn on a busy intersection. He stated that he would like to save the discussion on the left turn pocket for the May BAC meeting.

Mike Segala addressed a major cyclist safety issue in Fairfield between Sunset Avenue and Travis Boulevard. Mr. Segala stated that bicyclists are squeezed out of the bike lane because of the re-striping that has occurred over there. He said that the bike lane was moved two traffic lanes over and there's nothing that protects the bicyclist and as they turn onto South Sunset Avenue.

Drew Hart notified BAC members that he will not be able to attend the next BAC meeting and instead, Ryan Dodge will be presenting in his place.

Nancy Lund indicated to Nick Burton on Cordelia Road and Hale Ranch Road that going west there is no signs for "No Trucks" but going east there is. Nick Burton stated that there is a lot of construction on that route currently and has the right to use the road. Mr. Burton noted that he will discuss the matter with CHP.

RE: Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3 Amendment Request

Background:

The Transportation Development Act (TDA) is generated by a 1/4 cent tax on retail sales collected in California's 58 counties. Two percent of the TDA funding generated, called TDA Article 3, is returned to each county from which it was generated for bicycle and pedestrian projects. The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) administers this funding for each of the nine Bay Area counties with assistance from each of the county Congestion Management Agencies (e.g. Solano Transportation Authority). Approximately \$465,000 TDA Article 3 funding was available for allocation in Fiscal Year 2016-17 (FY 2016-17), based on the current projections. Any unused funds can be rolled over from year to year.

Discussion:

The Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC) reprioritized its Tier 1 and Tier 2 Priority Project Lists. The Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC) has also reprioritized its Tier 1 and Tier 2 Priority Project Lists. These lists inform STA staff in their funding strategy on the use of TDA Article 3 funds. The bicycle priority projects identified by the BAC and pedestrian priority projects identified by the PAC will also be considered as part of a larger funding plan that includes the regional One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) funding, funding from both of the air districts, and other funding opportunities.

In 2016, the PAC recommended a project in the City of Fairfield. Fairfield sought funding to construct improvements to the Bay Area Ridge Trail at an uncontrolled crossing on Green Valley Road north of the I-80/I-680 interchange. Proposed improvements include marked crosswalks, flashing beacons, and curb ramps crossing Green Valley Road near Westlake Drive. This project was approved by the TAC and STA Board for TDA 3 funding of \$50,000.

Due to bids on the project coming in higher than anticipated, the City of Fairfield would not be able to complete the project with available funding. STA staff recommends repurposing this approved \$50,000 to a nearby project on the Solano Community College campus. The project includes installation of sidewalk, ADA ramps, roadway crosswalks, site lighting and signage from the main entry driveway on Suisun Valley Road to campus entry plaza (see Attachment A). The main benefit from this project is that it is a sidewalk gap closure project to the area where a new Solano Express bus stop will be located. Students will now have more frequent and more reliable bus service to just outside the campus. This sidewalk improvement will provide pedestrian access to and from the campus to the Solano Express bus stop.

Based upon all of the identified needs for TDA 3 funds and input from the BAC, PAC and local agencies, with an emphasis on emerging needs, STA staff is recommending the following amended allocation for FY 2016-17 TDA Article 3 funds:

This recommended strategy will successfully complete three bicycle and pedestrian projects of high value as well as provide planning funds needed to assess and identify future bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure priorities while reserving funds to support future needs as projects become ready for construction. The amendment to the recommendation does not increase the previous dollar amount but shifts the money from one project which is not fully funded to a nearby project which has a complete funding package and will be constructed summer of 2017.

Fiscal Impact:



Background:

Since that time, STA staff successfully secured \$100,000 for a combined effort to redesign the bike map and install wayfinding signs. This funding came from the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (\$60,000) and the Yolo-Solano Air Quality Management District (\$40,000). The focus of these funds continue to be on opportunities to increase cycling in Solano County.

STA staff proposed a more targeted map containing the best rides in Solano County, showcasing the natural assets and infrastructure investments enjoyed by cyclists in the area. Benefits to this approach include a faster production time, smaller budget, and the flexibility to have both a comprehensive map and a promotional piece. Both the BAC and STA Board approved this approach and STA staff will soon be securing a consultant designer to develop the map.

Discussion:

The guidelines of the proposed map will mirror those previously discussed with the BAC including the following:

- Top Ten rides in Solano County as a way to highlight and promote cycling in the area
- Simpler design focusing on what is necessary for the end user
- Smaller printed version of the map
- Mobile friendly

Goals to consider in ride selection include:

- Geographic distribution of highlighted rides
- Rides suggested for various skill and comfort levels
- Highlight Solano's assets

On February 22, 2017 a subcommittee convened to identify top rides in Solano to be presented to the full BAC during the March 2017 meeting. STA staff presents those rides to the BAC with the intent of selected rides being forwarded to the STA TAC and

Planning Directors for approval. STA staff included a blank line held for a Rio Vista ride, and the Fairfield to Vacaville ride for consideration as submitted by STA staff.

Background:

The Bicycle Advisory Committee has two officer positions to assist staff with developing agendas and running meetings. These positions are Chair and Vice-Chair. Background:

Every four to five years federal cycle funds are available for distribution at the regional level. In the San Francisco Bay Area, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) calls these federal cycle funds One Bay Area Grant (OBAG). MTC has now set out policies and established funding amounts for the second cycle of OBAG. This covers Fiscal Years (FYs) 2017-18 through 2021-22.

Jurisdictions within Solano County have two main funding pots. One is automatically divvied out based on a formula totaling almost \$9.5 million. The other pot of funds is called Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) funds, and must be applied for totaling \$4.6 million. Under the direction of the STA Board, STA staff released a Call for Projects which was open for eight weeks – from September 14th though November 18, 2016 – for this \$4.6 million CMAQ funds.

Discussion:

Solano County jurisdictions submitted a total of 13 projects during the OBAG Cycle 2 CMAQ Call for Projects. Project sponsors requested a total of \$17.3M in CMAQ funds with only \$4.6M available; a nearly 4 to 1 ratio. Eligible CMAQ projects types included bike lanes, pedestrian improvements, transit improvements, and road diets. The list of projects submitted is provided in Attachment A.

Projects that have been submitted are being scored by STA staff on the OBAG 2 evaluation criteria. Excluding Countywide Transportation Plan (CTP) goals and Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) goals, there are 11 criteria which can offer "points" for each project submittal. STA staff examined each evaluation criteria answer supplied by project sponsors to verify validity.

A large factor related to which projects will be selected is the MTC mandated requirement that 50% of all OBAG Cycle 2 funds must be spent within a Priority Development Area (PDA). The draft schedule for project review, selection, and adoption for CMAQ projects are as follows:

- March 29th Staff Recommendations to TAC (Action)
- April 12th –Staff Recommendations to STA Board (Action)

Fiscal Impact:

Projects selected as a result of the Call for Projects are then eligible to receive funding. There is an 11.47% non-Federal match required for OBAG 2 projects and programs.

RE: Bicycle Priority Project List – Annual Update

Background:

The Solano Transportation Authority (STA) maintain the Countywide Bicycle and Pedestrian Transportation Plans that identify and plan for the implementation of countywide bicycle and pedestrian transportation projects.

The Bicycle Priority Projects List and Pedestrian Priority Project List are developed through a collaborative effort between the Bicycle Advisory Committee and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BAC or PAC), STA staff, and public works and planning staff from the member agencies. This creates a consistent foundation for the funding and delivery of projects in Solano County. An annual review of the Projects List is conducted to ensure that the list is up to date as projects are completed and priorities change at the local level. This list informs funding strategies using discretionary funding sources such as TDA Article 3 funds and funds from the Air District.

As a result of this prioritization and update process, the 7 Cities and County have been successful in delivering several priority bicycle projects over the past several years.

Discussion:

The process for updating the Priority Project Lists involves STA staff beginning with the previously adopted lists, eliminating completed projects and consulting with the cities and county on their current priorities. Finally, STA identifies those projects that are most ready for construction. These projects are categorized as either Tier 1 or Tier 2. All other projects fall to a list of other envisioned projects. In general, STA staff used the following as guidelines to assign projects to either Tier 1 or Tier 2:

- Tier 1 projects are those that have a nearly complete funding plan and have environmental approval, or is identified by the community or staff as an immediate need.
- Tier 2 projects have been identified as an emerging priority. These projects have often been initiated by either a feasibility study or have begun environmental review process, but has not yet reached Tier 1 status.

The BAC will make a recommendation to update the Bicycle Priority Projects List for fiscal year 2016-2017. This list will be recommended to the STA TAC and Board for approval. The Bicycle Priority Project List for Fiscal Year 2016-17 is provided as Attachment A for reference.

This is brought to the BAC's attention as an informational item only. No action is required tonight. Staff wants to remind the committee of previous priorities and progress made. Updating the lists will take place as action items in future meetings.

Background:

The Solano Transportation Authority (STA) purchased eight portable automated counters (four bicycle and four pedestrian) in March, 2015 for the purpose of collecting continuous volume count data throughout Solano County and the seven cities.

Volume count data will be collected and used primarily for competitive grant applications, to collect before-data for funded projects, to collect after-data to help evaluate the effectiveness of implemented projects, and to assist the STA Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC) and the STA Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC) in prioritizing future projects. Counters are available for use on a first-come-first-serve basis (see Attachment A. STA Automated Counter User Agreement).

Discussion:

STA staff has coordinated the installation of automated counters at eight locations and has counted people walking, biking, or rolling the past two years:
