2. CONFIRM QUORUM

A quorum was confirmed at this time.

3. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

On a motion by Barbara Wood and a second by Ray Posey, the BAC approved the agenda. (7 Ayes)

4. OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC COMMENT

Ray Posey would like engineers who have worked together with the BAC Committee to be recognized for their hard work and achievement, and for it to be recognized at one of STA's board meetings.

Mike Segala referred Ray Posey to Drew Hart in drafting a letter of appreciation and for Drew Hart to mention the support BAC members have received at the next board meeting whenever possible. Drew Hart suggested relaying this achievement during staff comments at the next board meeting.

Robert Powell mentioned several locations, which staff and committee members agreed to follow up on as points of concern would need to be mentioned to city and county staff for progress.

5. CONSENT CALENDAR

A. Recommendation:

Approve STA BAC Meeting Minutes of July 30, 2015. On a motion by Nancy Lund, and a second by Barbara Wood, the BAC approved the minutes of July 30, 2015. (7 Ayes)

6. INFORMATION - DISCUSSION

A. Wayfinding Signs

Drew Hart followed up on the Wayfinding Signs status which is part of a countywide policy to include bike route signs on bicycle facilities that are part of the bikeway network. Mr. Hart informed BAC members that 125 larger signs have been purchased and delivered to STA. He emphasized that solicited feedback from agency staff pointed him to purchase higher grade material including UV protection and graffiti proof film. This will save money in the long run, and ensure longevity of the signs out on the roads.

Smaller signs will be purchased in the future which will be more appropriate for more urban settings. Members were hopeful that their input on the placement of signs will assist in connecting Solano County cities. BAC members agreed to send information to Drew Hart on locations which were in need of sign placement.

B. TDA Article 3

Drew Hart conveyed the most recent Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3 funding status, which included information such as how it is created by collecting a ¼ cent tax on retail sales in 58 of California's counties. He conveyed that Article 3 is comprised of 2% of this generated funding which is then returned to each county to assist in funding bicycle and pedestrian projects. Mr. Hart continued informing members that approximately \$443,000 of TDA Article 3 funding is available for allocation in Fiscal Year (FY) 2015-16 based on the current projections. Mr. Hart informed members TDA Article 3 money will fund Suisun City Driftwood Drive, Countywide Safe Routes to School Program, Rio Vista Highway 12 Crossing, and Vacaville Rocky Hills Trail.

C. CTP Update

Drew Hart presented the website Solano2040.org to BAC members where they can leave comments and suggestions which could then be used to assist in determining the needs of the county and the cities. Mr. Hart highlighted the Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP) for Solano consists of three primary elements: Active Transportation; Arterials Highways and Freeways; and, Transit and Ridesharing.

8. MEMBER COMMENTS & FOLLOW UP ITEMS

Ray Posey informed members that Pleasants Valley Road is very hazardous, which had previously been approved for widening, but was due to public opposition. He continued by relaying to members that now is the time to fight for the road to be widened as too many deaths take place on this road and safety is more important than scenery. Mr. Posey urged members to speak with their cities and county and urge staff to look into this matter and act now.

Background:

The Solano Transportation Authority (STA) published a County Bike Map for more than a decade. It is distributed at STA events and at local bike shops, and available as a PDF document on the STA web site.

Discussion:

STA staff and the BAC have previously discussed how to modify the Countywide Bike Map for future editions, including electronic versions, route applications for smart phones or publishing 'favorite ride' descriptions.

There are several options for identifying these 'favorite rides.' One is for each BAC member to identify one, in conjunction with the staff of the agency they represent. Another is to have the BAC discuss and identify the best rides countywide, and then have STA staff draft a map that contains as many as possible.

Related issues are whether the descriptions should be map-only graphics or include text; whether the rides should be limited to designated Class I through Class III bike facilities (or even include Class IV); and, whether start and end locations should be tied to transit sites accessible from regional providers such as Capitol Corridor, the WETA ferry, FAST and SolTrans.

STA staff will ask the BAC for specific direction on how to proceed at the November 5, 2015 meeting, and then begin to prepare documents to implement the Committee's direction.

RE: Solano County Bike Route Wayfinding Signs

Background:

The Solano Transportation Authority (STA) has adopted a countywide policy to include bike route signs on bicycle facilities that are part of the countywide bikeway network.

The Solano Countywide Bicycle Transportation Plan identifies a bicycle wayfinding and marking system to enhance the ease of navigation for bicyclists. Both the STA's Bike and Pedestrian Plans identify implementing Countywide Bicycle and Pedestrian Wayfinding Signage as a priority.

Ultimately, a Wayfinding Plan will be produced with the input of the BAC which will guide future sign placement principles and establish standards. This will be especially useful when directional signs (with listed destinations and distances) are added the signs that already exist. In the meantime, existing regional bike routes that are in need of bike route signs will be identified by the BAC and local agency staff. STA staff will work with agency staff to coordinate the installation of Solano Bike Route Signs.

This topic was discussed at the September BAC meeting.

Discussion:

The timeline of the Wayfinding efforts are as follows:

- Solicit help of the BAC to identify sign gaps and incorrect signs
- Work with cities to place new signs and take down incorrect signs
- Create a list of recommended destinations for the bikeway network with the help of the BAC
- Meet individually with city/county Public Works and Planning staff members to receive feedback on recommended routes and destinations
- Circulate draft document, including destinations list, to BAC, PAC, and TAC for final feedback
- Present Wayfinding Plan to STA Board and receive approval

The Wayfinding Plan is currently being drafted and will receive feedback from the BAC and PAC.



RE: Agricultural and Bicycling Community Coordination Group Meeting

Background:

Solano County periodically hosts meetings to identify and work on solutions related to bicycling in the unincorporated county, with a special emphasis on bicycle/agricultural issues. The most recent Agricultural and Bicycling Community Coordination Group meeting held on Tuesday, October 20, 2015 at the Solano County Government Center. STA Associate Planners Drew Hart and Ryan Dodge attended.

Discussion:

The primary topic of discussion was the first agenda item regarding the *Pleasants Valley Road Safety Improvement Project*, attended primarily by residents on Pleasants Valley Road. Most of those residents objected to widening the road with shoulder additions, believing that motor vehicle speeds will increase, leading to unsafe driving behavior. Solano County staff stated that recent research that shows having shoulders (with adequate width) leads to less severe and less frequent crashes for all users.

There was also discussion of non-permitted bicycle racing events on Putah Creek Road. A representative from Davis Bicycles! (an advocacy group from Davis, CA) was present and expressed interest in working together and continuing the dialogue.

RE: Active Transportation Program (ATP) Report

Background:

The Active Transportation Program (ATP) is a statewide funding program for bicycle and pedestrian projects. The program began in 2014. Eighty-nine percent of the projects funded in Year 1 benefited disadvantaged communities. STA's Safe Routes to School application (\$388,000) was the only project from Solano County to receive statewide ATP grant funding. The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) funded 10 projects, totaling \$30.7 million. None of the MTC-funded projects were in Solano County.

For Year 2, Solano applicants had two funding opportunities:

- Statewide competition: \$180M
- Regional competition through MTC: \$30M

Discussion:

On September 15, 2015 the California Transportation Commission (CTC) released the list of projects recommended for funding. MTC released the list of projects recommended for the regional portion of the funds on October 7, 2015.

Solano County applications did not receive any funding at the state level this year. However, the Safe Routes to School (SR2S) Application submitted by STA, which contained infrastructure projects in Vallejo and Benicia as well as non-infrastructure (program), received money from the regional level.

Attached is the list of projects submitted by Solano County Agencies (Attachment A). Also attached is the side by side comparison of the state and regional scores for all Bay Area projects (Attachment B).

Fiscal Impact:

The Safe Routes to School project which is recommended to receive funding will impact the STA budget in Fiscal Year 2016-17.
